Mrs. George Roome, of Dartmouth the Pres. occupied the chair. Associated with her were Miss Blackadder and Mrs. A. A. Thompson who were in mission work in Trinidad. Miss Maria Currie, of Windsor is Secretary.

About seventy five delegates were in attendance. The ladies of the Kentville Society served dinner and tea in the school room. Mrs. Layton gave an address of welcome which was very happily responded to by one of the delegates. Miss Rogers of Koya and Mrs. J. C. Macdonald of Trinidad both home on furlough spoke.

The financial report was encouraging, and it was resolved to make a special effort to bring the amount raised up to that of last year, which was an exceptional year.

At the evening session Dr. Thomas Stewart of Halifax, Church agent, spoke on mission work. He was followed by Mrs. A. W. Thomas of Pictou, President of the Society for the Maritime Provinces. Miss Knowles sang a solo. The rain doubtless interfered with the attendance at the evening meeting. But it was considered a very successful meeting.

Died on Steamer Prince George

Benjamin White, one of the crew of the steamer Prince George which arrived from Boston this morning, died just as the boat was entering the harbor. Heart failure brought on by drinking too much ice-water while in a heated condition is given as the cause of death. He was helping to work cargo in Boston on Sunday and as the day was hot he made frequent trips to the ice water tank. He was in the early twenties, unmarried, and belongs to Hubbard's Point.

**FINE GAME OF BASEBALL—
97th Battalion Defeats Highland Brigade 9-4**

Playing a hit-and-run game from first to last the base ball team of the American Legion rushed a team picked from the entire Highland Brigade at Aldershot Camp off its feet and rang up nine tallies to four in celebration of Dominion Day.

After beating the teams of the four Scottish battalions at Aldershot Camp in four successive games, the Legion met the pick of the Brigade and in a game full of thrills proved that the "slugger's eye," a knowledge of "inside baseball," and "old experience" were handicaps too large for the game and willing Scotties to overcome.

Playing with flashes of brilliancy, the Scotties lacked the coolness in pinches necessary to check a team as aggressive as the Legion at bat and on the bases. The Highlanders fought every inch of the way and gave the large crowd many a thrill but their defence left many openings to a team which was on its toes constantly to take advantage of every slip.

The first two innings passed in jig time, the men going out in one-two-three order, but in the third pitcher Divine of the Highlanders lost control and passed the first two men up.

With two on bases the Scottish infield blew up, two errors at second and one at third, and a fusillade of wild pitches, and loose playing resulting in four runs. The Legion team was quick to see that their opponents were losing control and their daring base running converted every error into a score. Leaman's long sacrifice fly to left field brought in the fifth and last run of the inning.

Divine was yanked at the conclusion of the inning, but Brownell, who took the mound in his place, was hardly more effective against the Yankee batsmen, three scratch hits in the next inning sending another tally across the plate.

In the meantime Allenback, pitching for the Legion team, slackened in the last half of the fourth and the Scotties found him for a hit and run. From this inning they became more and more dangerous and only the coolness of Allenback in the pinches and the airtight support which his team afforded him during most of the game kept the Scotties from running up a large score.

In the sixth the Highlanders started with a double to centre field and followed with a hard drive past the third sack which counted for two more bases. A wild pitch through second and Hanlon's wide throw from centre to third let in the second run of the inning with none out, and the rooters for the Scotsmen went wild. Next man up contributed the third straight hit, hit a nice single through short. A sacrifice advanced him to second and with the score six to three it looked as if the Highlanders were to even up the score. But here Allenback tightened fanning the next up and Hanlon redeemed his previous error with a beautiful running catch in centre-field retiring the side.

In the seventh the Scotties threatened again with a single and double which scored their fourth and last run. Noon's error put another on bases

but with men on second and third Allenback again proved himself equal to the emergency whiffing the last man up.

The eight inning put the game on ice for the Americans. Leaman, the heavy hitting right fielder, was struck by the ball for the second time in the game, but was caught off second shortly after. Joyce and Mann followed with slow rollers to the pitcher which he was unable to field fast enough to cut them off at first. Talbot, Fox and Allenback followed with three clean singles scoring as many runs.

