New Brunswick, Provincial Parliament. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

From the Journals.

Tuesday, 23 April.

On motion of Mr. Boyd, The House went
into Committee of the whole on a Bill to en-
courage the Fisheries of this Province.

The Chairman reported, that the Commit-
tee having the Bill referred to them under
their consideration, had made progress there-
in, and he was directed to ask for leave to sit
again.

To Daniel Lee and Theodore Knutter the
sum of £35 to remunerate them for that a-
mount due them by the Commissioner for su-
perintending the repairs of the Magaguadavic
Bridge near Young's, and for extra materials
and labour furnished by them last Summer in
perfecting said repairs.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Simonds.
Whereas by the Report of the Select Com-
mittee appointed in the Session of 1835, to
inquire into and report upon all matters re-
lating to the Charlotte County Election, and
presented to the House on the twenty fourth
February in that year, it appears that the Com-
mittee had discovered that certain errors, al-
terations and interlineations had been made
in the Poll Book, and that they could not es-
cape from the belief, that they were made by
Robert Thomson, Esq. or with his privacy
or knowledge; and whereas from what since
transpired, there is good reason to believe that
the whole facts came before the Select
Committee, they would have arrived at other
conclusions, which would have exculpated the
said Robert Thomson from any blame attach-
ing to him, in consequence of those errors,
alterations and interlineations; therefore

Resolved, unanimously, That in the op-
inion of this House, the said Robert Thom-
son Esq. is fully acquitted from blame in this
matter, and that nothing unworthy or dis-
honorable attaches to his character.

Wednesday, 31 April.
A Bill to amend the Charter of King's Col-
lege, passed the House.

To the Commissioners of the Alms House
and Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of
St. Andrews, the sum of £150 to reimburse
them in expenses incurred for the relief of
sick and distressed emigrants; the same to
be taken from the Emigrant Fund.

To the Overseers of the Poor for the Pa-
rish of St. George, the sum of £25 to re-
imburse them expenses incurred in aid of sick
and distressed emigrants in the year 1843;
the same to be taken from the Emigrant
Fund.

Mr. Hanington, from the Committee ap-
pointed to wait upon His Excellency the
Lieutenant Governor with the Address of the
House of the first inst., relative to the dispo-
sal of Crown Lands by instalments under the
Association System, as also with regard to
Despatches His Excellency may have receiv-
ed from this Colonial Secretary upon the sub-
ject, reported, That they had attended there-
to, and that His Excellency was pleased to
say, the information required should be fur-
nished.

From the Courant.

Melancholy Death.—A young man named
Samuel Fleming, son of Mr. John Fleming
of Saint James, aged about 23 years, was
killed, by a loaded sled passing over his body,
on the Arrostook Road a few days since.

This is the same person whom our readers
will remember, as having his head cut open
in a lath machine at the Ferry Point last fall
—and it is supposed that he fell from the sled
while in a fit to which he has been subject
since the accident alluded to.

Large Log.—A Pine Log making 4000
feet board measure, was hauled upon Millers-
ry's Brook, the present winter, by Samuel
and Stephen Gitchell. The stick is perfect-
ly sound, clear of knots, 50 feet long, and 40
inches diameter or ten feet circumference at
the top, or little end. This stick we presume
is entitled to the name of "Burr," which we
observed written upon it with red chalk—if
not, whoever will tell us of a larger tree
having been cut this winter, shall have credit
for it.

Fire.—We learn that the dwelling house
of Mr. Edwin Foster, on Tower Hill, was
wholly consumed by fire on Wednesday night
last; the family barely escaping with their
lives. We have had no further particulars,
but understand Mr. Foster's loss is estimated
at £200.

Chickens.—Nature is getting superfluous.
We rather think she will be soon voted out
of fashion and dispensed with. There is a
chap just over our publication office hatch-
ing chickens in a big box, fifty a day, having
a thousand eggs always doing. The trouble
of doing them is slight, the heat costs very
little, and the chickens crack their several
shells and walk up to their dough and water
like woodchoppers to dinner, or sailors to
their grog. They are clean, strong, and
lively, grow fast and rarely die; and who-
ever has a hatching machine can have "spring

chickens" every week in the year; and at
small expense. If we could invent a ma-
chine to lay eggs now, hens would be done
with. Am. Paper.

