At an early hour this morning William R. Hearst left his headquarters in the Hoffman House for his residence, following a conference with his campaign managers and the heads of the Municipal League Ownership ticket, Mr. Hearst himself would make no statement, and referred all questioners to Max F. Ihmsen. The latter said that Mr. Hearst claimed his election as mayor by a good majority. That a fraudulent vote of at least 40,000 had been cast in Greater New York was the claim of the Hearst manager. He had decided, Mr. Ihmsen said, to demand a recount of the entire ticket, if after the 194 missing ballot boxes had been located and counted, it was found Mr. Hearst still lacked sufficient votes to elect him.

"It must have been that these boxes contained many Hearst votes," Mr. Murphy Is Mum. Ihmsen declared, "otherwise they would not be missing. Hearst Voters Slugged.

New York, Nov. 8. - Election day came to a close with a dramatic scene at the Hoffman House, where Wm. R. Hearst gathered his friends and advisers around him to begin the preparation of his legal contest over the returns, which indicated the success of his Democratic opponent, George B. McClellan. RADIUM ORE IN CALIFORNIA

Samples Displayed by Prospector at State Mining Bureau.

San Francisco, Nov. 8. - a deposit of uranium, or radium ore, has been found in Kern County by H. C. Jones, who exhibited specimens of the ore today at the State Mining Bureau. Mr. Jones declines to give the exact location, as it is on private property.

The samples were of uranite, carnotite, black oxide, and pitchblende, all of which contain salts of uranium rich in radium. This is the first deposit of this ore found in California, and the second in the United States, others being in Gilpin County, Colorado.

THE GERMAN ARMY.

[From the Montreal Witness.]

So much has been written by foreign critics of the faults and short-comings of the British army that it is a relief to learn from similar sources that the armies of other nations are not any better. Recently a German military writer gave out the deliberate opinion that the army of the United States was "rotten throughout and lacking in the essentials of an effective fighting mechanic." fighting machine." Our neighbors were naturally indignant, and not only resented the charge, but turned their inkpot guns on the German army. While admitting its perfection of organization, they find its system of tactics, as shown in recent maneuvers, stupidly antiquated and utterly unfitted to meet the requirements of modern warfare. With gleeful satisfaction the United States press reproduces the comments on the German army. tion the United States press reproduces the comments on the German army of a correspondent of the London Spectator, who was present at the autumn maneuvers along the Rhine. This observed was amazed to see the oldfashioned plan of moving troops in masses of close formation within the firing zone carried out with spectacular precision. Infantry advancing eight deep, with support easily within effective artillery range, battalions chargwith bands playing and colors flying; cavalry in squadrons galloping about under close infantry fire; Itiliery retiring in a manner impossible in actual battle; generals, attended by numerous brilliant staffs, riding gently to and fro in the deadliest zones, presenting a martial picture indeed, but a bandlessly but interface of the realities of the modern battlefield. From hopelessly bad imitation of the realities of the modern battlefield. From all this it would appear that the Germans have learned nothing from the wars in South Africa and Manchuria. If pitted against a nation which had learned the lessons of those wars, the German army would be badly worsted. But bad as this outward showing is, the internal condition is worse still. The Spectator correspondent found that the officers do not trust the men. They despair of turning them into soldiers, so they turn them into automatons instead. The object of their drill and iron discipline is to hammer into a man during peace-time, not intelligence or fighting instincts, but habits of unreasoning obedience, in the hope that these habits will become a second nature to him, and in battle prove stronger than fear. Under such a system close formation is a necessity. The automatons must be kept together, for they have no personal initiative and become bewildered when out of touch with their accustomed commander. It is furthermore charged by other critics that the German officers, as a class, have degenerated, have become self-indulgent, and are given to swaggering, drinking, gambling and lewdness. The picture is gloomy and may be overdrawn, but it is a question whether the erroneous discipline is not in a measure inseparable from an impressed army his career as clerk in a cigar store and whether the tendency of armies maintained in peace time is not necessarily towards demoralization.