The last thrill of many came at the close of the ninth inning when with two men out and two on-bases for the third time pulled himself out of the hole and whiffed the last man up.

With five straight victories to their credit the Legion team plans to extend its conquests and figures on a trip to Halifax to meet the fast Crescents on next Saturday. The team grows daily more formidable. Many of the men have had major league experiences in the States and practically all of them have played with fast aggregations. The men field well. In the game Saturday Fox at short, Joyce at second, and Manager Hanlon in centrefield accepted many hard chances and Mann behind the bat once more proved the terror of base runners with his fast and accurate peg to second. But it is their prowess at the bat which counts most in the teams victories.

Accustomed to looking over the offerings of the best pitchers in the States, it takes an unusually crafty hurler to keep them off the bases for more than a few innings, and once on bases they generally get within striking distance of the home plate. In the box Allenback, Auman and McKernon proved capable of pitching airtight ball.

RETIRED AFTER FIFTY YEARS RAILROADING

Fred Carter, late driver of the H. & S. W. Railway, passed through Yarmouth on Saturday en route to Waltham, Mass., to reside with his daughter. Driver Carter has been railroading for almost fifty years. He began with the I. C. R., afterwards joining the Windsor and Annapolis (now the D. A. R.) 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Anglo-French Armies Continue Their Progress

London, July 3.—Today's news is again a tale of the continued progress of the Anglo-French offensive. Heavy fighting is proceeding all along the line. The British maintain all their positions south of the Ancre River, where he battle still rages. They have captured La Boisselle, the garrison of which surrendered and are fighting successfully around Ovillers and north of Fricourt. The British people learned for the first time tonight, that the famous French General Foch, who has won a great reputation during the course of the war, is directing the operations south of the Somme river. This has given increased confidence in the result of the allied offensive.

The French have captured Herbecourt and Assevillers, and have made other substantial gains, taking additional prisoners and heavy guns. They are thus making great progress in the direction of the important German junction of Peronne, which is only a little over three miles distant from their advance at Herbecourt.

The non-committal character of the German official statement, issued today, is considered in London as a virtual confirmation of the success of the Anglo-French operations. The Germans admit that the division of their forces abutting both banks of the Somme, which were partially withdrawn Saturday, has now been brought back to the second line.

No data is yet forthcoming from either side as to the casualties suffered. According to the German communication, the Anglo French losses were "extraordinary heavy," according to unofficial British reports, however, the British casualties were less than had been expected. All reports emphasize the tremendous nature of the British bombardment. The gunners worked so incessantly as almost to fall asleep at their guns, and when there was a slight recess in the firing, they slept easily amid the thunders of the battle.

Great importance is attached to a newly invented mortar, which plays havoc in the German trenches. Aircraft are taking an important role in the operations. Thus far the new offensive appears to have had little influence on the battle around Verdun. The Germans are still showing undiminished vigor in the Meuse region, and the French are as steadily resisting.

Russian Advance Only is Slowed Down

Petrograd, July 3.—The Russians are battering persistently at the solid wall of the German defence west and north of Lutsk, beyond the Shara River. The Germans have taken the offensive at various points, and fierce battles are reported daily, but with little change in the alignment.

The Germans are pouring reinforcements to this front from Kovel, Vladimir-Volynski and Sokal, apparently making a desperate effort to "push" the Russians back upon Lutsk. Their only success has been to bend the Russians flank positions, at the cost of a fearful toll in dead, into an arc centreing on the village of Torchin, fifteen miles northwest of Lutsk.

Along the whole line northward to Riga the Germans are attacking on widely separated and narrow fronts, but apparently without co-ordination. The only success admitted by military critics is in the region northwest of Nowogrodek, where the Germans threw a force across the Niemen. Little importance is attached to this, due to the swampy nature of the terrain which, it is believed makes the development of an offensive impossible.

General Brussiloff's advance in the Kolomea region has distinctly slowed up, and is less spectacular than during the last fortnight, but continues to record success.

