

BRITISH MINERS ARE RETURNING TO WORK

MINERS RETURN TO WORK ON MONDAY IN THE BRITISH PITS

Strike Which Commenced On April 1 Is Settled—The British Government Will Authorize Grant of Ten Million Pounds—Parliamentary Vote On Subsidy Only a Formality.

London, June 28.—The British coal miners' strike, which has been in progress since April 1, has been settled, it was officially announced this afternoon.

It is understood that Mr. Lloyd George will ask Parliament this afternoon to authorize the granting of £10,000,000 subsidy to the mining industry.

The general understanding is that the submission of the subsidy to Parliament is a mere formality, and that the grant will be voted.

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TORONTO MAN WILL SUCCEED COL. FISHER

Son of George Ross, Superintendent of Railway Mail Service.

Although nothing official was announced today relative to the sweeping changes to occur at the local postoffice and in the railway mail service on July 1, it has been intimated from a reliable source that Col. Charles E. H. Fisher, who relinquishes his duties as postoffice inspector on that date, will be succeeded by a son of George Ross, the superintendent of railway mail service.

Severe criticism is noted in every quarter, including, naturally, the mail service itself, relative to the proposal to bring in an outside man and place him over the heads of a number of capable London men who have been in the service for a great number of years.

With more than 40 years to his credit, Mr. Fisher intimated Monday night that the notice of superannuation came as a complete surprise both to himself and the eight mail clerks included in the sweep.

ALLIANCE WILL CLAMP LID ON PORT STANLEY CITY PROVIDING WORK FOR MANY AT BRANTFORD

Lord's Day Organization Demands Prompt Action From Crown Attorney. Big Program Being Arranged For the Fall and Winter.

ST. THOMAS, June 27.—The lid is to be clamped on the alleged wide-open house at Port Stanley. The Lord's Day Alliance has made a demand on Crown Attorney McCrimmon for prompt action. Complaints have also reached the department of the situation at the lakeside and an investigation is being quickly made of the condition there, with a view towards a vigorous prosecution under the Lord's day act. Articles of holiday description are alleged to be a male and work done on the Sabbath which does not come under the scriptural category as a necessity. Orders are given to clean up the resort and the crown attorney has assured the representatives of the alliance that he will make a thorough job of it. The last raid made on the proprietors of cigar stores, ice cream parlors and other concerns at the Port was when Rev. Mr. Gilmore was pastor of a church in Fingert. But Port Stanley shop was an old maid's tea-party compared to the doings at the lakeside today. The crown attorney has no official mandate to determine what is a bathing gown nor advise on the delimitations of neckerchiefs. His primary instructions are to insist that the act be obeyed and after that the question of what constitutes an habillment ad nauseam will have that official's consideration.

BLYTH PASTOR IS LEAVING SHORTLY. BLYTH, June 27.—The farewell sermon of Rev. E. J. McCormick in the Methodist Church was preached last evening, when the church was filled, as the Presbyterians had closed their church for the occasion. Mr. McCormick, who has been the minister here for the last five years, which is unprecedented in the local church, has endeared himself not only to his own people, but to the general public, as he has always been ready to assist in every move for the good of the community. The service was very impressive, the minister taking for his text Ephesians 4, 15, "Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." He headed his subject as "The Perfect Man." He started to show that Paul was a church unionist of his day, and that all are united in faith, with a united faith and knowledge we aspire after the same Christ. "We have here," he said, "the standard set up for man, the standard of the stature of the fulness of Christ. The earliest ideal of man was the physical Hercules, Achilles, a man of mighty physique. I do consider such men as Dempsey and Carpenter have the universal regard today. Next comes the man of intellect, not men who had scandalized history and damned society. The true man is he who has lofty ideals, who aspires after the best, whose soul is unscathed by the touch of sin. Lofly pursuits ennoble life. Mastering the subject is the great benefit to the boy, not the paltry prize. The climb up the mountain is what brought vigor to the weakened body. Ever noble impulse, every exalted ideal, makes for moral strength and spiritual vigor. Christ is the spiritual Mount Blanc, every man should accept Him as his standard of conduct and life."

