WILL MAKE NO RECOMMENDATION Mayor Stevely Makes Appointments CASES SET FOR MR. MOORE ON WATER SCHEMES

Estimates of the Cost of High Pressure and Filtration Will Be Submitted—Engineer Denies Statements Credited To Him-High Pressure Cheaper.

"I never made the statements credited to me regarding the two schemes for increasing the water supply." said Engineer John M. Moore, of the water works department, this morning.

"There was nothing discussed at the meeting yesterday afternoon regarding the increasing of the water supply. The figures given in the Free Press must have been taken out of some former report." Mr. Moore was at the meeting yesterday afternoon, but, as stated, the

matter of increasing the present water supply was not brought up. It was pointed out that Mr. Moore was alleged to have stated that the cost of the Chipman scheme was \$425,000, whereas in actual fact Engineer Chipman stated it would cost but \$300,000.

NO RECOMMENDATION.

"I have made no statement regarding the matter at all," Mr. Moore an-

"Are you going to make any recommendation as to which scheme is the better?" was asked.

"I am not," he answered. "I am just going to submit a report as to what the schemes mean with the cost."

What are your figures for the cost of the schemes?" was ventured. "The Maury scheme, \$369,000; the high-pressure scheme, \$350,000," he replied. "In either case there will be the expenditure of \$75,000 for new mains in the

LEGISLATION FOR CHILD LABOR

Provisions for the More Strict Enforcement of Existing

Regulations.

Toronto, Feb. 12.-Proposals will be submitted shortly to the Legislature having for their object the stricter supervision of child labor in the Province. During the last session a special committee of the House was appointed to inquire into this very important matter, and the report brought in by them recommended some very radical changes in the law. At the present time child labor is used to some considerable extent in canning factories, and in some of the glass works of the Province boys are employed after school hours, the regulations already in existence setting forth under what conditions this class of labor may be employed. The committee, however, considered that with the demand for child labor increasing, the law controlling it should be strengthened, and brought in recomnendations accordingly.

The legislation which will be laid before the House will not by any means go so far as the committee indicated as being, in their opinion, desirable; in fact, no radical change is to be expected. Berlin, Feb. 12. - The Japanese method of wrestling, jiu-jitsu, is to be introduced into all the military and Lord Justice Cockburn, after a long naval gymnasia of Germany at the express command of the Emperor.

His majesty has directed all officers going through a course of gymnastic instruction at the central gymnasia to acquire a thorough acquaintance with the rules of jiu-jitsu, mores especially those connected with defense against unexpected attacks.

The officers after obtaining their certificates of proficiency, will be detailed to the gymnasia of the various local garrisons throughout the empire, at which they will impart a knowledge of the method to the recruits as soon as they join each

It is stated that during an unofficial visit by the Emperor to the Japanese flagship, which was anchored in the roads in the course of Kiel week last year, the Japanese admiral arranged a series of jiu-jitsu bouts among the crew for his majesty's diversion

The Emperor, it is said, was so impressed by the utility of the method as a means of defense that he shortly afterwards conferred with the director of military gymnasia, with the result that orders have been given to introduce the system into the army and navy as quickly as instructors can be provided.