"German Positions Like Mouths of Furnaces"

London, July 3.—(New York Times)—A despatch to the London Times from a correspondent at the British headquarters, describing the bombardment of German positions on the Somme says:—"There were positions which were like the mouths of furnaces, a permanent glow flecked and illuminated with never ending streams of white sparks.

"One ordinarily measured the weight of a bombardment by the number of shells that burst in a minute, this case counting were helpless fixing my eyes on one spot I tried to wink them as fast as the lightnings of the flicker, and the shells beat me badly, I then tried chattering my teeth and I think that in that way I approximately held my own. Testing it afterward in the light, where I could see a watch face I found that I could click my teeth some five or six times in a second. You can try it, for yourself and clicking your own teeth will get some idea of the rate at which the shells were bursting on a single spot.

"There were always three or four points within the field of vision at which they were bursting at that speed and always in between over the whole circuit of the field they were bursting with great, if lesser rapidity.

"What the expenditure of ammunition is in such a bombardment it is impossible to conjecture, when along the front of ninety miles there are always points at which shells are bursting at the rate of some hundred to the minute, and this has already gone on for four days and four nights.

Lady Sybil Grey Wounded at Front

London, July 4.—Lady Sybil Grey, daughter of Earl Grey, formerly Governor-General of Canada, was seriously, but not dangerously wounded, while with the British Red Cross at the Russian front, says a Reuter despatch from Petrograd.

During hand grenade practice, a grenade was thrown through a window shelter near where she was sitting and a splinter penetrated her left cheek and jaw.

Ottawa, July 4.—Colonial secretary Law has cabled the governor-general expressing the appreciation of the his majesty's Government for the assistance afforded by the Canadian bankers in providing a further imperial munitions credit of \$25,000,000.

Lieut. Col. W. E. Roscoe has received a letter from his son, Capt. Barry W. Roscoe, who was engaged in the battle which has been termed the third battle of Ypres. This battle was begun by the Germans on Friday, June 2nd. Capt. Roscoe's Battalion met the enemy's shock east of Zillibeker at a spot called Maple Copse. The general particulars of this great battle have already appeared in the press. This battalion successfully resisted the German advance. Its commander Colonel Baker was killed. The part which Capt. Roscoe took in this engagement was to lead reinforcements to a part of the regiment at Maple Copse from a point in the rear of Zillibeker pond a distance of about a mile. This mile had to be traversed through a curtain of fire made by the enemy's artillery for the purpose of preventing reinforcements from reaching the Canadian advance line. A portion of the company led by Captain Roscoe passed successfully through and his battalion was under orders to hold the position. They dug themselves in and held the position against every attack.

The senior officer in command at Maple Copse having been wounded, Capt. Roscoe was for a time in command there, and from persons recently returning from the front it has been learned that out of 150 of the company who went across the mile of fire, only 30 escaped without wounds. Many were killed outright. Capt. Roscoe was wounded in the right arm and on the head from shrapnel. He has been recommended for the D. S. O. and also for promotion. This will place him second in command in the Regiment. It is most gratifying to know that neither of his wounds are serious and he is probably again with his Regiment.

Accepts Pastorate of Kentville Baptist Church

Several weeks ago the Kentville Baptist Church extended a call to Rev. A. W. West of Washington, Ohio, a native of this County. When the call reached Washington he with his family had started on their summer vacation in Nova Scotia. Mr. West arrived here and has supplied the Kentville Church for three Sabbaths. The people of his present pastorate have been using every effort to induce him to remain in Washington, where he has proved a strong pastor and has greatly increased membership.

The call from the Kentville church has been so hearty and unanimous that Mr. West has at last consented to accept. He will return to Ohio and finish his work there and then remove to Kentville at the earliest possible date. Mr. West is making up a sacrifice in giving up a strong church with a large salary, but the leanings of himself and wife toward the home land are so strong that he has willingly accepted under the pastorate of Rev. Mr. West and his accomplished and energetic wife. The Kentville church will, no doubt, do most effective work. Kings County is drawing here to the work of the ministry several able men from Western Canada and the United States.

