EFFECT OF COLD ON THE PHYSICAL ENERGIES.—Bayard Taylor gives the following account of the effects of extreme cold upon the Finns:

"I was at first surprised to find the natives of the North so slow, indolent, and improvident. We have an idea that a cold climate is bracing and stimulating—ergo, the further North you go, the more active and energetic you will find the people. But the touch of ice is like that of fire. The tropics relax, the pole benumbs, and the practical result is the same in both cases. In the long, long winter, when there are but four hours of twilight to twenty of darkness—when the cows are housed, the wood cut, the hay gathered, the barley bran and fir bark stowed away for bread, and the summer's catch of fish salted—what can a man do, when his head of wood or hay is hauled home, but eat, gossip, and sleep?"

"To God, and out of it at eight in the morning, smoking and dozing between the blow performance of his few daily duties, he becomes as listless and dull as a hibernating bear. In the summer, he has perpetual daylight, and need not hurry. Besides, why should he give himself special trouble to produce an unusually large crop of fax or barley, when a single night may make his labour utterly profitless? Even in midsummer the blighting frost may fall. Nature seems to take a cruel pleasure in thwarting him; he is fortunate only through chance, and thus a sort of Arab fatalism and acquiescence in whatever happens, takes possession of him. His improvidence is also to be ascribed to the same cause. Such a fearful famine and suffering as exists this winter in Finland and Lapland might no doubt have been partially prevented, but as human power could have wholly forestalled it."

DANGEROUS ENCOUNTER WITH A BEAR.—We recently exceeded to have a good deal of Mr. James Tweedy of Williamsport, and his son, were seriously injured in an encounter with a bear on the night of Tuesday last. It appears that on the night previous the bear had killed a sheep belonging to Mr. T., and a portion of it and left the remainder in the field. Near this place, behind the fence, John, son of Mr. T., conceived himself with a long stick, and the bear came up and attempted to finish the sheep, when he might have an opportunity of firing at it. The night was very dark, and quite unexpectedly the bear, a huge monster as the sequel will show, approached from the other side, reared himself up, and was looking down over the fence upon him, when as soon as he espied, he thrust the muzzle of the gun into his mouth and fired, the bear tumbled over, to all appearance dead; he had blown the front part of his upper jaw entirely away. He then returned to the house reloaded his gun, and his father came out with him to assist in what they considered a dead bear. But as they approached the fence they saw him making away as fast as he was able, and when about 30 yards from them, the young man fired again; but this shot had no other effect than to enrage the bear, which immediately turned about, coming with rage, rushed upon them in a moment, struck Mr. Tweedy to the ground, threw his huge carcass upon him, tore him most dreadfully and would have killed him only for his son, who thrust at him with a sharp weapon. The bear then left Mr. T. and rushed upon his son, the first blow he struck him broke or dislocated his arm, and was about making a finish of him when Mr. T. struggled to rise, and planting his foot on the gun which lay on the ground, broke it to pieces, and the bear, when he again left the son whom he had at this time terribly mangled, and rushed again at Mr. T. struck him senseless to the ground, tore him with his claws, bit him with his teeth, but fortunately for him the front part of the upper jaw had been carried away with the shot, which prevented him doing that mischief with his teeth which he otherwise would, the teeth of the bear only taking effect. Miss Tweedy hearing the noise from within, ran out and seeing the dangerous position of her father and brother, picked up a large hardwood mallet, about 3 feet long which lay near the door, and laid on the bear's head with it till she released her father. He then rushed at her, tore her clothes to ribbons, knocked her down, but she managed to extricate herself, without receiving any particular injury, and continued the assault, dealing most unmerciful blows on his head, belting him right and left, till he was glad to stagger off to a short distance from the scene of conflict and—die. The excitement was so great that as soon as she reached the house she fainted.

Her father and brother are now receiving medical treatment from Dr. Benson. The former is terribly lacerated about the breast, and otherwise badly injured—the latter has had his arm dislocated and is considerably hurt, but not dangerously. The bear is one of the largest ever seen in this quarter. He weighed about 5 cwt. Their escape from such a monster is considered almost miraculous.—Merrill's Times.

THE PRODUCTS OF THE WEST.—The wappasons of Buffalo, New York, are crammed to their utmost capacity with grain, flour, and general produce from the West. Fresh cargoes are continually arriving, but there is no one to receive them. The banks, in many instances, have advanced the freight, taking the whole cargo on security. One firm has now ten steam boats lying at West Troy, heavily laden with valuable produce, and they are unable to raise the money (\$5000) to pay the toll.

On a recent occasion, Brigham Young delivered an address, which consisted of little more than a tirade of abuse against the United States. He said that the provisions, wagons, &c., would go to Salt Lake, but the troops never.
