Editorial Brevities.

There is a slight decrease in the number of leprosy cases in Canada. The Lazaretto at Tracadie, N. B., had sixteen patients on Jan 1st and 24 at the same time last year. There were 4 deaths, 2 admissions and 2 said to be cured during the year. In the hospital at Darcy Island on the Pacific Coast, there are now no cases.

The people of Lesmington, Ontario, have sent \$10,000 to the Belgian Relief Fund, \$5,000 to the Red Cross and \$5,000 to the Patriotic Fund, making \$20,000 in all, from a town of less than 3,000 inhabitants. Lesmington sets a fine example to other cities and towns. Its women are also making large contributions of socks and other materials for the soldiers.

Some interest is manifest in the civic election, the date of which is now approaching. A largely signed requisition has been presented to Mr. C. S. Fitch asking him to accept a nomination for the mayorship. Mr. Fitch has given excellent service in the Council in past years and should make a good official. We understand he has accepted and there will not likely be a contest. Requisitions have also been circulated and largely signed for Messrs. J. E. Hales, F. J. Porter and A. M. Wheaton. Messrs. Hales and Porter were members of the Council last term. Several gentlemen have also circulated a paper for Mr. A. V. Raud, whose card appears in another place in this paper and speaks for itself.

Newspaper Space.

The Ottawa Journal, under the above heading, says editorially: "Every newspaper meets innumerable appeals to help worthy purposes by giving not merely news of them, but frequent additional free notices which, if desired by business concerns would be recognized to be advertising pure and simple, and be paid for as such. The plea, of course, which is generally accepted by newspapers—is that the charities of churches concerned don't aim at private profit, and have very little money anyway."

On the other hand, newspapers would like the public to recognize more than the public does that every line of newspaper space represents actual cash to the newspaper in cost. It is every free notice of a charitable or religious undertaking is simply a straight subscription equivalent to money from the newspaper. It is gratifying, therefore, to find a plain statement of the case from a source not affiliated with any newspaper, Mr. E. A. Moore, an officer of the State Charities Aid Association of New York, told a Charities Conference at Philadelphia recently that the newspapers deserved more credit than they commonly received.

The address was delivered before the first North Atlantic Tuberculosis Conference. Delegates representing seven of the Eastern States were there to consider ways and means for work of the general work of the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

We, said Mr. Moore, speaking of those engaged in the various branches of organized charity in New York State, do not ask the stationer to contribute the paper we use. We do not ask the owners of buildings we occupy to contribute our quarters. But we do ask the newspapers to do the equivalent by giving us space which is money to them. We want on:

Buy space. Advertise your work as business houses do, and you will get the best publicity in the world. I have seen city editors receive each morning high stacks of 'publicity matters' which countless organizations want them to print for nothing. It is not fair. All sorts of propagandists are flooding the editors with their matter, and they wonder why it is not printed. The newspaper can not afford to print it. And a gain, it is not news. We have adopted another method in New York. This year we will print 118 half page newspaper advertisements. We will get into the news columns only when we do something that is 'news.'

Our Cumberland lumbermen will probably produce this season the largest output in the history of the country. One concern, the Maple Leaf Lumber Co. of which J. J. Boy, of Amherst, is manager, has over 300 men in the woods at Follis Lake and vicinity, and expect to cut at least 12,000,000 feet of lumber. Chesley, the Lumber King, at Collingwood, has more men and teams in the woods than in several years past and will have a large crop. A. S. Carter, of N. B., has 150 men in the woods at Amherst and vicinity. The new Follis Lake and Collingwood operations are making big contributions to the war effort.

Municipal Council.

The Municipal Council of Kings County met at the Court House, Kentville, on Tuesday, January 12, 1915, at 10 o'clock.

Councillors all present. The Warden, T. H. Morse, Esq., in the chair. The Warden briefly addressed the Council. He referred to the unsatisfactory state of the assessment law and suggested that a change in the law might be made, under which a general assessor might be appointed for the whole Municipality and one assessor for each ward. This should assure some degree of uniformity in the assessment. Continuing, Mr. Morse urged the advisability of amalgamating the three poor districts of the Municipality and the erection of suitable buildings for the care of the poor and for the harmless insane.

The minutes of the April Term, 1914, and of special terms held Sept. 28th and 29th, were read and confirmed.

Read letter from C. A. Patriquin, Inspector under N. S. Temperance Act, drawing attention to the provisions of the Act that an inspector should hold office for one year from the date of appointment. As his appointment dated from Sept. 8th, he tendered his resignation in order that the Council might be in a position to appoint an inspector at the January Term, as usual.

