Autumn Fair.—The October cattle fair is usually one of the best of the whole year, and the one held here on Friday last was no exception, there being a large amount of stock offered for sale and many buyers present. Sales were numerous, between one and two hundred head changing hands. The prices ranged from \$20 to \$30 for light steers, to \$40 to \$50 for animals in good condition for shipping.

Missionary Meeting.—The annual missionary meeting will be held in the Canada Methodist Church on Monday evening next, 17th inst., commencing at 7 P.M. Addresses will be given by the Revs. T. Brock, chairman of the Wellington District, and Jas McAllister of Drayton. On Sunday the Rev. T. Brock will preach morning and evening, when collections will be taken up in behalf of the missionary society. The public are invited to attend.

New Time Table.—A new time table will take effect on Monday next on the G. T. G. & A. L. E. Ry. The running of regular trains to and from Chesley, which was to have commenced this week, has been deferred until that date. We understand that by the new time table the morning train for the south will leave here at 8 o'clock, instead of at 6, as formerly. The other trains will probably only vary a few minutes from their present time of running.

Bishop Carman.—On Sunday last, morning and evening, the Rev. Canon M. E. Church of this town was visited by Bishop Carman, the head of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada. Large congregations assembled on both occasions to listen to his able discourses.

On the following evening a tea-meeting was held in the church. After tea, which was served in the basement, addresses were delivered by Bishop Carman and Revs. Scott of Palmerston, and Knapp, Ball and Taylor of Listowel. T. E. Hay, Esq., Mayor, occupied the chair. The addresses were interspersed with music by the choir.

NERRY A FIRE.—Considerable alarm was created among the scholars and teachers in the Public School on Tuesday afternoon by the filling of the rooms in the building with smoke and the subsequent discovery of the fire. One of the unused rooms had caught fire. The pupils were quickly dismissed, and prompt action was taken by those on the spot to suppress the flames, which succeeded in doing before much damage was done. The fire engine was called out, but was not needed. It was a fortunate circumstance that the fire was discovered and extinguished so promptly, as there is no telling what might have happened had a panic occurred among the four or five hundred children within the building at the time; it was also fortunate that the discovery was made during school hours, otherwise the chief ornament of our town would doubtless to-day have been a heap of ruins. The fire was caused by a defective flue, which we understand has since been made safe.

SALE ACCIDENT.—A sad accident befel a young man named Albert Ecker, of Stratford, a workman on the G. T. R., who was engaged in shunting cars on the siding in the vicinity of Climo's mill on Saturday morning last. While attempting to cross a trestle, he fell from a coupling, his foot slipped and he fell with his feet across the rail, when the wheel passed over him, crushing one of his legs from a short distance below the knee to the ankle, and taking off the large toe of his other foot. The unfortunate young man was taken to the Grand Central Hospital, and a surgical assistance was procured. It was found necessary to amputate the crushed limb below the knee, the operation being successfully performed by Drs. Nichol and Bugman. The poor fellow bore up under the great shock and intense suffering with fortitude, exhibiting much courage in the feelings of his mother that she by her own unfortunate condition. At present he is progressing favorably, and there is encouraging prospect of his speedy recovery, although, of course, he cannot hope to regain his lost limb.

His mother, who resides in Stratford, came up by the evening train and a nursing home. Ecker was considered a promising young man, and is much thought of in Stratford, where he is well known. It was his first year in this division of the Grand Trunk, he having solicited the change to this division as he thought that his chances for promotion would be greater on a new line. His misfortune has created much sympathy for him.