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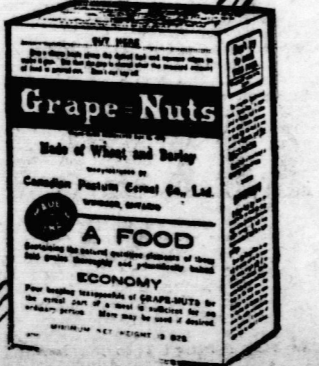

LIGHTNING FIRED BARN AT MT. ELGIN

H. P. Shuttleworth Sustained Heavy Loss in Early Morning Blaze.

INGERSOLL, June 27.—A large barn of brick and steel construction, which was supposed to be fire-proof, was destroyed by lightning this morning on the farm of H. P. Shuttleworth, Mount Elgin. It is thought that the bolt penetrated through the roof, igniting hay in the loft. The building was unusually large and it was with the greatest difficulty that the live stock and implements were saved. A large quantity of grain and hay was destroyed. The storm was unusually severe and throughout this district the rain fell in torrents for about an hour. During the storm lightning struck a chimney on the house of B. Beecroft, King street, east. The chimney was knocked off and a large hole torn in the roof. At the residence of E. Gregory, nearby, a number of switches were torn out of a fuse box, but there were no serious results. In the town and district the Ingersoll Telephone Company had a large number of telephones put out of commission.

LONDON, June 27.—Ted ("Kid") Lewis tonight defeated Jack Bloomfield on points in a twenty-round bout for the middleweight championship of England.

JAP TREATY LIKELY TO BE DISCUSSED BY PREMIER TODAY

Lloyd George Is Expected To Go Into Biggest Question of the Conference With the Delegates.

LONDON, June 27.—By The Associated Press.—The British prime minister, Mr. Lloyd George, again today addressed the imperial conference lengthily on foreign affairs. The session was delayed until 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon owing to Mr. Lloyd George's other engagements. The representatives of the overseas Dominions put many questions to the prime minister, and it is understood that the discussion was somewhat inconclusive. Consideration of the agenda evoked difference of opinion as to how the matters for discussion should be grouped. The secretariat finally drafted a list of subjects in accordance with their relative importance and these will be taken up later.

It is the belief that if Mr. Lloyd George is prepared, the discussion of the Anglo-Japanese treaty will be opened tomorrow morning by the prime minister himself or Lord Curzon, secretary of state for foreign affairs. Informal conversations in the conference disclosed varying opinions as to whether the Anglo-Japanese treaty should be taken up separately or in conjunction with naval defence, or whether there should be grouped together with the Japanese Alliance, disarmament and relations with the United States. At this is a matter still undecided there may possibly be a still further postponement of the discussion until the premiers have had time to consider the list drawn up by the secretariat and decide upon the procedure.

No resolutions. No resolutions were adopted today either on the subject of foreign relations or the agenda, and no official communiqué was issued. Presumably nothing will be divulged concerning the foreign policy and it is likely that the discussion on the Anglo-Japanese alliance will be very protracted, unless the conference should take up the idea, which has been mooted in some quarters, of finding a temporary solution by renewing the alliance for another year until it is seen whether it is possible to bring about a conference on the whole Pacific problem and naval armaments in which Great Britain, the United States, Japan and China would join.

The question of Ireland, it is understood, has not been brought formally before the conference and as it is still unknown whether a meeting in London of Sir James Craig and Eamonn De Valera will be brought about, nothing can be decided regarding those who will take part. It is considered extremely unlikely that the premiers of the overseas Dominions will participate.

DOMINION RIGHTS

LONDON, June 27.—By Grattan O'Leary, Staff Correspondent of the Canadian Press.—A declaration of Dominion rights by Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, premier of Canada, setting out what, in his judgment, should constitute an adequate voice for the Dominions in the foreign affairs of the empire was today debated at length by the conference of prime ministers. Premier Meighen, whose address was by way of being a review of Lord Curzon's outline of the world policy of the British foreign office, laid down four cardinal principles which, he declared, were essential to the heightened status of the Dominions. Although the speech and the discussion which ensued have not yet been made public, and may for the time being be regarded as confidential it is said his four points were as follows:

First.—That on all questions of foreign policy which more directly concern the British government, such as matters arising in connection with Palestine, Mesopotamia and the Middle East, the governments of the dominions should be kept thoroughly and constantly informed.

Second.—That upon all questions of foreign policy affecting the Empire as a whole the dominion governments must be consulted.

Third.—That the British government should enter into no treaties or special alliances without consultation with and the advice of the dominions, and that all treaties entered into should be subject to the approval of the dominion parliaments.

Fourth.—That upon all questions arising as between the United States and Canada, the advice of the Dominion government must be accepted as final.

BECK OFFERS TO SELL POWER TO DETROIT CITY

25,000 To 60,000 Horse-Power Available This Fall.

(Special to The Advertiser). DETROIT, June 27.—Detroit's municipal street railway lines in all probability will be operated by power generated by Niagara Falls and sold to the city by the Ontario hydro power commission. Mayor Cousens notified the city council today that he had conferred with Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Canadian commission, and that he had been informed that Detroit could be provided with power.

