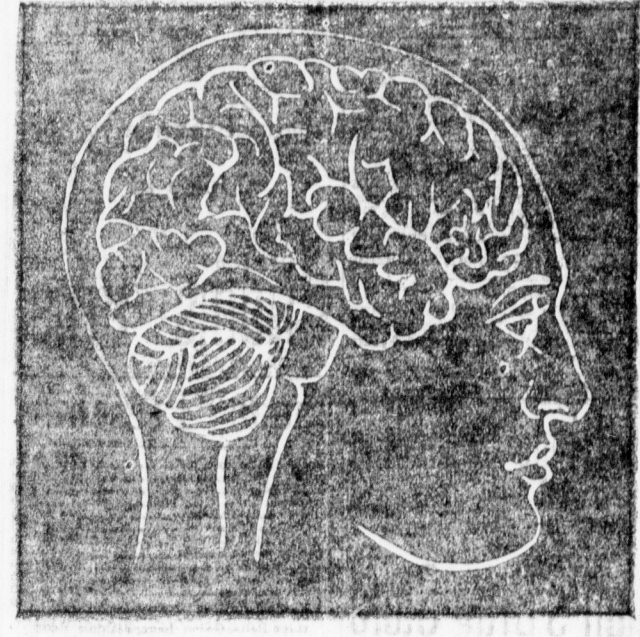

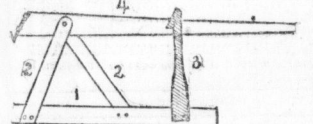
PURE CIDER VINEGAR.

By pure cider vinegar is meant just what the words imply, cider converted into vinegar without the addition of sugar...

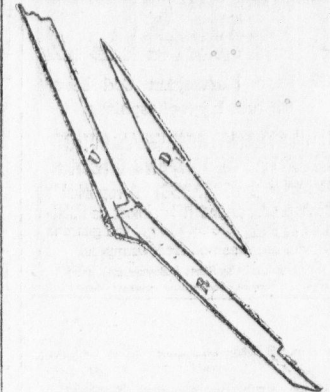

FRAMING RAFTERS ON A BARN.

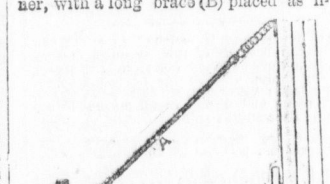

THE DAIRY

IN A DANISH CREAMERY.

How Dairywomen in Denmark Manage the Co-operative Butter Factory. The executive committee visit the dairy constantly, keep the manager up to his work, test the quality and quantity of the butter...

Upon the manager's fitness for his work depends the success of the dairy. His position is a most difficult one. Not only must he superintend the making of the butter, but he must keep a close watch on the proceedings of the members of the society.

The dairy officials collect the milk from the various farms, weigh it—the Danes have no faith in measuring—test it and hand it over to the butter makers, who have been specially trained for their work.

The farmers are paid monthly, at a rate fixed by the executive committee, for the milk they send to the dairy, and they are required to buy back from the dairy, also at a fixed rate, a certain quantity of separated milk or churn milk cheese.

As soon as the dairy has cleared itself an inventory of the society's assets is made, and their value is divided into shares, which are allotted to the members in proportion to the quantity of milk they have supplied since the opening of the dairy.

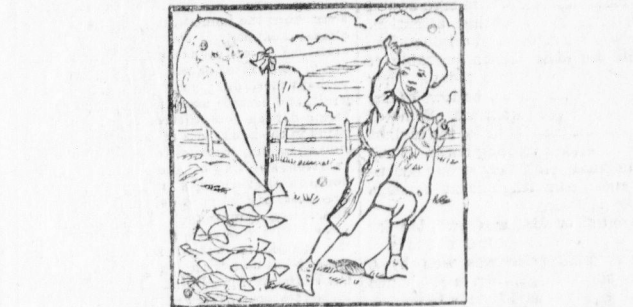

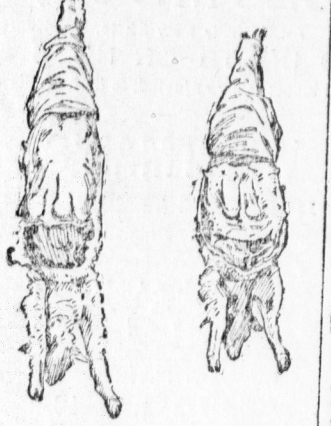

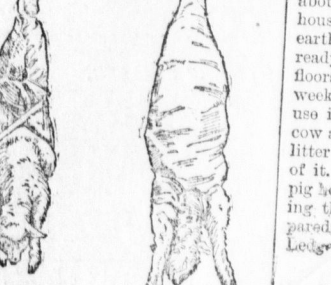

PROF. JOHN TYNDALL

SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF ENGLAND'S GREAT SCIENTIST.

Long Life Devoted Entirely to Penetrating Nature's Great Secrets—What the World Owe to Him—Details of Some Things He Accomplished.

John Tyndall, in some respects the most able of modern British physicists, and the first to give an overture of chloral, was born of English ancestry at Leighlin Bridge, county Carlow, Ireland, August 21, 1820.

Some autobiographical passages found in one of his essays published early in 1879 give interesting reminiscences of the strictly religious education which he received in his early familiarity with the Bible and the workings of his mind, which found great difficulty in accepting the Calvinistic scheme of theology. He was repelled by his parents for the ministry, and a strong natural inclination toward mathematics and natural science.

He easily mastered a complete course of mathematics, and at the age of eighteen obtained employment as "civil assistant" in the office of a surveyor.

Notwithstanding the alarm which Charles E. Boyer, the most notable being in general, it is conceded that Professor Tyndall was a man of deep religious and moral instincts, and the opposition to his views has been much moderated during these later years.

Professor Tyndall's last prominent appearance before the public was in the early part of 1890, when a heated correspondence on political subjects took place between him and Sir W. Harcourt.

Professor Tyndall was married February 29, 1876, to Louisa Claud Hamilton, eldest daughter of Lord and Lady Claud Hamilton.
