That is my ideal of perfect love.

It seems to me that one does not love in the best and deepest way unless one can say, "I would want to see the one I love happy even if it had to be with someone else."

Of course it is terrible when one must stand aside and see anyone for whom one cares deeply happy with someone else, but I think one should know that even under such conditions one could sing a little song of rejoicing for his happiness in one's soul, even at the same time the heart was breaking.

If men and women tested their love by asking themselves if they could feel that way under those conditions, and none married who could not honestly believe that they would, there would be no divorces.

It is not an impossible ideal. It is a hard one, but hard does not mean impossible.

St. Patrick's Day Parade a Great Success—The Scene at the Church—The Banquet and the Many Entertainments—The Celebration at St. Laurent College—The Board of Control Doing Good Work—Railway Earnings.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

The Parade.

The parade was the finest for years, over four thousand took part in it. St. Anthony's and the two young parishes of St. Aloysius and St. Thomas Aquinas turned out strong and made a good showing. The Irish jaunting car with five of St. Ann's young men in it was a feature of the parade. There were several bands and nearly a hundred youngsters on horseback; they were gaily decorated with green ribbons, sashes, rosettes and shamrocks. The uniformed Knights of the Hibernians made a pretty sight and went through some fancy drill movements during the march. The Hibernian Cadets also won their share of applause. The Mount St. Louis College band of sixty pieces captured the honours by their fine music rendered along the route.

St. Patrick's Society Banquet.

The banquet given by the St. Patrick's Society at the Windsor Hotel was the most successful on record, and was attended by nearly three hundred guests.

The dinner was marked by the attendance of representatives of many kindred national societies, whose officers sat at the guest table, wearing their chains and other insignia of office. The chief guest was Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who made an

excellent speech, as a business man an Irishman and the head of a great transportation company.

Sir Thomas referred in his address pointedly to the relations which Ireland bore to the Empire, pointing out that they could not endure as they were, and evidencing the relation of Canada to the Empire as an example of the manner in which Ireland's destiny could be worked out.

A notable feature of all the addresses given was their strong loyalty to the Empire, coupled with their devotion to the cause of Ireland as a part of that Empire.

Mr. H. J. Kavanagh, K.C., president of St. Patrick's Society, presided assisted by Mr. J. W. Percival, president of the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society, while amongst those at the guest table were Messrs. Jas. Mitchell, president of St. George's Society; Jos. Jenkins, president of St. David's Society; Lieut.-Col. D. Lock-erby, president of the Caledonian Society; Rev. Father A. M. O'Neill, O. P.; Mr. Justice Puresell, J. C. Beauchamp, president of St. Jean Baptiste Society; Rev. A. A. Gagnieu, S. J.; Mr. Justice Guerin, Senator J. Cloran, Canon Gauthier, Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, Mgr. Bruchet, Mayor J. J. Guerin, Rev. W. B. Martin (New York), ex-Judge C. J. Doherty, Rev. Father Gerald McShane, C. C. Smith, Rev. Raymond Walsh, Hon. J. J. Ritchie, M. Fitzgibbon, and Lieut.-Col. Gardner, president of St. Andrew's Society.

In the afternoon St. Patrick's Literary and Debating Club held its annual banquet, at which over one hundred attended; Mr. Thomas Liddy, of Torbay, was one of the guests. The College orchestra enlivened the proceedings with Irish airs, while the students made excellent speeches.

The Board of Control.

The Board of control is certainly living up to expectations and is doing good work for the betterment of the long-suffering city. They are proving their worth step by step. Civic graft is now dead and buried, let us hope and for ever.

Railway Earnings.

Railway earnings continue high during March, as they were during February, showing heavy increases over last year in both passenger and freight business all over the country. And not merely do they show substantial increases over this season last year, when the country was rallying from the period of depression, but they are well ahead of the earnings for the banner year, 1907, as they have been since the beginning of the year. The growth in increases on the Grand Trunk has been particularly noticeable for some time past, showing that the improved business is felt in Eastern as well as Western Canada.

For the week ending March 14th, the traffic earnings of the Grand Trunk were \$852,620, as against \$709,819 for the same period last year, an increase of \$142,801. The gross earnings of the Canadian Pacific for the same week were \$1,615,000, as compared with \$1,461,000 last year, an increase of \$154,000.

A Noisy Striker.

For uttering the word "scab" Julius Kearns, one of the strikers of the cloak industry, was fined \$5 and costs by Acting Recorder Lanctot. Meeting three women coming out of the Sommer factory last Saturday afternoon, Kearns shouted at them "Hello, you three scabs." Special detectives employed by the firm arrested the man and brought him to Court on a charge of intimidating workers. Judge Lanctot remarked that strikers must be quiet on the streets and must not interfere with people who did not choose to stop work and worked for the wages offered them. He took occasion to warn those who might take example on Kearns.

