Professor Soret, in delivering a most interesting report, passed in review the operations of the Industrial section, in reference to Commerce, laying great stress upon the competition that has taken place in the manufacture of chronometers. This competition was instituted with the object of testing the workmanhip and precision of chronometers turned out by Gene vese manufacturers, and none but those adopted for pocket use were admitted. They were deposited in charge of the authorities at the Observatory, and underwent the most searching ordeal possible to be applied to pocket instruments of this class. The lury specially retained to decide the difficult question as to whom to award the palm of excellency unanimously decided in favor of Messrs, J. M. Badollet & Co. This firm having carried off the sole prise by exhibiting a chronometer which fulfilled in the highest degree every condition required, crowned their first success by gaining honorable mention for two other chronometers. The allusion to this triple honor was received with enthusiastic applause, and Professor Humbert, President of the Fine Arts Section, closed the meeting with a happy and humorous dissertation upon subjects connected with this department.
