





LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

The Local Government is in session to-day. Dr. JENNINGS crossed at the Cape to-day and will be home to-night. The Legislature of this Province will meet for the dispatch of business on next Tuesday. Bonanza's hotel, on the Western Road, Lot 12, was burnt to the ground on Friday week. Mr. GOMMON BREWERY, late of the Toronto Globe, has been appointed Registrar of the Surrogate Court of Ontario. SATURDAY NEXT (St. Patrick's Day) will, by order of the Lieutenant Governor, be observed as a Holiday in the Public Offices. Mr. JOHN YEO's shoe store was broken into on Sunday night last, and a considerable amount of leather goods and lace abstracted. Great preparations are being made by the Committee of the Benevolent Irish Society, having in charge the celebration of St. Patrick's Day. KING'S COUNTY ELECTION CASE. Question Referred to Committee. STRENGTH OF PARTIES. Government Two to One. Special Despatch to the Herald. OTTAWA, March 14. After a debate in which the ablest speakers in the Commons took part, the King's County (P. E. I.) Election Case has been referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. The vote on the division stood:—For giving the seat to Robertson, sixty; for reference to Election Committee, one hundred and eighty-eight. These numbers show the strength of both sides, as it was a strictly party vote. There were twenty Conservatives absent, and ten Liberals, so that it will be seen that the former are, as nearly as possible, two to one in a full house. With the exception of one occasion, when Sir John and Mr. Blake had a sharp encounter, the discussion was conducted in a conciliatory manner, but the logic was certainly all on the Conservative side. The Russian Minister of War prohibits all connection with the press of persons serving in the army.