It is said that 69 of the principal cities had
towns of England (including Liverpool, Bris-
tol, Birmingham, Nottingham, &c.) would
not produce a population equal to that of
London. It is also calculated that a
population equal to that of the city of Sa-
lisbury is added to London every three
months.

St. Johns, Newfd. Scot Fishery.—In none
of the British Colonial seaports is the spirit
of enterprise so busy as in St. Johns, though
it can boast of fewer allurements to intel-
ligent merchants than any other. This sea-
son the Seal Fishery has caused the invest-
ment of a greater amount of means than ever,
notwithstanding the extra hazardous nature
of the business. Last year, there were 69
vessels, 9,625 tons, and 3477 men employed;
this season there are 15 vessels, 1,403 tons,
and 538 men engaged, beyond the numera-
tion of that period. (Acadian Recorder.)

Two gentlemen of Mobile, a few days

ordinary number of 297 English snipe, bull-
heads and curlew plover.

forever trotting round like a dog driving a
way at a hoop." "Heigho!" sighed a black-
smith, in one of the hot days, as he wiped
the perspiration from his brow, while his
red-hot iron glowed on his anvil, "this is life
with a vengeance—melting and frying one's
self over the fire." "Oh that I were a car-
penter!" ejaculated a shoemaker, as he bent
over his lap-stone, "here I am day after day,
working my soul away in making soles for
others, cooped up in a little 7 by 9 room."

"I am sick of this out-of-door work," exclaims
the carpenter, hollering and sweating under
the sun, or exposed to the inclemency of the
weather, "if I was only a tailor." "This is too
bad," perpetually cries the tailor, "to be
compelled to sit perched up here, plying the
needle all the while—would that mine was a
more active life." "Last day of grace—the
banks won't discount—customers won't pay—
what shall I do?" grumbles the merchant,
"I had rather be a truck-horse, a dog, any
thing." "Happy fellow, grunts the lawyer,
"he scratches his head over some perplex-
ing case, or pores over some dry record."

"Happy fellow," I had rather hammer struc-
ture than cogel my brain on this tedious, vexa-
tious question. And through all the ramifi-
cations of society, all complaining of their
condition—fading fast with their particular
calling. "If I were only this, or that, or the
other, I should be content," is the universal
cry, "anything but what I am." So wags
the world, so it has wagged, and so it will
wag.

Cure for the Cancer.—The following re-
cipe is said to be a sure cure for a cancer:
Take wood sorrel and pound it well in a
mortar; then strain it through a cloth and
dry it down. Cut a piece of cloth or leather
a little larger than the cancer and spread a
thin coat and apply it, it will give much pain,
but not enough to physic. It may take a
week before it is all out, when you suppose
that it is all out, then to cleanse it, take gar-
gool, (some call it cocum) pound and
strain at above, and dry it on a plate. Apply
plasters of it daily until healed up. Should
the sorrel patient prove so painful as to pre-
vent the patient from resting nights, it may
be taken off for a few hours. The sorrel grows
in low hemeck land, the leaves about as
large as red clover, in the shape of three
leaves. The garget or cocum is frequently
found in some parts of the country, on the
road side. It grows about as high as a man's
shoulders and bears a cluster of dark red
berries.

The Albany Daily Advertiser says that the
above has been found efficacious in the cure
of cancer in that city.