Gave His Life for His Country

LIEUT. F. C. MELLOR

Rev. T. C. Mellor, Rector of St James' Church, has received word by telegram from Newfoundland of the death of his eldest son, Lieut. Frederick Courtney Mellor, killed in action on July 1st. Lieut. F. C. Mellor was educated at the Collegiate School, Windsor, and afterwards joined the staff of the Commercial Cable Co. at Hazel Hill. About six years ago he was transferred to St. John's Nfld. At the outbreak of the war he enlisted with the Nfld. Regiment and went overseas with the First Contingent. His Regiment did duty at Inverness and Edinburg Castle. While there he was given his commission as lieutenant. He returned to Newfoundland in 1915 for more men, and on his arrival in Scotland trained his men at Newton-on-Ayr. About five months ago he with his regiment went over to France, and now he has made the sacrifice for honor and liberty, home and Empire, for King and Country, against the greed and lust of a brutal militarism.

His only brother is a Lance Corporal in the Canadian Engineers, and went over with the First Contingent. Mr. and Mrs. Mellor and family have heartfelt sympathy in their hours of bereavement.

On June 22nd a telegram brought the sad news to his home that John Cowley Brown of the 6th Mounted Rifle was killed in action on June 22nd.

He was the eldest son of Charles C. Brown of Greenwich and was born in Haverfordwest Wales, in 1880, coming out to Nova Scotia with the family in 1891.

He had trained three years at Aldershot in the Kings County Hussars and when war broke out at once offered himself and saddle-horse for service abroad. His life was spent on his father's fruit farm, excepting one year in Florida. He had excellent abilities and was a deep reader. His principles were of the highest and his word was his bond. Pleasant alike to young or old, to rich or poor, he was liked and respected by all who knew him.

He leaves a father, three brothers and five sisters who while mourning their loss are proud that the son and brother gave his life for his country.

French Continue to Push Ahead - British Consolidating Gains

London, July 5—Pressure of the Entente Allies on the Central Powers continues without abatement and while nowhere has any great amount of territory been recovered, important strategic gains are claimed on the Western, Eastern and Italian fronts.

So far as the Western front is concerned, the first phase of the Anglo French offensive is believed to be nearing the end. Both North and South of the Somme, the French and British are engaged in organizing positions, captured since Saturday. The French, having taken all the German defensive South of the Somme, are now fighting in open country, and cavalry, which has been long idle, is being employed for patrol work. The next objective of the French in this region is the village of Barleux, which is the junction point of three highways leading to the Somme, South of Peronne. If this point is gained the French will be in position to attack the bridgeheads opposite Peronne, which the Germans are strengthening.

North of the River Tangle, the French advance is slower, on account of the fact that the Germans have massed, between the River and Hebuterne, the bulk of the twenty-six divisions, which originally held the front, and of the reserves they have since brought up. After the ground gained has been consolidated it is expected artillery preparations for a second big thrust will be made.

London, July 5—"Heavy fighting continued throughout the night, in the neighborhood of the Ancre and the Somme," says an official statement, timed 1 p. m., which was given out today.

"We made further progress at certain important points. German artillery has been intensely active in certain sectors."

"In the neighborhood of Thiepval, two determined attacks on our new trenches were beaten off with loss to the enemy."

"There were no important developments on the rest of the front."

Paris, July 5—The French have captured a line of German trenches East of Curlu, the War Office announced today. They have also captured Sormont Farm, facing Clerly.

Substantial Gains By Belgians in German East Africa

Havre, July 3—Substantial progress for the Belgian troops invading German East Africa is reported in an official statement issued by the Belgian War Office yesterday. The statement says: "General Tombour cables that the Belgian troops have continued their progress, along the front, closely pressing the retreating enemy on the Kagera River, Molitor's Brigade met with only slight resistance and after crossing the river, the brigade pursued the enemy eastward of Biaramito. The advanced corps of the brigade attacked a part of the enemy who approached from Keindschimau. The enemy was defeated and retreated precipitately. Our troops took some prisoners and a convoy."

