He first officially acquainted them with the intention of Thomas Robinson & Sons, of West Hartlepool, England, to establish an egg and provision business in the city. Then he spoke of the car shops matter, and said that from what the Grand Trunk visitors said there seemed to be no question whatever about the car shops going on, and that immediately.

The capacity of he warehouse will be 500,000 cubic eet, building and plant to cost beween \$100,000 and \$125,000, and work commence within three months afer the passage of the necessary bylaw. The number of hands to be employed will be from 12 to 20, accord-

The concessions asked for are as 1. Total exemption from taxation. 2. Exclusive permission to lay an ammonia pipe under the streets for

conveying their refrigerant to packing houses and other establishments requiring refrigeration. 3. The right to convey water from the river Thames to the warehouse by means of a pipe laid under the streets, the city to lay the pipe free of expense to the company, except the actual cost of the pipe itself. This would be only necessary should the water pipe now used and controlled by the Grand Trunk Railway not be found available or sufficient for the requirements of the company.

4. Permission to make switching connection, and to operate same under arrangement with the London Street Railway Company.





Roasted to a Crisp, She Died With Uplifted Hands.

Gasoline Stove Had Exploded-Her Employer Nearly Burned to Death in an Effort to Save Her Servant.

Plainfield, N. J., June 30.-Mrs. Gertrude Peterson keeps a boarding-house at No. 623 Lagrande avenue, this city. She and her servant, Alice Morcom, were preparing breakfast at 7 o'clock yesterday morning. Mrs. Peterson was in the dining room. Alice Morcom had gone to the summer kitchen, outside was a loud explosion in the kitchen, and Alice rushed, shrieking, into the dining room enveloped in flames from head to foot a living torch. Uttering piercing screams, the girl ran by Mrs. Peterson into the sitting room and ran wildly around that room. The fire that was consuming her jumped to the curains and the inflammable hangings. Mrs. Peterson ran to the girl's aid and tried to tear her clothes from her. But her own dress caught fire, and she ran into the front hall. The woman's shrieks aroused her daughter and the boarders. They ran down stairs, carrying quilts and blankets. In her agony Mrs. Peterson rushed out of the front door to the lawn. There she was wrapped in the blankets and the flames were smothered. Euout of bed, threw on a dressing gown and ran to Mrs. Peterson. Reaching her side he tore off the dressing gown and helped to put out the fire in her clothes

In the excitement no one thought of Alice Morcom, until Mrs. Peterson, although writhing in pain, gasped "Go help Alice." The girl was found dead in a corner of the sitting room. burned to a crisp. The carpet under her body was burning when they found her. Her hands were uplifted as if her last utterance had been a prayer. She was but 15 years old. Mrs. Peterson was taken to the hospital. Her recovery is doubtful.

The fire in the sitting room was quickly put out. Investigation showed that Alice, after lighting the burners, had started to fill the seeve with gasoline. The cap was off the reservoir and a funnel was in it. The flame had communicated to the can of gasoline and it exploded.