We find the following article in the New
York True Sun, which gives a short but
vivid description of the greatness of that noble
and magnificent nation of which it is our
honour and happiness to form a part. We
fully agree with the writer, that the policy of
England is "essentially pacific," but at the
same time sternly just:

British Dependencies.—It is not without
interest we regard the possessions of Great
Britain, at a moment when, if we may be-
lieve some of our leading politicians, she has
her eye on Oregon.—The truth is, the lead-
ing journals, as well as the leading statesmen
of England, have taken up the idea—that we
are desirous of war; that we would like once
more to try our mettle in a contest with her,
now that we are more powerful, and better
able to exert our strength. And the fact is
not to be disguised that, with just cause, on
our part, such a contest would not find us a
divided people. But we still hold to our
opinions expressed on Saturday last, that the
policy of England is at present essentially
pacific. Her dependencies are already of
the most extended character. The care of
them is oppressive and troublesome, and we
cannot believe that the territory in dispute
upon our North Western Coast will ever be
considered sufficiently important to engage
her in a serious opposition to our right. Let
us for a moment glance at the English de-
pendencies in Europe. (They are Gibraltar,
Malta, and Gozo; the Ionian Islands, seven
in number; and Heligoland, an island in
the North Sea, off the coast of Holstein, oc-
cupied by Denmark in 1804, a convenient place
of resort for smugglers, and now much fre-
quented by invalids for the sake of the baths.
These possessions give constant employment
to the English manufacturers; the commer-
cial marine, and to her vessels of war.)

The dependencies of Asia are vast and im-
portant in every sense. The result of a small
mercantile adventure in 1809, with a capital
of only £30,000 has been the acquisition of
territories of boundless extent, of kingdom
upon kingdom, and the growth of a commerce
which can scarcely be estimated. England

receives directly \$15,000,000 a year as di-
vidends upon capital invested in India, besides
countless sums which come into her lap by
indirect means. There are one hundred dis-
tinct districts or territories in Asia, at the
least calculations over with the British flag
exerts its restraints or evinces its power.

Then there are the immense possessions of
Australia 24 hundred miles long, and
1700 wide, with an area 25 times as large as
that of Great Britain and Ireland. Under this
head we place New South Wales, Van Die-
men's land, Western Australia, South Aus-
tralia, and New Zealand. A profitable com-
merce connected with emigration is also be-
ginning to reach this quarter of the world.

In Africa, England has the Cape of Good
Hope with an area of 111,000 square miles.
Mauritius, (an island in the Indian Ocean,
St. Helena, the island of Ascension, St. Paul
Island, the settlements on the Gambia, Cape
Cott Castle, Accra, Dix Cove, Annamaboe,
and Fernando Po.

In North America, there are the Canadian
(the acquisition of Wolfe) twice, and a half
larger than Great Britain and Ireland; New
Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, Prince
Edward's Island, New Foundland; the Hud-
son Bay Territory with an area of three mil-
lions of miles and the Bermudas in the North
Atlantic. What immense possessions are
these?

In the West Indies, we find the British au-
thority in the ascendancy in Antigua, Barba-
dos, Anguilla, Dominica, Grenadines, Mont-
serrat, Nevis, St. Christopher, St. Lucia, St.
Vincent, Tobago, Trinidad, Tortola and the
Virgin Islands, Jamaica, the Bahama Islands,
British Guiana, and Honduras.

The abolition of slavery in the West In-
dies is one of the most remarkable acts of
power ever exercised by the mother country.
On some more fitting occasion we shall al-
lude to it again. 603,809 slaves were liber-
ated at a cost to the public of \$16,561,634.

It appears by official returns that as late as
1841 the value of British Manufactures, ex-
ported to British colonies was over fifteen
millions of pounds sterling, while to all the
world besides it was but about fifty-one mil-
lions and a half pounds.

CURIOUS PULPIT.—The pulpit in the church
of St. Peter, at Wolverhampton, Eng., is
formed wholly of stone, and consists of one
entire piece, which supports it; the flight of
steps leading to it, with the balustrade, &c.,
without any division, the whole having been
cut out of a solid block of stone. The church
was erected in the year 996, at which time it
is said this remarkable pulpit was put up, and
notwithstanding its great age, which appears
to be 848 years, it is still in good condition
and continues in regular use.

about 4 weeks after being written upon.

The Naval Court of Inquiry, convened by
order of the Secretary of the Navy to in-
vestigate the cause of the disastrous explosion
on board the Princeton, have made their re-
port, in which they totally exonerate Cap-
tain Stockton and his officers from the slightest
blame, and attribute the explosion entirely to
accident.—Am. papers.