On motion of Councillor Campbell the resignation was accepted.

The report of the Health Officer, Dr. P. N. Balcom, was read and adopted. A resolution was passed that the newspapers of the county be asked to publish this report. It will be found on the first page of this paper.

The report of Dr. W. H. Hattie, Provincial Health Officer, on the poor farms of the Municipality, was read. It criticized severely the Cornwallis establishment, that of Horton, unfavorably but less severely, while that of Aylesford received faint praise.

Coun. Campbell discussed the report, strongly advocating amalgamation.

The report of Auditors was read and adopted.

Read letter from Supt. of Education, suggesting the advisability of increase in per capita rate of taxation for schools.

A letter from Rev. F. H. Bais, Secretary of Kings County Temperance Alliance was read, asking Coun to name a committee to consult with the Committee of Alliance regarding (1) Appointment of Inspector (2) of Constables, and (3) of the best method of providing labor for prisoners in the County Jail.

Councillors Bowly, Campbell and Nichols were named to constitute this committee.

W. H. Robinson and M. E. Baker, Justices of the Peace to act in matters relating to Lunatics in Aylesford, wrote, asking attention of Council to case of Aubrey Welton. Referred to Committee on Lunatics.

Read Report of Chief Fire Ranger, showing deficit of \$201.86, on operations for the year. Ordered that amount be paid by the Municipality.

Read Report of C. A. Patriquin, Inspector under Temperance Act: Deficit, \$712.21, including salary (\$500) Councillor Campbell moved its adoption.

Coun. Bill objected. The Report was unsatisfactory in that it showed no results financially or otherwise. More liquor is sold in the County now than ever before, but the report shows no fines collected and no convictions.

Coun. Gaul said that now the liquor business was completely in the hands of people unable to pay. If the traffic is to be kept under, we must be prepared to pay the bills.

The Supervisors of Public Grounds in Cornwallis reported that they had sold 'Parade ground' at Town Plot for \$500. Expenses \$91.45, leaving balance of \$408.55.

In re proposed change in Parker Road, Aylesford, Coun. McNeil moved that the report of Commissioner Arch Foster, condemning the proposed change, filed at the April Term, be adopted. Carried.

Read petition to close road from D. A. Ruitway to Gasperus. Prayer granted.

The Alteration in Base Line Road, in Ward 14, J. K. Patterson, Commissioner, was approved, proceedings confirmed and road established.

In re proposed new road from Wellsford Street to Pleasant Valley Road crossing new railway near Grafton Railway Station, Mr. R. G. Power was heard. He stated that the road, as laid out crossed the railway at a most inconvenient place and asked that the location be changed to a point some sixty feet west. On motion ordered that the report be referred back to Mr. Patterson, the Commissioner, with instructions to make the suggested change.

On motion of Coun. Bill it was resolved that no further action be taken in re the removal of barn of Royal Household.

The new road from Lunenburg County Line to Lake Paul, damages \$175, was established as per report of Commissioner A. Foster.

The report of G. A. Bishop, Commissioner, to lay out rd. from Sunnyside to warehouse of Nye Messrs. Fruit Packing Co., was received and adopted and the road established.

New road in Canning through lands of Mr. Frederick Borden, J. A. North and Miss Beattie Lockwood, damages \$250, approved and established.

A bill of Mr. A. R. Evesham, asking that he be paid \$10 for five years service in turning water into the ditch at the top of a hill in Canning was read. Mr. Evesham was heard. Several Councillors expressed their appreciation of the manner in which Mr. Evesham had performed

the service, which had doubtless prevented damage that would have cost hundreds of dollars repairs.

Coun. Bill moved that the bill be ordered paid.

The objection was taken that there was no fund under the control of the Council from which claims for such service could be paid. Action on the matter was finally deferred.

Bill of Geo. R. Pines for land taken for change in road (\$10) was read. Committee on Roads and Bridges, through its chairman, Coun. Wood, reported that the road had been changed some fourteen years ago and that Mr. Pines was entitled to payment for land taken. Ordered that the bill be paid.

Read report of Commissioner to lay out road along waterfront in Canning (deferred from April term) Damages claimed, \$90.

Mr. Wickwire, the solicitor, stated that access had been gained to public documents, which were not—but should be—in the custody of the Council. These documents showed that the road in question had been laid out some fifty years ago and had damages fully paid. Resolved, that no further action be taken.

