DR. KOCH'S "TUBERCULIN." M.P., Prof. Ramsay Wright was sent to Berlin as a special delegate from the University of Ontario to study the new treatment for consumption brought out by Dr. Koch. Prof. Wright has just returned, bearing with him all that probably will be known about the composition of the lymph until such time as its discoverer makes public its composition to the medical world. That Koch has promised to do as soon as he has obtained a pure cultivation of the principal substance, which he hopes

to achieve in a few weeks. The excitement over the discovery, Prof. Wright says, has abated considerably in Germany, as has certainly been the case or this continent. Scientists, however, are following the advice of the professor, and are prescuting their researches along the same line with untiring energy. While Prof. Koch is still sanguine he believes that the bad results have been due largely to the injudicious application of the treatment and the injudicious selection f cases. Before Prof. Wright left Berlin shown some of the purified with which Prof. Koch was making his first experiments. The dis-toverer has never revealed the secret of his first lymph; but several people believe that the imitations they have pro-

duced are practically the same; and all these are evaporated beef tea cultures of tubercle bacilli. Dr. Koch himself says he has no doubt that these do give the same results, although he has never ac knowledged that his is made in the same way. Prof. Koch further stated: "There are evidently several different ways in which the active material can be got out of the tubercle bacilli and I don't know that my way is the best. I prefer, therefore, for the present that other bacteriologists should go on experimenting so that they may perhaps find a better way than I have." Prof. Wright made numerous animal experiments both with Koch's lymph and imitations and some of these gave very

favorable results. Dr. A. Jacobi, of New York, who has also been studying the subject, agrees with Professor Wright that the remedy has not yet reached its, full fruition, and that it must be applied with care. Dr. Jacobi further asserts his belief that the future successful treatment of pulmonary tuber culosis will be a "combination of climatic cures with the careful and persistent use of

It is because of the great variety of after effects that Dr. Jacobi recommends ex treme caution and small doses. In the 60 selected cases covering all phases of the disease which form the basis of his report he finds that upon joint and bone tuber culosis this remedy had slight effect; in cutaneous tuberculosis the improvemen was marked, while tubercular meningitis and peritonitis were not affected. Of the 16 pulmonary cases treated "I died, 4 were not improved, 5 were im proved, 4 were much improved and 2 recovered." This in the opinion of Dr. Jacobi is a great advance upon the results that follow the customary careful treat-ment of patients without the use of tuberculin. In the reports from 55 German hospitals 1,061 cases were under treat nent; of these 13 had been cured, 171 considerably improved, 194 improved, 586 not improved and 46 had died. This is sufficient to prove that the popular anticipations of wonderful results from the us of Dr. Koch's remedy have been realized to a reasonable extent. 