European Intelligence.

From the New York Herald.

We have already announced that a regular and direct service of Post office packets was to be established between Marseilles, Malta, and Alexandria. The Director General of the Post office has just issued a formal notice of the fact, and stating that there are to be four steamers, viz: l'Egyptus, l'Osiris, le Caire, and l'Alexandrie, each of 220 horse power. The first packet starts this day from Marseilles, and there will be one from there on the 4th of every month. It will touch at Malta on the 7th, and arrive at Alexandria on the 12th. The voyage homeward will be effected in the same time. The packet will leave Alexandria on the 20th of each month, touch at Malta on the 24th, and arrive at Marseilles on the 28th. At Malta these packets will exchange letters and passengers with the line of packets of the Levant.

Paris, March 4.—The following Telegraphic despatch was received yesterday evening by the government:—

PERPESIAN, Feb. 29.—Queen Christina arrived yesterday evening at Figueras. She was received with great enthusiasm; a Te Deum was sung. Her Majesty was to leave this day for Girona.

The Chamber of Deputies was occupied yesterday with the discussion on the report lately presented by M. Allard, relative to certain petitions against the fortifications of Paris. The debate was adjourned to Saturday next.

The National and Gazette de France announces that the subscription for presenting a sword of honor to Admiral Dupetit Thouars is opened at their offices, and at those of all the independent journals. The maximum of each subscription is limited to 50 centimes.

Rear Admiral Leray, who returned to Toulon on the 20th ult., from the Levant station, is arrived in Paris. The Toulonnais states that his flag is to be shifted to the Audomere frigate.

We have received a file of the *Moniteur Algerien* to the 24th ult. inclusively. They contain accounts of the setting out of the spring expedition under the command of the Duke d'Aumale, and of some razzias on hostile tribes, which were effected without loss of life on the part of the French.

The *Universal German Gazette* states from Bonn, in Prussia, that an address of congratulation to Mr. O'Connell is getting up in several towns of Germany, and that the list of names are to be sent to Professor Walter, of Bonn, to be forwarded by him to Mr. O'Connell.

We read in a letter from Berlin, Feb. 25:—The house which Baron Alexander de Humboldt occupies at Berlin, and to which is attached a large garden filled with rare exotics, planted by M. de Humboldt, was sold to M. Roemiger, a Merchant, who immediately gave notice to the tenant to quit. This fact having come to the knowledge of M. Joseph Mendelssohn, the banker, who learned at the same time that M. de Humboldt would quit it with great regret, he repurchased the property from M. Roemiger, and wrote to Baron de Humboldt to say that it would remain at his service as long as he pleased. The Seine has overflowed a great part of the country between St. Cloud and Suresne. In one place the water appears like a vast lake, and covers an extent of three quarters of a league.

The official list of medical men and midwives of the department of the Seine has just been published, in conformity with the law of the 19th Venise. It is as follows:—Docteurs en médecine, 1048; docteurs en chirurgie, 27; officiers de santé, 153; midwives, 531.

We read in the *Courier Francais*:—The Ministry, filled with confidence by its 233 votes upon the last ballot, and wishing to take advantage of the favourable disposition of the Chamber, will, it is said, apply this week for a grant of 1,000,000fr. for service money. The Cabinet is completely treasured, and its leaders guarantee it a continued existence for several years. It cannot doubt of an increasing majority on all questions, after having such an inexplicable and unexpected majority on a question, in which the honor of our flag and the dignity of the nation was involved.

RUSSIA.

A letter from St. Petersburg of the 20th ult., in the *Berlin Gazette*, contains the following:—The chief of the frontier district near Kachta, has reported that at Macmedschin, a few versts distant from Kachta, the local Chinese authorities discovered two Chinese who were smoking opium, which they said had been supplied by Russians. The Chinese chiefs immediately opened negotiations with the Russian authorities on the frontier, and the Emperor of Russia having been informed of the fact, has ordered that the Chinese, published in 1841 against the sale of opium to the Chinese, shall be scrupulously enforced, and that all persons who may violate it shall be tried by a Court Martial. The same journal states that the inhabitants of Poland are now free to establish their residence in Russia on taking out passports and choosing for themselves within a delay of nine months the place at which they intend to reside permanently.