A Murderer's Paradise

America is establishing an unenviable notoriety as a paradise for murderers. This is probably due to the delays of the law and the almost interminable length to which murder trials can be dragged out. There is also prevalent a general recklessness in the matter of human life to such an extent, that the safest place soon will be the murderer's dock. The loss of life and limb which goes on in the mines, workshops and on the railways is appalling, and the only recompense afforded by the Trusts and Companies takes the form of philanthropy—Rockefeller foundations and Carnegie libraries. On the subject of "A Murderer's Paradise," the Review of Reviews has the following:—

"According to Mr. Andrew D. White, former President of Cornell University and first Plenipotentiary of the United States at the Hague Conference of 1899, the American Republic bids fair to beat creation as the most murderous of all civilized countries. Belgium has more murderers in proportion to her population than any European country, but her maximum is only one-eighth what is now the American normal. The number of murders in the United States has gone up with leaps and bounds. In 1890 there were only 1,500 murders. In 1909 there were 8,000. Canada just across an imaginary geographical line on the same Continent a new country also peopled with the most adventurous people of the Old World, keep down her murder average to one-forty-third the American ratio. Why is this? Admitting that the United States has far greater masses of Old World lawlessness to deal with than Canada, the fact is insufficient to account for the enormous excess of murders in the Republic. Mr. White attributes it largely to the sympathy bestowed on criminals and the immunity which murderers consequently enjoy. Capital punishment has been practically abolished, and the assassin flourishes.

AN APPEAL

TO PATRIOTIC NEWFOUNDLANDERS.

Our island has a triple reason for its title of most Ancient Colony of Newfoundland. It was discovered by the men of Bristol, under the guidance of John Cabot in 1497, and was thus the earmarked for the English Crown; Sir Humphrey Gilbert confirmed England's title by formally assuming sovereignty over it in 1583, and the little village of Cupids in Conception Bay is now the oldest colonial settlement in the British Empire. It is just three hundred years since John Guy and his little band of settlers planted themselves at Cupids, and the event is so full of significance for us, and for the Empire, that it behoves us to commemorate it in some worthy manner.

The St. John's Historical Society, acting in conjunction with a Committee of residents in Cupids and after much consideration, decided to endeavor to raise funds to purchase the lot of ground at Cupids, on which it is believed Guy's house was built, and to erect upon it a granite monument with an inscription, recording the event which we are celebrating. It is hoped that enough funds will be secured to purchase sufficient ground to form a little park or pleasure ground about the monument.

In addition to this, natives of Cupids who are now living in Canada have purchased and sent down a steel flag staff to be erected on the water-side.

The Mayor and corporation of the City of Bristol, when appealed to, readily offered to assist in the commemoration, and have subscribed the handsome sum of £150 towards it. The Government of Newfoundland has also promised a subscription, and this appeal is now made through the press for donations from all who desire to encourage, that feeling of pride in one's country and home, which is such an important incentive to progress.

The estimated amount required to purchase the ground, and to erect the monument and the flag staff, is \$2000 including the subscription of the City of Bristol.

Interview With Mr. H. D. Reid.

Mr. H. D. Reid being interviewed by the Telegram to-day on the subject of operations contemplated by the R. N. Co. this season, said that by the first of June they expected to have 5,000 additional names on their payroll. Work would begin early in May on the Bonavista Branch. All the rails, spikes, fish plates, etc., have been ordered from the Carnegie firm at Pittsburgh. They will enlarge their car sheds and repair shops and will put up a first up to date foundry. They will extend their freight handling facilities to meet the growing demands of the business. Mr. Reid said that this work may not be accomplished till next winter, but a beginning would be made as early as possible. The Company have ordered for the Bonavista Branch the material for the construction of two locomotives of the same class as No. 9 and No. 10, the latest imported by them from the Baldwin Company in Philadelphia. "We have also ordered," said Mr. Reid, "two baggage cars, two first class cars and two second class cars, also ten box cars. All will be here by the fall." The equipment made necessary by the construction of the proposed branches will necessarily be quite large, and as the work goes on the Company will have to be in a position to supply the stock required in large instalments. The radical departure from the old system will call for a larger premises, a larger plant, and operations generally will be on a larger scale. Mr. Reid when spoken to about the report that the Company intended to get a new sealing steamer, said that there was no truth in the report. Railway work and freight and passenger carrying was their business and they would not interfere with the fisheries.

The Ships' Turnout.

Yesterday 8,235 seals were turned out from the Viking and were ground up at Bowring's South Side premises. The seals are averaging to-date 43 1-2 lbs. net. The men started at 4 a.m. and concluded at 6 p.m. Working at this ratio the ship will be discharged to-morrow evening and the crew will be paid on Thursday.

