

### **AIRSHIPS WILL RULE** SAYS COUNT ZEPPELIN

### Good for Anything, From War to Chasing Recreant Wife, German Contends.

Hamburg, Germany, March 15 .-"Perhaps you think I am exaggerating the possibilities of my airships," said Count Zeppelin, who is here, discussing the future of his monster dirigibles. The aged count is full of enthusiasm and confidences. He drew a stirring picture of the days that are shortly coming when wonderful journeys at speeds now unknown will be made through the air and his ships will be made to serve purposes as yet almost inconceivable. He laughed as he said:

"What think you of husbands, deserted on the continent, pursuing their errant wives in airships to London and getting there five hours, before the runaways, travelling by train and steamer? Oh, that will be easily possible. Still, if you think I am drawing the long bow you can only agree with most of my critics and with the imperial authorities who will not believe what they have not yet seen. But I know. Great things are coming!

Norway-London Line Planned At this moment Hamburg and the whole north coast are greatly excited over the prospect of an airship service to Norway and London. The rest of Germany is skeptical about even this. It is generally assumed that the demand for a huge airship harbor at Hamburg is really connected with the Government's naval plans.

Count Zeppelin is out of touch with the German Government just now, intrigues having set aside his rigid form of airship in favor of another type. He would say nothing about the Hamburg plan except that the trips are perfectly feasible.

There is no element of danger nowadays," declared Count Zeppelin. "Airship travelling is not a sport. There is not risk enough in it for that. In the next naval war there is no question that big airships will prove ideal blockade runners. To stop them will be impossible. They will be very effective in delaying the movements of hostile war vessels. 

### SCHOOL TRUSTEES SPRANG SURPRISE

Only Ask the Council for \$283 More Than the Estimates of 1909.

Collegiate Fees Grow Handsomely and Wipe Out the Deficit of Last Year - Figures Presented Yesterday.

The board of education sprang an agreeable surprise yesterday afternoor when they handed down their estimates for the year.

Contrary to all expectations, they ara but little higher than last year. be accurate there is an advance of only This is the case in spite of the fact that an overdraft of \$2,332 73 is saddled onto the board because the

finance committee last year would not sanction the sum which was estimated for the manual training.

The total asked for this year \$199,575 45, as compared with \$199,-291 57 in 1909. The public schools require \$164,396 63.

Increase in Receipts.

The saving is due to the increase in the receipts. A good agreement was made with the county in 1908, and instead of only deriving \$1,650, as estimated from county pupils fees, the sum of \$5,442 was received, thus endanged.

A banquet was held after lodge adabling the collegiate institute to finish \$4.399 29 ahead of its expenditure. The sum of \$5,400 is estimated for this year, and this materially helps. The reorganization of the kindergarten assisted considerably.