Gibraltar, March 5.

To-day we have a third version of the circumstances under which the Spanish Consul Agent at Madagan lost his life. He was, it is now said, in the country unaccompanied but armed; and, having reason to believe that some Moors he fell in with, were preparing to assault him, he fired and wounded one of them. For this, it is added, he was arrested and sentenced to death. An authentic account of the occurrence will probably be published before long, and we shall then know

which of the three versions we have mentioned is correct. In the meantime the Spaniards are highly incensed at what they consider a gross violation of the law of nations; and the periodical press loudly calls upon Government to resent the inflicted wrong; even to the length of going to war, if full satisfaction be not given by the Moorish Government. And war is likely to ensue, according to a remarkably well-informed Madrid correspondent, but not on account of the unfortunate agent's death. There is, says the letter, a more serious ground of complaint, the Moors having taken forcible possession of some land belonging to Spain in the neighbourhood of Ceuta, and having hitherto refused to listen to the remonstrances of her Government. Nay (the letter further states,) the latter having consulted the French conduct of the Moors was deemed so unwarrantable at the Tuilleries, that they not only advised the Spanish cabinet to an open rupture, but, on its stating that 20,000,000 fr. would be required to commence hostilities, which sum it had not, 30,000,000 were immediately offered for the purpose by the advisers.

The following is the summary of intelligence from the *Oceand Bombay Courier*. BOMBAY, Feb. 1.

The unexpected turn which affairs have taken in Gwalior, has this month almost wholly occupied public attention. Two— we might almost say three—battles have been fought and won, which, in character, are no way inferior to any that have taken place on Indian soil. Our Government—induced by the stubbornness and apparent preparation for resistance shown by the Gwalior Court—have adopted the only means at hand—that of a recourse to arms. The enemy were the first to commence hostilities, by firing on the baggage party under Col. Sleeman, of the 26th, and then on a reconnoitering party sent out on the 25th. The right wing of our army, under the immediate command of his Excy. Sir Hugh Gough, attacked the Maharras in their position of Maharras, while our left wing, under Major General Grey, did not at Panwar, and gained a complete victory over them. Our loss, however, on these occasions has been very severe—the list amounting to 141 killed and 866 wounded; that of the enemy amounts to between 4,000 and 5,000 killed and wounded, with the loss of 50 pieces of artillery. The following are the names of the officers who have fallen in these actions, or have since died of their wounds: viz.—General Churchill, Col. Saunders, Major Crommelin, Captains Stewart, Magrath, and Cobban, Lieut's Newton and Leath, and Ensign Bray, 40 have been wounded. The fort of Gwalior shortly after surrendered to us, and some of the principal chiefs came in and tendered submission.

Government has declared, that it is not our intention to occupy the country, nor in any shape to intermeddle with its internal affairs, further than to insist on the formation of a subsidiary force, to be officered solely by the Company's officers, and maintained by the Gwalior government. The army is expected to retire within our own territories immediately. The commander in chief has set out on a tour of inspection; while the Gov. Gen. was expected to start for Aulaha on the 23d. Affairs in the Punjab are still maturing, and may probably force themselves upon our attention, as unexpectedly as have those of Gwalior. In Scinde, matters are recovering from their sickness; at Hyderabad little improvement had been observed; but at Sukkur the condition of our men was much more favorable. India throughout is peaceful.

Persecution of the Jews in Lithuania. Warsaw, Jan. 22.

You will with difficulty credit the extent to which the Jews of this country by order of the government of his Majesty the Emperor Nicholas is extending. I shall, however, be brief in my reference to it.

