MAXWELL SMITH'S ADVICE TO FRUIT

TWELVE VARIETIES THAT HE BE-

In a circular letter just issued Maxwell Smith, dominion fruit inspector, says; I am so frequently asked what varieties of apples I should advice planting in the Okanagan valley and other districts in British Columbia having similar climatic and soil conditions, that I have prepared and soil conditions, that I have prepared the following list, and while there are, of course, a number of other good varieties, I can with a reasonable degree of confi-dence, recommend the following as money makers:

tosh Red, Gravenstein, Cox's Orange Pippin, Fameuse, Northern Spy, Esopus Spitzenburgh, Jonathan, Delicious, Stayman zenburgh, Jonathan, Delicious, Stayman Winesap, Yellow Newton Pippin.

Winesap, Yellow Newton Pippin.
Of these twelve, eight are highly colored varieties of rare beauty, viz., Duchess of Oldenburgh, Wealthy, McIntosh Red, Fameuse, Esopus Spitzenburgh, Jonathan, Delicious and Stayman Winesap, but the other four, viz., Gravenstein, Cox's Orange Pippin, Northern Spy, and Yellow Newton Pippin, possess such excellent qualities Pippin, possess such excellent qualities and are so well known in the markets of the world, that I hardly think we can af-ford to leave them out of the list. I keeping qualities of these 12 yarfeties, are fairly well indicated by the order in which they are named; beginning with the Duchess of Oldenburgh, which does not successfully longer than the end of ber and ending with the Yello Newton Pippin, which, under proper conditions may be kept over until May.

There are four of these varieties, viz., Cox's Orange Pippin, Esopus Spitzenburgh, Cox s orange rippin, and Yellow Newton Stayman Winesap, and Yellow Newton Pippin, concerning which particular care should be exercised to give the proper name when ordering, as there are other in-ferior varieties bearing similar names; that is to say, there are Orange Pippins, uitzenburghs, Winesaps and Newton Pippins, which are of very inferior quality to the Cox Orange Pippin, the Esopus Spit-zenburgh, Etayman Winesap and Tellow Newton Pippin.
While I submit the names of 12 varieties

I should not advise any one grower to plant more than four of these and for con-wemence I should recommend dividing them into three groups, about as follows: Group 1-Stayman Winesap, Jonathan, Wealthy and Duchess of Oldenburgh. Group 2—Delicious, Esopus Spitzenburgh,

Fameuse, McIntosh Red, Group 3—Yellow Newton Pippin, Northern Spy, Gravenstein, Cox's Orange Pippin.
In planting an orchard I should strongly advise against planting a large block of any one variety. The reason for this is the advisability of getting different varie-ties in close proximity so as to render effectual the operation of interpollination by the action of wind and honey gathering

Splendid Showing Made in First Half of Year by Mines of Boundary

Tonnage Nearly Fifty Per Cent Greater Than for Sam: Period of 1905--Estimated Value of Output Over \$3,000,000

(Special to The Daily News) Phoenix, July 13:—Figures showing the approximate ore tonnage of the mines of the Boundary for the first six nonuns of 1906 have been made up showing that the big mines of Boundary have sent out 653,526 tons of ore in the half year ending June 30. During the first haif of the year 1905, the record for the same properties was 458,193 tons. Therefore the increase over the corresponding period of last year has

been nearly 50 per cent.

The value of ore shipped is not easy to ascertain, as the mine and smelter officials will not make this public as yet. However, with the good price of metals, and figuring at a low average of \$5 a ton, the value of Boundary's out ut thus far this year has been over \$3,000,000 which is also about 50 per cent more than for the first six months of 1905. The present rate of ore shipping is at the rate of 1,250,000 tons per annum, with the certainty of this rate being increased inside of two or three months, when enlargements at the three district smelters are completed.

Herewith is given a table, showing the tonnage output of Boundary mines for 1905 and for 1906, by months, for the first six months of each year, for pur-poses of comparison:

Bills Pass Chamber of Deputies After Scene of Strife

Albert Dreyfus Has Now Been Fully Vindicated--Real Blood-letting Duel Arises Out of Controversy

Paris. June 13 .-- The scene of tumult which marked the enactment today of the law restoring Arfred Dreyfus to the army was followed by a bloody duel tonight in which under secretary of state assumed the aspect of a veritable com-bat between the government and the opposition, as M. Sarraut's seconds were ministers Clemenceau and Thomson, while M. Puglisi-Contr's seconds were M. Millevove and general Jacquet, who were drawn from the elements which bitterly resisted Dreyfus' rehabilitation. The meeting followed a fight on the floor of the chamber of deputies, in which M. Sarraut sprang from beside minister of the interior Clemenceau, sitting on the ministerial benches, at M. Puglisi-Conti, who had been heap-

m. Pugnisi-Cont. who had been neaping denuaciation on the members of the government as scoundrels. Sarraut struck Puglisi-Conti a stunning blow in the face. A secene of uproar ensued, compelling the suspension of the session. It was after the close of the session that the duel occurred. sion that the duel occurred. Later reports show that M. Sarraut is suffering from a deep wound in the right breast penetrating the lung. While the wound is considered to be serious it is not necessarily dangerous.