LORD ROSEBERY ON REFORM OF LORDS.

Speaking on the debate on the Address in the House of Lords the Earl of Rosebery, having referred to the statements of the Prime Minister made just before the election, said he did not think Mr. Asquith was bound in the least by any interpretation placed upon his statements by others, but it could not be denied that uncontradicted interpretations from authoritative quarters which were placed on those words must have a considerable effect on the minds of the electors. "After all," Lord Rosebery continued, "we meet in a very strange condition of affairs. The election is unique in being an absolute disappointment to every party engaged in it. But one feature worthy of serious consideration as members of the House of Lords is that a majority has been returned to Parliament animated by the greatest animosity to this House. Remember, whatever you may say about the majority in the House of Commons, there is one thing which every man will say who has had anything to do with the election in Scotland or north of the Humber or Trent; he will tell you emphatically that, wherever a Unionist candidate attempted to gain a seat they broke their shins against the hereditary character of the House of Lords. I do not wish to see this House forced to take measures under compulsion, and which will call for a larger premises, a larger plant, and operations generally will be on a larger scale. LORDS SHOULD MAKE THEIR OWN PROPOSALS.

After all, what is the real issue? I hear a great deal of thundering against the veto of the House of Lords. There is no more veto of the House of Lords than there is veto of the House of Commons. It is a matter of the Constitution of the Legislature. If in the course of centuries

one of the two branches is not in all respects up to the requirements of the times, it is for that branch to strengthen itself in accord with the wants of the time. It is not a question of veto, but a question of the Constitution of the Second Chamber. I presume it will be legislation such as that portrayed in the resolutions of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman. I admit it is right, in a sense, to wait for the proposals of the Government themselves, but we should take the opportunity now of setting our views before the country. I believe the country is opposed to the hereditary principle, and is equally determined to have a Second and efficient Chamber, and if we do not set our hands to the work somebody else will do it for us. Mirabeau said, "Of all tyrannies the most insupportable is that of a single Chamber." It is because of that tyranny, which seems to overshadow us, and which it is the aim of many should overshadow us, that I venture to urge your lordships not to delay, but to take your salvation-belay in your own hands and proceed with the task yourselves. —(Cheers.)

Maggie and Grace Here

The barqt. Maggie, Capt. Parsons, arrived here this morning after a run of 23 days, molasses laden from Barbados, consigned to Job Bros. The ship had fair weather till the last 5 days, and Sunday night had a N. N. E. gale with a heavy sea. On the run to Bahia she had had weather off that coast but coming up to Barbados had it fine.
The brig. Grace, Capt. John Jaekman, arrived from Halifax to A. Goodridge & Sons to-day with a cargo of hay, hard coal and dork. She left there yesterday week and had bad weather almost the entire run. Thursday and Friday rain, snow, sleet and thick fog was experienced on St. Pierre Bank. The ship it will be remembered had a hard time on the run to Halifax taking 30 days to get there. She suffered much damage and had to be dry docked for repairs.
Last year 554 mail and passenger steamers called at Plymouth, England, to land or embark 25,959 passengers, 178,242 bags of mail, and specie to the value of \$35,576,728.

Harlaw Has 14,000.

The S. S. Harlaw, Capt. J. A. Farquhar, arrived here at 2 o'clock yesterday from the Gulf seal fishery hauling for 14,000 seals.

The ship left Halifax on the 2nd inst., and had intended to call at the Magdalen Islands with mails but could not do so owing to the heavy ice barrier around the islands. After she reached Channel on the 7th inst., she signed a crew of 100 men for the seal fishery, and after leaving Channel on the 10th, she separated from the other ships of the fleet on the 11th near Bryon Island and took a N. W. course, the other ships taking a southerly direction. Shortly after 5 o'clock that evening the first white boat was taken, and next day some others were seen, but the main patch was not struck until 4 o'clock on the 14th. This was about 60 miles N. W.

by W. of Bryon Island, and soon all hands were engaged amongst the harps killing, and about 1,000 were accounted for. Next morning the ship became jammed with the Southern Cross quite near her, but this did not affect the work as seals were plentiful all round the vessel. The men were thrown out early and again engaged in killing, sculping and panning. The weather was very propitious, good work was done, and on the 16th 2,200 were hoisted on board, and the 17th nearly 3,000, on the 18th and 19th 1,500 and 2,500, respectively, were secured, and Sunday and Monday most of the seals panned were hauled to the ship. She had now her catch practically on board and she made ready to bear up for home, Tuesday, but owing to a S. W. gale had to remain in the shelter of the ice. Wednesday, the 23rd, she bore up for Codroy, at daylight, when 25

miles N. E. by N. of the Bird Rocks. She made a good run to Channel. The man who contracted small pox was taken ill shortly after the ship struck the fat, but was kept isolated from the rest of the crew.

