## Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting of the town council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor and full Board present, except Coun. Fitch. In the absence of the clerk Coun. Tingley was appointed secretary of the meeting. An application was read from Mr. C. R. S. Starr, asking that the town water service be extended on Park street. On motion the matter was referred to the Water Committee. A petition was received from Police-man Hampshire, asking that his salary be increased \$2 per month, in consideration of his procuring his own uniform. The request was referred to the Police Committee. The bill of Mr. J. W. Balem, of \$3 for clearing snow, was read and ordered to be paid. Frank Kinnie's bill of 50 cents, for police duty, was ordered to be paid. Some time was spent in an informal discussion of exhibition matters, but no action was taken. The matter of sewer connections was brought up, and on motion the clerk was directed to request the chairman of the Sewer Committee to be in a position at next meeting to report the names of all persons in the town whose premises are not connected with the sewer. The work of the Poor Committee was discussed at some length but no action was taken, and the Council adjourned.

## The Press.

The agitation started by Mr. John D. Macdonald, of the Pictou Advocate, for the formation of a Press Association for Nova Scotia, has been successful. Some twenty or more newspaper men met at Truro on Thursday of last week in the Firmen's quarters, the organization being effected. A hearty welcome was accorded by Mayor H. T. Lawrence, of Truro, and County Warden Nelson. Mr. John D. Macdonald was chairman pro tem. He said he had heard from nearly every newspaper editor in the province, expressing a desire to become part of such proposed organization. The following are the officers:

A. C. Mills, J. J. Anslow, Jas. K. Kellaher, Albert Dennis and J. W. H. Sutherland were appointed a committee to prepare a draft of a constitution and by-laws. The Association will meet again in Halifax at the call of the executive committee, probably in June.

## New Store in Wolfville.

In another place this week will be found the opening announcement of Mr. J. S. Heales. The new store was opened to the public last Saturday evening, and presents a fine appearance. The store is 32x45 feet in size, and is divided into two departments. On the west side is shown all kinds of ladies' wear in profusion while the east side is devoted to gentlemen's goods. The store is very neatly arranged and fitted with handsome glass counters, show-cases, &c. The large plate-glass show windows, tastefully dressed, present a very fine appearance, and when lighted up the store has a decidedly showy and city-like look. Mr. Heales is a Wolfville boy who deserves to succeed and THE ACADIAN wishes him every prosperity.

The death of Enoch Griffin took place at the residence of his son-in-law, Harry Dickie, at Woodville, Monday, March 28th. Mr. Griffin was a well known farmer, and resided for some years at Upper Dyke Village, removing from there to Canard. His failing health compelled him to give up his work, and with his wife took up his residence with his daughter, Mrs. Dickie. He was 78 years of age, and leaves a wife, and several daughters and sons. Mrs. Everett Bann and Mrs. Dickie reside in Kings County. The others are in different parts of the United States. The funeral took place Wednesday and interment was made in the cemetery at Upper Canard.

The president of the summer school of science has received from the mayor and corporation of Yarmouth, N. S., a formal invitation for the school to meet there in 1905, accompanied by the offer of a very liberal grant in aid of the school funds. It will probably be accepted. The school meets this year at Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 12 to 26. A very successful season was held some years ago in Yarmouth.

## World Wide.

Don Daly, the well known comedian, died from hemorrhage, March 26. He was a native of New Brunswick.

Brantford, Ont., was cast into darkness recently by a rather peculiar incident. Muskrats undermined the embankments skirting Mohawk Lake, so that the water flooded the fields instead of going into the canal which supplies the power for electric lights.

The sufferings of the British forces in Tibet during the winter is said to have been intense. Sometimes, while on the march, with the thermometer 24 degrees below, camp had to be made in snow two feet deep. Many men were incapacitated from hunger, frost-bites and snow-blindness. Influenza has carried off many hundreds of the camp.

Philanthropic Queen Alexandra has paid a visit to the factory girls institution in London East end. Her majesty talked with the employees, inspected the building, bought her ticket and ate the 9-cent dinner along with many hundreds of working girls and ragged little urchins. The royal party were piloted by Sir Thomas Lipton.

A company of Sioux braves from Dakota were entertained at the White House the other day. During their visit President Roosevelt delivered them a sound lecture on the virtues of thrift, admonishing them for the shiftlessness of their tribe and assuring them that, while the government made provision for the older Indians, the young men were expected to earn their own living and grow prosperous, like other American citizens. The red men left with faces wreathed in smiles, evidently well pleased with their noble host.

Two military captains in the employ of Russia, have been arrested for selling their country's secrets to Japan, and are awaiting trial by court martial. While in Japan, a little yellow man whom the newspapers call Tein-ke-Aki-Yama, is in danger of a similar sentence under suspicion of selling a government secret to Russia.

Fifty Canadian boys have started out to do service with the Japanese. They have accepted positions as scouts in the Mikado's army.