Sir Adam Beck was in conference with the mayor at the latter's farm for three hours Sunday and said that Detroit could enter into a contract with the commission to obtain from 25,000 to 60,000 horse-power by fall. The contract would run for ten years, and by that time the Ontario commission expects to be able to provide approximately 900,000 horse-power to the city. All this power would not be needed for operation of municipal lines, the mayor told the council. He believed it could be retailed by the city to domestic or industrial customers.

PARLIAMENT OPENS TODAY AT DUBLIN

Lower House Is Expected To Be Virtually Unrepresented.

DUBLIN, June 27.—The ceremony of opening the southern Parliament will be held tomorrow. A partial attendance on the part of senators is anticipated, but the Lower House is expected to be virtually unrepresented. The lord mayor of Dublin has received notification to attend the function. Workmen today were busily engaged in preparing the council room of the department of agriculture for the event, erecting the dais and fixing the seats. The military will be in charge, and reporters will be excluded.

SEES PLOT BREWING

BELFAST, June 27.—William Coote, member of Parliament for South Tyrone and a statement regarding Mr. Lloyd George's letter, says: "I have believed all along that there was a plot to subjugate Ulster to the Dublin Parliament. I didn't expect the plot to ripen so soon or to be presented in so clumsy a fashion. Ulster has already contributed her quota to the pacification of Ireland. She has nothing further to barter, unless she hands over civil and religious freedom. Therefore, we say to the premier, and you and De Valera, do whatever you wish with the remainder of the country."

BUFFALO POLICE RAID COCK FIGHT

Capture Twenty-Three Birds, But All Spectators Succeeded in Escaping.

Buffalo, N. Y., June 27.—Twenty-three choice fighting cocks will be killed today and cooked to adorn the table of a city institution as the result of a raid on a cocking main yesterday. Some months ago the Buffalo breeders went to Hamilton and lost heavily on their birds. A return match was arranged, and when the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals learned that the fight was going to take place just outside the city the sheriff was tipped off. Sheriff Waldo and four deputies swooped down on the international fight, but a sentry stationed on the outskirts of the crowd of more than a hundred gave the alarm and the men escaped into the woods.

WARNED TO SHIFT STOCK OF LIQUOR

Damaging Evidence Is Given At Toronto Police Investigation.

TORONTO, June 27.—James Jeffrey, a provincial officer, testifying this afternoon at the investigation being conducted by Judge Ward into charges against the Toronto police of selling liquor at H. Gold's place, 400 of which were located between joints after flooding had been removed and 400 in the chicken-house. Mr. Jeffrey said Gold was convicted after this find, he said. A day or so after the raid, Jeffrey said, former Crown Attorney Corley remarked to him that it was a good raid, and he said: "I knew all about the liquor there, and I told Gold's son that it should be shifted, or Hammond's men would get it." The witness explained that Hammond had heard the police squad looking after breaches of the O. T. A. cases.

Evidence Admitted. George Wilkie, counsel for Mr. Corley, had objected to this evidence going in, on the ground that Mr. Corley was not crown attorney at the time, and was not being investigated. The judge admitted it, however.

"Mr. Corley did not say he knew the liquor was there at the time he was crown attorney?" Mr. Wilkie asked the witness.

"No, he did not," was the reply.

Sam Smith, another provincial officer, swore that Mr. Corley said he had warned young Gold to shift the stuff but "the crazy fool" didn't take any notice of the warning. He had told Gold to shift it, or Hammond's gang would get it. Smith said he thought at the time that Corley was just joking.

"Clarkson winked at Ward," said Louis Lock, a witness who told of a party of Hebrews in Gold's place one night in the former premises. Detective Ward and Clarkson raided the place and took away a keg of beer. They left four bottles, two of alcohol and two of whiskey, the witness said. Asked how the officers left the bottled stuff, the witness cryptically answered: "Clarkson winked at Ward."

LONDONERS ADMIT ROBBING STORES

Harold Duffy and Peter Fresell Sent To Circuit Court.

SARNIA, June 27.—Harold Duffy, aged 16, and Peter Fresell, aged 17, London, Ont., youths who were arrested at the Port Huron and Sarnia ferry dock by Patrolman Lane after they had robbed the cash register of the Jacobi-Bowen Company, pleaded guilty in police court today, and were bound over to the circuit court. The youths were first sent to probate court, but were sent by Judge George Brown back to justice court. According to confessions made by the two youths they first robbed the Unger sporting goods store of two revolvers. Later they visited various mercantile establishments. When arrested today they had in their possession the two guns, \$70 in cash taken from the Jacobi-Bowen store, and merchandise from other stores. The youths both confessed that they had robbed several stores in Canada. The story told the police was that they planned to lead the guns and start out on a career of crime.
