Rome, June 28.—The volcano of Stromboli, situated on the island of the same name, off the northern coast of Sicily, has burst into activity. The eruption began with a violent ex-plosion, which was heard far from the island, and the people are abandoning their homes and fleeing to Sicily.

Stromboli is a volcano which s remarkable for its activity, having been in eruption for the better part of the last 2,000 years. The most violent outbreaks in recent years occurred in 1902 and in 1905. In 1915 a new crater was formed, and there was great alarm among the people of the island, but there were not many casualties. 





If there is anyone who can by argument, eloquence and experience and example persuade the Sinn Fein leaders to a compromise it is Smuts. Here is at any rate wishing him well, in order that martial law and relentless suppression of disorder may not be necessary in Ireland.

DURANTE ALIAS DANTE.

A great celebration of the 600th anniversary of Dante's death is in preparation for September of this year among scholars, poets and book lovers of many nations. It is curious that the poet's name was an abrreviation of Durante, which seems to mean Lasting. There is something in a name here.

A parallel to the shortening of Durante to Dante may be found in "Burns," so written by the Scottish poet himself for the former well-known family spelling of Burness. Many English names, such as Cholmondeley, Wriothesley, Worcester, Auchinleck, have been cut down in pronunciation, while the spelling remains unchanged like some grand old fossil. It is amusing that English people sometimes further shorten Dante by pronouncing in one syllable, disregarding the final e, and you will even hear poor Goethe called Geeth, to rime with teeth. Geeth, Dant and Milt suit our monosyllabic genius. But everlasting Durante cut himself down to Dante, called his Beatrice Bice for short, and made his friends Brunetto and Giovanni into Betto and Gianni. This makes him seem less grim.



JUST BETWEEN US

There'll be thousands of Canadians boosting strongly for Georges Carpentier separate Jack Dempsey, on July 2, as far from his title as he was from patriotic endeavor during the war. Not so much because Georges is French as ecause his early ring career is all bound up with that part of France, Canadians know best, and which saw them in their most hopeful moods and their highest achievements-the region of the Pas De Calais. Georges' first championship was the title of Bethune, a town which spelled to thousands of Canadians from the end of 1915 to the end of 1918, a slight reprieve from the uncertainty indescribable of the line, a few miles away to the east. It seemed like Parts, Monte Carlo and Blighty all rolled into one, to the mud-stained or dust-laden Canadian lads, who managed a journey there from nearby billets. "Omelettes and 'am," and if M'sieur was thirsty, some "ving blank" for le bon Can-yan soldat." Even Collette, attired in the inevitable black, with a gaudy touch of color here and there, and in her cheeks; with the bright eyes that learned to laugh to the accompaniment of "C'est le guerre," appeared as a vision of the last word in dainty femininity, and brought laugh lines to corners of eyes and mouths which were unconscicusly drawn from seeing and hearing too much "up there."
