HOT OFF THE WIRES

## AMERICAN Y. M. C.A. FRIEND OF THE SOLDIER DURING GREAT WAR

National War Work Council Received Over Hundred Million Dollars to Carry on—Two Per Cent. of Funds Devoted to Religious Purposes — \$11,000,000 Spent Among Allies, \$30,000,000 in Home Camps and \$43.

New York, July 28.—Irrst detailed tocounts of the receipts and expenditures of the Young Men's Christian Association, made public here today by the drganization's National War Work Council finance committee, show that \$126,282,859 was received by it between April 26, 1917 and March 31, 1919. Total expenditures aggregated \$97,817,005 in the period named, it is stated, leaving a balance of \$27,465. \$34, a sum estimated to be sufficient to carry on the work here and abroad until next December 31.

According to the figures, which appear over the signatures of George W. Perkins, chairman of the committees, Cleveland H. Dodge, treasurer of the War Work Council, and H. I. W. Wilmot, comptroller, slightly more than two percent of the tota funds than two percent of the total funds were expended for religious purposes in the United States and overseas, while approximately 85 per cent. was a devoted to the purchase, transportation and distribution of canteen supplies and to entertainments, educa-

In addition to the provision of free athletic supplies, which included, among other things, in the United States camps alone, 557,096 baseballs and 20,000 sets of boxing gloves, the report says, the Y. M. C. A., distributed \$86,832,449 worth of merchandise. Of this merchandise \$1,794,771 worth, or approximately five percent

was given free to the soldier.

Of the \$97,817,005 exxpended, it is shown, more than \$30,000,000 was spent in the home camps, more than \$43,000,000 with the American Expeditionary Force abroad and \$14,409,175 for work with the Allied armies and prisoners of war. The balance went for transportation and other expenses. The statement explains that the "Y" suffered a loss of \$1,478,984 in the operation of army post exchanges and canteeds which, owing to the depreciation in values of French and English currency and conversion of the overseas figures at market rates, resulted in a book loss of \$2,432,089

The report, the committee makes clear, is not final because the war service of the Y. M. C. A., which reached its maximum in March of this year, is being continued in the United States and foreign countries. Three war work campaigns for funds, it points out, brought from the American public \$123,254,052 and this amount, the report states, was augmented to \$126,282,859 by sums from other sources.

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