Laws finally were enacted today by the chamber of deputies reinstating Dreyfus, who obtains the rank of a chief of squadron of artillery, and Picquart,
who is made a brigadier general. Both
houses were overwhelmingly favorable
to the bills.

The chamber of deputies met this

morning for the purpose of hastening the parliamentary procedure, and war minister Etienne immediately presented two government bills, one raising captain Dreyfus to the rank of major of artillery and another promoting colonel. Picquart to that of brigadier general. M. Etienne asked for speedy action, adding that it was the government's intention to inscribe Dreyfus' name on the list of candidates for the cross of the legion of honor. This announcement brought out a storm of applause.

The preamble to the Picquart bill, said: "The preamble of the restoration of Dreyfus demonstrates the ligitimacy of Picquart's loyal and courageous efforts for the triumph of truth at the risk of definitely breaking his career. We demand that parliament expunge the effects of his action by the conferment of the rank of brigadier.

The army committee quickly and unanimously reported the bill and the decision in the chamber of deputies was decisive, Dreyfus securing 473 votes against 42, and Picquart 467 votes against 27. After the scene which compelled the suspension of the session, the deliberations were resumed, the mem-bers having become more calm.

After the premier had announced that the government would take the necessary measures to deal with the ofnecessary measures to dear with the differs who had been witnesses against Dreyfus a motion was passed expressing confidence in the government.

PRIESTHOOD AND NOBILITY OP-PRESS RUSSIAN PEOPLE

CONDITIONS SIMILAR TO THOSE IN FRANCE BEFORE 1789.

St. Petersburg, July 11.—Like Russia now, France more than one hundred years ago supported a great body of nobility and a priesthood, taxes paid by the masses were high, wages were ex-ceedingly low, and the common people ment.
There were 23,000 monks in France,

60,000 curates and vicars, 37,000 nuns, 2500 monastaries, 1500 convents, and 60,000 churches and chapels. In all there were 130,000 persons in the re-ligious establishments of France, Like the great religious dead weight now the great religious dead weight now born by the Russian people, this vast body contributed nothing toward the welvare and prosperity of France. There were also 140,000 nobles in France, while the noble families num-

bered 30,000. On each square league of territory and for each 1000 inhabitants there was one castle and one noble family. Almost precisely similar conditions now prevail in Russia, where the great mass of landed proprietors hangs like a dead weight on the country.

Just as in Russia today the vast bulk of valuable land is entirely in the hands of the noble and existingstick.

hands of the noble and aristocratic classes, so in France three-fifths of the real estate of the kingdom was held by privileged orders, and, furthermore, these three-fifths were by far the richest and most valuable of all.

Corruption and graft were prevalent throughout France, favorites of the queen and privileged officials taking enormous sums from the funds which should have gone to alleviate the suffer-ings of the poor. As in Russia, the deadweight of the nobility, the priesthood, the sovereign, and his court con-stituted a burden which at length

stituted a burden which at length drove the people to frenzy.

The ignorance of the French peasant class was almost unequalled, but travelers who have studied the conditions of the masses in Russia believe that the ignorance of the Russian peasant of today is fully as great. Immorality, wastefulness, extravagance, and tyranny of the noble class in France has perhaps never been paralleled except by the Russian aristocracy. The element of immorality and the fact that the institutions of the family and the home had lost their inviolability were among the most important causes of the down-

stitutions of the family and the home had lost their inviolability were among the most important causes of the downfall of the ancient institutions and political structure in France.

Beginning with futile appeals to the sovereign for aid and for the amelioration of their condition, the people of France quickly progressed to open defiance of king and government. The army, like that of the czar, early showed unmistakable signs of siding with the people, and in the end the old institutions of France were swept away and Louis XVI, and Marie Antoinette, his queen, gave their lives.

Napoleon, swept in on the tide of revoit and posing as the champion of the people, eventually attained supreme power in France, and by his superiative military genius made himself not only ruler of the French but seemed for a time to be destined to extend his way throughout Europe.

Will the destiny of France be that of Russia, and will the ultimate result in the land of the czar be the complete overthrow of the government and the establishment of a republic such as that which followed the downfall of the ancient institutions in France?

Time alone will show whether the course of events in Russia will continue to run parallel to those which occurred a century ago in France. Thus far the similarity between conditions seems to have been proved beyond a doubt, and there are many careful observers of events who believe that the final result will also be similar.