## Kentville Sanitorium.

The Government Sanitorium at Kentville, which has been recently taken over from the builders, Rhodes, Curry Co., of Amherst, is thus described in the Western Chronicle: "It is situated on a hill about a half mile north of the town, and commands one of the prettiest views to be found in Kings Co. Wide balconies stretch the full length of the front of building, and with these, the rooms for the patients are connected by a wide and airy veranda, and large doors partly of glass. Inside everything is finished in hospital style, and impresses the visitor with the fact that no stray microbes can there find a convenient hiding place, or the smallest particle of dust remain undetected. The entrance hall is most attractive, containing a large fine place of plain finished brick, and a mantle and chimney seat of oak. A pleasant reception room, dining room and conservatory open from this, all of which are beautifully supplied with windows which open from the side, like doors, and which when bolted and barred appear secure against intruders. A wide stair case leads to the upper floor, and here we find a spacious hall well lighted from windows during the day, and many electric lamps by night. The rooms on the front which have a south outlook, are for the patients. The furnishings are of the plainest and there is no superfluous space as everyone is supposed to spend most of the time out of doors. One large room in the west tower, called the reception room, is so arranged as to secure the sunshine (if there is any to be had) from the rising to the setting of the sun. The rooms facing north are devoted to the nurses' departments, linen closets, lavatories, and all the rooms of divers names and equipment which do to make an up-to-date hospital from which every one is to go forth cured. The floors of the bath rooms are concrete. All the other floors throughout the building are of birch, highly polished and finished at the edges with hospital base of the same wood. The kitchen department is well equipped and occupies the wing on the north end of the building.

## House in Town.

On Friday afternoon last at about 4 o'clock our town was the scene of a very bold invasion by a good specimen of that well known denizen of the forest, the moose. This adventurous fellow seemed to hail from the North Mountain. It is supposed that he swam the river and came up over the dykes. He struck Main street near the residence of Councillor Fitch. The animal walked leisurely along Main street west for some distance, when he again took to the fields and on out of range on his way to the South Mountain. One sportsmanlike gentleman is said to have aimed at the creature but without serious effect. Several who are 'good shots' refrained from trying a hand on account of the close season. We are pleased to know that in the 'springtime' Wolfville is so attractive that our friends of the forest cannot forbear paying us a fraternal visit, and enjoying a quiet walk about our pleasant avenues.

The other is "Soil Utilization," by E. Stewart, who shows that Canada can best employ her waste lands by turning them into forests. The departments are interesting and replete with photos, cartoons and pictures of current interest.

## Kings County Board of Trade.

The annual meeting of the Co. Board of Trade was held at Court House, Kentville, last Saturday afternoon. There was a good attendance of members from various parts of the county.

A number of new members were elected: President, C. O. Allen; president, J. A. Kinsman; secretary, H. G. Harris; auditor, Innis and M. G. DeWolfe; comptroller, W. Hubbard, E. A. Lewis, H. J. E. Kinsman, George McLean, Congdon, A. N. Griffin, Ainslie, J. L. Gertrude, Dr. H. Chi, W. C. Hamilton, Warden Balem, W. Pincio, A. E. McMahon, P. C. F. Rockwell, For Kentville, S. Eaton and J. W. Ryan. For Wolfville, F. J. Porter and B. O. Dav. The first subject for discussion was "Shall the Dominion government continue to subsidize the railway service." Mr. P. Innis moved the following resolution: "That this board recognize and appreciate the benefits derived our farmers and apple shippers the calling of the Canadian railway company at Halifax for the past four months, and would respectfully ask the Dominion government to continue the subsidy to the said company, provided their steamers call at Halifax at the beginning of the apple shipping season, and thereby accommodate the shipment of our apples."

Vice-president Kinsman took the chair and Captain Allen gave several reasons why the subsidy should be granted, and the competition continued. A lengthy discussion followed, in which R. S. Eaton, Captain Allen, P. Innis, J. E. Kinsman, Ainsley Bishop, George Pincio, W. H. Ryan and A. R. Griffin took part. The general expression was that competition had brought about great improvements in the past season, and if continued next year from early in the season, better results would follow. The motion was adopted unanimously.

Dr. W. B. Moore brought to the attention of the board the advisability of the different boards of trade and councils uniting in a measure to advertise the many advantages of the county for settlement of a good class of immigrants. He thought it wise to have an illustrated number of a paper printed and distributed in Great Britain.

The Intercollegiate Debate. New Oddfellows' Lodge.

A large and interested audience assembled in College Hall last Friday evening on the occasion of the intercollegiate debate between the representatives of Acadia and St. Francis Xavier Colleges. President Trotter was in the chair, and in addition to the program arranged the proceedings were enlivened by a series of comic songs, rendered heartily with much melody by the aggregation of students in the east gallery. The appellants representing St. Francis Xavier College were J. Harvey Hearn, ('05), of Sydney; A. G. McKinnon, ('05), of Antigonish; and Neil McCarthy, ('04) of North Sydney, who affirmed that the Imperial Federation with representation by population and a pro-rata contribution to Imperial Defence, with a protective tariff and freer trade relations within the Empire, would benefit Canada. For Acadia the team who responded and opposed the resolution was composed of A. B. Balem, ('07), Antigonish; V. L. Chittick, ('07), of Hantsport; and Fredrick Porter, ('06), of Fredericton.

The young men on both sides did admirably, carrying conviction alternately to the interested audience. The visitors were fluent and persuasive speakers and made an excellent impression, but the strength of argument and consequent conviction was rather on the side of Acadia, and the referee, Mr. Alexander McKay, in his decision, so awarded the issue of the contest. The debaters received many congratulations at the close from prominent men who were present.

Mr. N. N. Bentley, who resides in Wolfville, has had a good season's output in his lumbering operations in Hants Co. Last autumn he built a new mill and two lumber camps about three miles south of Clarksville, on the Midland, where over forty men have been employed. They have cut and yarded about 600,000 feet of logs and the most of this has been hauled to the siding on the Midland. The cut this winter is mostly pine and some of the logs scale three feet in diameter. In the summer Mr. Bentley will move his mill to Clarksville, where he will have a supply of logs brought in over a tramway.—Hantsport Advance.