An Imperial ukase has been received in Lithuania, directing the authorities of towns and other localities inhabited by Jews, to transport those unhappy persons, amounting to 36,000 families, to a distance of twelve leagues from their several actual places of residence. This cruel ukase was further to receive its execution before the 18th inst. so that, at a moderate estimate, 150,000 persons of both sexes, and of all ages and conditions, are at this moment, in the midst of all the rigors of a Lithuanian winter, expelled their houses and forced to seek a resting place in strange countries, and not merely among strangers, but among people predisposed to view them as outcasts, and objects for extortion, persecution, and violence.

Sacrificing a great principle in order to protect a suffering race, Europe interfered between the Greeks and their butchers. Here is a case for intervention not less urgent—Will the Christian Powers of Europe remain silent and inactive in the presence of such horrors?

Romish Conversions.—On Sunday, the 3d instant, seven persons who had been brought up in the doctrines and practices of the Romish faith, received the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in the Church of Moneymore, in this county, after the scriptural manner of the Established church. These were brought to the knowledge of the truth through the instrumentality of the Irish Scriptures, being teachers for some time back under that valuable Institution the Irish Society, and attending occasionally on the spiritual instructions of their pious and exemplary Superintendent, the Hon. and Rev. J. P. Hewitt; till at length, from the constant reading of God's blessed word, they were led to renounce the false dogmas and unscriptural tenets of that corrupt and degenerate Church in which they had been brought up from their infancy.—*London-derry Sentinel*.

First List of Donations to the Wesleyan Education Fund.—The first list of subscriptions to this fund, to promote the education of the children of the labouring classes, amounts to £6,000; which sum, observes the *Watchman*, is surely a very satisfactory first instalment of £20,000, which it is desired to raise at once, for the specific purpose to which we have adverted. It only remains that the numerous friends to Wesleyan Education who have not yet come forward, should imitate the example thus set them, and the result cannot fail to be gratifying and satisfactory. For the promotion of this great end, the sectional meetings already held have been found very advantageous; and we hope soon to hear of arrangements for others, as in no way can the case be brought forward more judiciously or efficaciously.—*Leeds Mercury*.

FROM MATANZAS.—We learn from Capt. Clark, of the schr. Pautuxet, which arrived last evening from Matanzas, 23d March, that the disaffection among the slaves is more general than was at first supposed. It is said that there are about 3000 slaves in iron in the different forts near Matanzas. Numbers are daily tried, and, if convicted, are immediately shot. A regiment of troops had just arrived from Havana, for the purpose of scouring the country.—[N.Y. Jour. of Commerce.]

TEXAS.—This country, which is a modern paradise, is now in a state of obeyance, awaiting the movements of our government. On the subject of annexation, one of the Texas papers, the *"Galveston News,"* says:—

We believe, should the project of annexation not be consummated soon, we shall be inclined to play the part of some others, and say Texas don't want annexation, no how and under no circumstances. The fact is, the prospects of the country are becoming every day more flattering. Within the past four or five days, no less than 25,000 foreign vessels have arrived, the most of them filled with emigrants. A day or two ago we announced the arrival of a brig from Antwerp, with one hundred and thirty-six emigrants; there is now another outside from Amsterdam with one hundred and fifty; and we learn that others are daily expected. The country is certainly going ahead, and could the difficulties which have hitherto existed be settled in some manner, so as to give a prospect of permanent peace, no doubt can be entertained of the immediate prosperity and rapid advancement of the country.

FROM PORTUGAL.—It appears, from the following paragraph from the New York Journal of Commerce, that there is trouble again in Portugal:—

We learn from Capt. Stevens, of the schr. Lyra, which left Oporto on the 8th of March, that that place was under martial law, and the mail had been stopped for two weeks. Some fighting had occurred in the country. It was reported that on the 7th of March an action took place between the insurgents and a body of the government troops, in which one of the Queen's Generals was killed.—An outbreak was daily expected at Oporto. It was reported also that the Ex-King, Don Miguel was in Portugal. This, we presume, was incorrect.

