NINTH LANCERS ARE MISSING

They May Have Been Captured as Reported From Boer Sources.

The Corps Was Sent in Pursuit of the Boers From Gras Pan—East African Cable Again Interrupted and War Office Has No Further Details From Gen. Methuen—Losses in the Recent Encounters.

London, Nov. 28.—(4.30 a.m.)—A fresh interruption in the East African cable service at the interesting moment has caused a cessation of news from the War Office. The last news received from the War Office was a detailed list of casualties, sent in a special message, and a list of the whereabouts of the 9th Lancers, who were sent in pursuit of the Boers from Gras Pan.

Were the 9th Lancers Captured? The Daily Mail says that a private source in the War Office has advised that the 9th Lancers are still in the hands of the Boers, and that they are being held in a camp near the border. It is stated that the Boers are treating the Lancers well, and that they are being used as a bargaining chip in the negotiations for peace.

A Sixth Army Division. It is understood that the Government yesterday decided to proceed immediately with the mobilization and embarkation of a sixth division of the army under a well known lieutenant-general.

Hilgard's Achievement. Gen. Hilgard's achievement in the Philippines is being recognized as one of the greatest of the war. He is being hailed as a hero, and his name is being mentioned in every newspaper.

Another Bridge Destroyed. According to a despatch from the Boer headquarters, another bridge has been destroyed by the Boers. This is the second bridge to be destroyed in the region, and it is believed that the Boers are trying to cut off the communication lines between the British and the Boer forces.

Preparing for Refugees. The Government is preparing for the possibility of a large number of refugees from the Boer territories. It is believed that the Boers are trying to force the British to evacuate the territories, and that a large number of people will be displaced.

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FRANCE'S FOREIGN POLICY.

M. Cochon Thinks Now is a Good Time to Tackle England.

Clericals Leader Disapproves of French-Boer War. M. Cochon Thinks Now is a Good Time to Tackle England.

Paris, Nov. 28.—In the Chamber of Deputies yesterday the discussion of the foreign policy of the Government was resumed. The Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Delcasse, protested against the attacks of the Opposition, which he said, did not recollect even before the risk of embroiling France in external difficulties.

M. Denys Cochon, leader of the Clericals, expressed surprise at the importance attached to Anglo-French newspaper polemics, which, he said, were only froth, added that he was not particularly in favour of a policy of fast-shaking, but that he thought the war in South Africa gave the opportunity to seek certain settlements.

Although he disapproved of fast-shaking he equally disapproved of the policy of procrastination. He expressed his sympathy for the Government, and his confidence in M. Delcasse.

M. Delcasse then moved the re-establishment of the credit for an embassy at the Vatican, as a matter of national interest to France, a great Catholic nation, adding that, as long as the Government interested itself in the relations of the French clergy with the Curia, an embassy at the Vatican was absolutely necessary.

Replying, M. Denys Cochon said that the credit for the embassy at the Vatican, if it must not be construed as a vote of confidence in the Government.

TANGLED UP.
Newfoundland Politicians Split. Many Factions That are in Next Session.

St. John's, Nov. 28.—The Newfoundland political scene is becoming more and more tangled up. There are many factions, and it is believed that the next session will be a very interesting one.

St. Catharines, Ont., Nov. 28.—Yesterday, Curtis Tallman, a young man from Camden, was before the magistrate, charged with assault, occasioning bodily harm upon Roy Hais. The boy was coming home from school, and was seized by Hais, who pushed him against the open blade, saying, "I'll kill you."

The evidence was that the magistrate sent the case on for trial at a higher court.

Where the Plague Rages.
San Francisco, Nov. 28.—A special to The Chronicle from Tacoma says: "Yakohama advises state that a terrible condition of affairs prevails at New Chwang, Manchuria, with respect to the bubonic plague. Hundreds of deaths are occurring weekly, the mortality reaching 40 to 50 every day. The disease is beginning to spread to other parts of the province, and it is feared that the Chinese authorities have utterly refused to take any measures for its prevention."

Dr. John Hall's Fight.
New York, Nov. 28.—It is announced here, on what is called the best authority, that Dr. Campbell Morgan has decided to accept the pulpit of the Fifth-avenue Presbyterian Church, left vacant by the death of Dr. McHugh. This announcement has been made before and denied.

Murder Trial at Perth.
Perth, Nov. 28.—The Lanark County Assizes opened here yesterday. Mr. Justice Ross presiding. The dockets is large and included three criminal cases, of the most important one being the trial of Thomas Lake of Smith's Falls for the murder of his wife.

Robert's Heirs Are Rich.
Paterson, N. J., Nov. 28.—The company holding risks on the life of Vice-President Hobart yesterday sent his executors their check for the amount of the policies. The Equitable Life Assurance Society had \$100,000 and the New York Life Insurance had \$55,000.

CHEQUE FOR \$62,000.
Montreal, Nov. 28.—At a meeting of the governors of McGill University, held here, a cheque was received and accepted from Sir William G. Macdonald for \$62,000, which he desired to be utilized for the purpose of endowing a memorial chair in the University, to be known as the Sir William G. Macdonald Chair.

South Africa Comes In.
Berlin, Nov. 28.—It is reiterated here that the Anglo-German agreement has secret claims referring to the South Africa, which will, eventually, allow Tiger Bait to Germany.

The Bakes of Killarney.
London, Nov. 28.—Lord Ardilaun (Arthur Edward Guinness) has purchased the Muckross estate for \$500,000. The Muckross estate includes the Lakes of Killarney. Advice yesterday said the estate had been bought by Baron Leveson, a nephew of Ardilaun.

The Canadian Fugue Home.
Boston, Mass., Nov. 28.—Mrs. Hubert, in whose house in East Boston a counterfeiter Canadian, died were found, and who is the mother of the woman who went with William Davis to Guthrie, Oklahoma, has been arrested.

War in Venezuela Still.
Caracas, Venezuela, Nov. 28.—Gen. Castro left here yesterday morning for Valencia, where he has assembled about 4,500 men to attack General Hernandez. He will return immediately, leaving Gen. Pizarr in command.

THE FINEST RECORD.
The Husted Milling and Elevator Company's grain elevator was burned at Buffalo on Thursday. The elevator had a capacity of 200,000 bushels, and was filled with wheat and corn. Arthur Sicker, its employe, was severely injured.
