"Bishop of the Lepers" Talks of his Work.

(Jean B. Sabate in the New York Daily News.)

The Right Rev. Libert Boeynaems, of the Catholic Diocese of Hawaii, better known all over the Catholic world as the "Bishop of the Lepere," was in the city last week. He returned on the Red Star Line Zeeland, after an extended visit to Europe, during which he paid his first visit to the Pope.

Notwithstanding the inevitably tiresome and nerve-wrecking labors which are the lot of a missionary Bishop in a tropical country, Bishop Libert is a magnificent specimen of bigotry. virile manhood. A descendant of the energetic Flemish race, he has

the stature of an athlete. His strong and manly physiognomy is softened by the reflect of a paternal goodness. In him one feels that an indomitable and generous heart is beating.