FISHING BOUNTIES.—A Bill, granting Bounties to Fishermen, has passed the Assembly and been sent to the Council for concurrence. The maximum of expenditure is £3000, and the distribution runs thus:—For vessels from 10 to 50 tons, 10s per ton; vessels from 50 to 100 tons, 12s 6d per ton; codfish, 1s per quintal; scale fish, 6d per do.; No. 1 mackerel, 1s 6d per barrel; No. 2, do. 1s; Herrings, 1s; Sardines, 2s.

We shall notice this Bounty more fully in our next.

The House of Assembly on the 9th inst. passed a grant of £200 towards the support of an Agricultural Journal, to be published by J. P. A. Phillips. Should the other branches of the Legislature concur in the appropriation, the paper will be commenced on the 1st of May.

A Resolution was passed by the House of Assembly on the 12th inst. protesting against any interference with its privileges; and au-

thorizing His Honor the Speaker to defend any suit that may be brought against the Speaker or Sergeant at Arms.

Our latest dates from Europe furnish nothing of very great importance. The dates from Bombay are down to the 1st February. Hostilities had broken out between the British and the Maharras. Three battles had been fought. The enemy were defeated, but our troops sustained severe loss—141 killed, 866 wounded! The Maharras had 6000 killed and wounded. After the defeat the fort of Gwalior surrendered to the British—and our troops were immediately to retire from the country.

BYE ROAD WARRANTS 1842.—A motion made by Mr. Fisher in the Assembly on the 11th inst. for an address to the Governor, praying that the Bye-road Warrants for 1841 may be issued; produced the declaration on the part of the Members of the government, that it is the determination of the Executive to issue them immediately upon the Loan being taken; which it is understood is about being done by the Bank of British North America.

NEW BUILDINGS are in course of erection in our principal Streets, giving employment to our Mechanics who have been so long out of employment—and some old houses are being removed, enlarged and improved, which makes quite a business like appearance.—Houses can be built at a very low figure labour and materials being so very cheap at present.

OUR STREETS.—We trust that the Commissioner appointed for this year—will look to the streets at the upper end of the Town, which have been neglected for some time, and are quite out of repair.

SEEDS.—The Agricultural Society have received their annual supply of Seeds, which are for Sale at Mr. Turner's Store.

An additional sum of £500 has been placed at the disposal of the Governor, making in all £1,000 to provide for the establishment of a lazaretto at Tracadie, and the maintenance of persons placed therein, having the Leptosis.

A grant has passed the Legislature, placing at the disposal of the Government the sum of £500 for the purpose of appointing three or four Inspectors of Common Schools, who are to examine and report on the State of those institutions in this Province—the School act expires next year.

Distinguished Visitors.—We have pleasure in announcing to our numerous readers the arrival of the illustrious family of the Gaspereux. Their aquatic peregrinations are more than usually early this season.—*St. John Herald*.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

The House in Committee on the Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, passed among the following Resolutions:—

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Parish of St. Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, from the great extent of its manufacture of sawed Lumber, its Trade and Shipping, which makes it an important Shipping Port in the Province, has a just claim to the privileges of a Free Port and Warehousing Port, and that the Lodge, as called, in the said Parish of St. Stephen, should be included within the Port of St. Stephen; and further

Resolved, That the Port of Dorchester, in the opinion of this Committee, is fully entitled, from its particular situation, to the privileges of a Free Port.

SUGAR STRICKS.—Mr. John McDougall, Grocer, of this city, upon opening a hoghead of sugar last week, discovered in the centre 65 lbs. of cord wood, evidently of Nova Scotia growth. The mystery is—how did it get there, and for what purpose? We know that mackerel sent to the United States from hence, have turned to stone on the passage, the petrification assuming all the mineral quality of the granite or pebbles of the port at which they were packed—but that a hoghead filled with sugar in the West Indies, should upon being opened here, present in its centre a wood indigenous to this Province, is one of those freaks of Nature for which we can account on no principles of sympathy or mutual affinity. Query—May the sticks would turn to sugar barley or black rock on the passage, and not with any intention of defrauding the purchaser, have placed them in the position in which they were found?—*Halifax Times*.
