The small farmers found an abundant market for their vegetables and other produce, not only with the vessels detained in harbor by easterly winds, but with the fleets always cruising off Brest and "The Gib." as our rock fortress at the mouth of the Mediterranean was fa-

Then came the peace and commercial collapse, partly redeemed from Still in the days of sailing ships an east wind always filled the pretty little roads, and undauted enterprise also made Sicily a ship-owning and shipbuilding port. Besides, the cultivation of early potatoes for the London market brought a new affluence to the farmers, who invested their savings in island-owned ships. He then went on to say that he believed this to be the great age for young men, and that in saying this he was remembering, with all deference, the young men who had reached the ninety-nine year

Mr. Sing then spoke at some length of the opinion which most Occidental people have of the people of the Orient. He said the general opinion has been that the people of the far east are of a conservative, unaggressive character; but he wished to present a different picture of the Orient, which has undergone great changes since forty years ago, when it may have been deserving of such comments as those made by Occidental writers.