"In the region east of Lake Tanganyika our forces captured a stonehouse filled with provisions, arms and munitions. The enemy threatened by columns of Olsen's Brigade, refused battle and abandoned their positions at Kiteca which we occupied on June 16th. The pursuit continues. Biaramuto known as Njarnwungo, is an important centre of roads in the region south west of Lake Victoria Nyanza. Keindschimau is on the right bank of the Kagera River."

Sch. Lydia H. Roper In Great Danger

The schooner Lydia H. Roper, bound from Hantsport, to New York with a cargo of lumber, had a narrow escape from destruction yesterday afternoon off the ledges at Lepreaux. Captain Berryman and his crew had left the vessel and her position was indeed precarious when several small motor craft towed her into safety. Later she proceeded on her way.

Conditions were very trying in the bay yesterday and late in the afternoon the Roper worked herself into a bad position. Her fate seemed inevitable and Captain Berryman and the crew left and went ashore. Several fishermen were about and immediately they took a hand in the matter. The anchor was slipped and their combined efforts drew the vessel from the danger zone.

A telephone message was received from Lepreaux about 3 o'clock in the afternoon regarding the dangerous position of the craft and the tug Neptune was sent to assist her. Before she arrived on the scene, however, all was well, and she returned to port early in the evening.

The Lydia H. Roper is 305 tons. J. Willard Smith is her local agent. She brought a cargo into here about three weeks ago and left about a week later to load at Hantsport.

Entire Front Engaged

London, July 5—Reuter's correspondent at the Press Camp in France points out that not merely twenty miles of the main operations, but the whole ninety miles of the British front are bearing their full share of the fighting.

"So well does the enemy know this," says the correspondent, "that he dare not transfer a single gun or man from any part of the defensive between the Yser and the Somme, to try to stem the Southern push. On the day the British bombardment began, the knell of German initiative was sounded."

"An order issued to the German troops and found by British soldiers," continues the correspondent, "proves it was known that the British intended to deliver their attack July 1st, and it was thought that the attack would be directed between Roye and Lille."

The Anglo-French Offensive is Developing Well, 15,000 Prisoners Have Been Taken, and Peronne is in Sight, But Battle By No Means Won

(By Arthur S. Draper in special cablegram to The Halifax Herald.)

London, July 4—The most striking feature in reports from the British front is the capture of a whole German battalion, 600 men and twenty officers, of Prussian infantry, who were sent to Fricourt as support, but were forced to surrender when caught in front of the British fire.

Though as a whole the offensive still is developing in a satisfactory manner the Germans are making stubborn resistance counter attacking at several points, especially in the vicinity of Boiselle.

The allied prisoners taken number about 15,000 men and already a large number have been brought to England. The French pushed forward strongly, with Peronne, valuable as a railway centre, their immediate goal. A rather sharp salient is being formed.

In contrast to the former custom of magnifying the value of early gains, British official and unofficial accounts on the present offensive are noteworthy because of their cautiousness. But perhaps their caution is wise, as it is too early to balance gains against losses and it is safe to say the general staff is not banking all on the present engagement.

There are indications that the Germans soon may launch a counter offensive in the vicinity of Ypres including a heavy bombardment near Armentieres followed by an attempted raid, possibly being a blind to screen German activity on the northern end of the line. The offensive has shown that the German defences along the river Ancre from Boiselle Bommont are exceedingly strong and so well nigh impregnable that soldiers were able to emerge from shelters, after the hurricane of high explosives and shrapnel ceased, to meet the oncoming British infantry with rifle and machine guns.

Here the heaviest and most costly fighting is going on, and probably the struggle will develop into a long bombardment before another attack is made on the defenders. This strip of front is considered one of the toughest along the whole line—a veritable fortress equipped with every device military cunning can suggest.

The work of the allied airmen, in range finding reconnaissance, is unequalled, according to reports from several quarters. The French report says not a single German machine passed over their front since the offensive started. The British give great credit to aviation observers for the high quality of their artillery fire. The British have settled down with a feeling of confidence fully appreciating that progress must be slow and never cheap.