The Committee appointed to confer with the Committee of Temperance Alliance rendered report. First, that the Alliance had recommended A. M. Thomas, of Berwick, as Inspector; second, that no action was taken in re the appointment of Constables; and third, that it was proposed that male prisoners, undergoing sentence should be placed at labor on the highways under proper supervision. The Report was laid on the table.

Reports of Trustees School Lands, Cornwallis and Horton, were read and ordered filed.

Reports of Overseers of Poor for the three Townships were read. Cornwallis asked an assessment of \$2000; Aylesford \$1200; Horton \$500.

These reports was adopted, lively discussion taking place over that from Cornwallis. Coun. Bill spoke strongly regarding the methods of the Overseer. The S. P. C. has been compelled to interfere and require that children receive better care. Children going barefoot in the winter had been supplied with foot wear by charitable neighbors. The conditions at the Cornwallis poor farm are a disgrace to every resident of the Township.

Coun. Wood drew Mr. Bill's attention to the statement of Dr. Hattie and others, who had examined and criticized conditions at Cornwallis Poor Farm that the best care possible, under the conditions, is taken of the inmates of that institution. Coun. Bill intimated that inspectors generally saw matters at their best.

Coun. Campbell moved, seconded by Coun. Meek: Resolved, that in the opinion of this Council, the three poor districts of this Municipality should be amalgamated; proper housing provided for our poor and for the harmless insane of the Municipality, and that a Com. officer should be appointed to work out details and report at April Term.

After some discussion action was deferred to the following day, when an amendment was moved by Couns. Bill and Nichols to the effect that the consideration of the matter be deferred to April Term and that Councillors get in touch with their constituents through public meetings and that a committee of Councillors from the Township of Cornwallis be appointed to consider the erection of new buildings for Cornwallis and to report at April Term. This amendment was carried. Couns. Wood, Campbell and Nichols were named as members of Committee.

Resolved, that salary of Clerk of Overseer of Poor, Aylesford, be \$35 for present year. Carried.

The Treasurer's Report was read and adopted.

for tuberculosis patients. A petition for new road, Centreville to Upper Dyke Village, was read and referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges which later reported favorably. The report was adopted and Arch Foster appointed Commissioner.

Bill of A. M. Thomas, \$28.75, for serving notices issued by supervisors of Public Grounds, Cornwallis, was read. Supervisors Chipman and North were heard. It was finally decided to defer action to April Term.

Appointment of officers for Municipality, Townships and Wards were made. The several Councillors filed lists of persons nominated for the latter, which lists were approved and the persons therein named, duly appointed to the offices to which they had been nominated.

Assessors appointed were: Ward 1, Geo. Kerr, Harold Kinsman; a Leader Woodworth, Aubrey Borden; 2, Albert Benoit, Jos. Harris; 4, H. Ulley, K. W. Congdon; 5, Harold Finney, F. H. W. Fickwick; 6, D. MacDonnell, D. Nelforth; in Cornwallis, P. Innes; 7, Jas. Gertridge, Fred Ellis; 8, S. A. Bowser, Geo. Bishop; 9, F. G. Curran, Walter Hutchinson; 10, S. F. Banks, Spurge Bowley; 11, E. H. Saunders, C. Gault; 12, W. E. Selridge, F. W. Foster; 13, R. Harlow, Geo. L. Webster; 14, J. Forman White, F. Saunders.

The resolution authorizing a temporary loan was passed; the amount was \$6000 instead of \$5000 as formerly. On motion, P. Innes was heard in reference to an irregularity in the assessment books regarding his property. He also spoke forcibly regarding the imperfections of the system of assessment and urged the adoption of a system under which one assessor would value all the properties in the county, thus securing an approach to uniformity.

A bill of J. E. Coleman, Jailer, for the board of prisoners, had been referred by the Committee on Accounts to the Council. Many of the persons named had been imprisoned by order of the Recorder of the Town of Kentville and it was claimed that such fines as they paid went into the treasury of the town it was unfair that the municipality should bear the expense of their maintenance.

B. Webster, Esq., Recorder of Kentville, explained that the matter of support of criminals was a matter of joint service between Town and Municipality. That the expense of maintenance of inmates of the jail was born by the town and the municipality in proportion to their respective property valuations. That a larger number was sent by the Town of Kentville, than by the Municipality was true, but few of those so sent were residents of the town. They were generally visitors from the country districts or tramps, committed out of charity, so to speak. It seemed unfair that the Town should bear the full cost of maintenance in cases such as these.

On motion the matter was referred to the Committee on adjustment of joint service, to report at April Term. Concluded Next Week.
