Gladstone on Irish Affairs.

EDINBURGH, Oct. 22.—Mr. Gladstone addressed 5,000 persons in the Corn Exchange last evening. Ireland, he said, continued to eclipse all other subjects. The country now fully recognized that the Irish questions must be settled before others. The opponents of home rule had hoodwinked and defuded their constituencies by pledging themselves against coercion, promising local government and expressing themselves against granting large advances of British money to buy out landlords. Yet their first favorite measure after gaining power was coercion. Local government was vanishing in thin air, and there was a proposal before Parliament granting £40,000,000 to buy out the landlords. The Conservatives took credit. Decide to Abolish Their Secret Oath-Military and Naval Companies to be Formed.

New York, Oct. 22.—The bi-annual convention of the Fenian Brotherhood closed at Paterson, N. J., last night. More than 200 delegates were present representing all sections of the United States. The most important action of the convention was the unanimous indorsement of a recommendation of the general secretary abolishing the secret oath of the organization. Hereafter all the transactions of the robitherhood will be open and the public will be free to attend all meetings.

In his report, the general secretary attributed the disruptions and disasters to the Irish organizations during the past two years to the fact that men with selfish and personal ends to attain had, through the misuse of the secrecy clause in the constitution, forced themselves into power.

A special committee was appointed on the future of the organization, and in their report recommended that the Fenian Brotherhood hereafter be an open organization and that military and naval companies he organized and 90 per cent. of the receipts be devoted to this purpose. The companies are to be known as the Fenian volunteers, and will be hold in readiness to assist the United States in case of foreign war.




