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Inspector Duvar Talks About Mackerel.

A correspondent of the Halifax Herald had an interview recently with Colman Hunter Duvar, Inspector of Fisheries for this Province, upon the subject of the mackerel fishery, and from a report of the conversation, published by our contemporary, we make the following extracts:

Why it is I asked the Inspector,

that the Gulf of St. Lawrence is the great mackerel fishing ground of the Atlantic?

Well, he replied, "I think that the

first French navigators who discovered Canada started on their return home a safe seas, if I remember the words right—a vast gulf, teeming with fish, mackerel and others. In later times, Americans—then, of course, our own countrymen—no doubt finding the fishing for these same mackerels better in our waters, will be sure to have come over ever since. One refers to history for such things.