The ship was quarantined at Channel. Some 24 of her crew were vaccinated and transferred to the schooner and were placed on quarantine. The rest of the crew had been vaccinated before going in the vessel and after their clothing had been fumigated and disinfected they were allowed to go home. There are only about 20 men of the original crew on the ship which is being discharged at Job Bros. by labourers.

Some of the men on the ship believe that the Kite and Labrador will have good fares, while others believe the ships missed the patch and went down the Straits in search of seals.

52 Persons Killed

And 87 Injured in a Quintette of Train Wrecks—Dead Mutilated Beyond Recognition in Rock Island Disaster—Winner in Beauty Contest One of the Victims.

Marshalltown, Iowa, March 21.—Forty-four persons were killed and 40 injured, many of them fatally, in a wreck four and a half miles north of Green Mountain, Iowa, to-day of a Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific passenger train.

A little freight wreck on the Rock Island last night at Shellsburg was the indirect cause of the disaster. The Rock Island line was blocked and it became necessary to detour over the Great Western tracks. Two trains, consisting of 13 cars, sent from Cedar Rapids to Marshalltown, were coupled together and the two locomotives were running backwards. A Pullman was next to the locomotives. Then came a smoking car and a day coach. In the latter were many women and children.

The double train was going about 25 miles an hour when it reached a cut five miles from Green Mountain, at the top of a hill. In this cut the tender of the front locomotive jumped the tracks. This threw the head locomotive into the sides of the narrow cut. The clay of the sides was soft and the engine went into it and stopped almost instantly. The sudden stoppage dethroned the second locomotive, and the momentum of the heavy train crushed the day coach and the smoking car against the heavier Pullman. The smoking car and day coach were telescoped, and hardly an occupant of either car escaped death or injury. So complete was the destruction of the smoking car that not a single upright was

standing. The floor alone remained as mute witness of the frightful impact of the car ahead.

The dead were mutilated in many cases beyond recognition. Heads were severed from the bodies, arms and legs were cut off; here lay a bleeding trunk, there a head with the agony of death still on the countenance.

Coroner Jay was hastening in a red cross ambulance to the hospital when he was thrown to the pavement as the ambulance rounded a corner; his back is broken and he cannot live. The body of Professor L. W. Parrish, of Cedar Falls, teacher in economics at the State College, was one of the first to be taken from the ruins. Mortally wounded, he was rushed to the hospital, but he died in the ambulance.

Miss May Hoffman, of Waterloo, was accounted the most beautiful woman in Waterloo. She was one of a party of three couples who were starting on a pleasure trip. She was horribly crushed and mangled. Several months ago she took third prize in a national beauty contest, and recently won a prize as a stenographer in a competition.

Canadian Pacific.

Nelson, B.C., March 21.—At McNeillie siding, on the Crow's Nest branch of the Canadian Pacific, on Saturday, a freight train crew was shunting the cars, the engine and tender became detached, jumped from the rails, and plunged 150 feet down the embankment to Goat River, turning somersaults as they fell. On the engine were engineer Carson, brakeman Campbell and fireman Ford. Campbell and Ford were killed outright. Carson has a leg broken and internal injuries.

Great Northern.

Winnipeg, March 21.—The Great Northern Winnipeg Flyer left the rails one mile west of Rogor, Minn., 6:35 last night. Seven cars went into a ditch. The engine, baggage and mail cars were overturned. Engineer Michael Connolly, of St. Paul, and baggageman Smith, of Minneapolis, were killed. Fourteen passengers, all Americans, were injured.

HUNDREDS BURNT OR TRAMPLED TO DEATH IN HUNGARY SUNDAY.

Hungary, March 28. The village of Oekoert and the adjacent districts have been thrown into mourning by the terrible disaster which occurred at the former place last night and which resulted in the death of between three and four hundred persons, and the serious injury of one hundred others. A public ball was held at the hotel of the village, and the coach house had been fitted as a ball room. It was a great barn-like structure decorated with dry branches to which were added for the occasion, other decorations and Chinese lanterns. The building was so packed, just before the ball commenced, that the single door which afforded entrance and exit was nailed up to prevent the admittance of scores outside. While the dancing was in full swing a pine branch caught fire, and fell to the floor, it blazed furiously, and almost instantly the dresses of several of the women were in flames. A dreadful panic ensued, the revellers losing their heads completely, women and men fell and were trampled under foot. Those in front vainly endeavoured to tear open the door but were crushed helplessly by the pressure of the crowd behind.

Roosevelt Denounces Assassination.

CAIRO, Egypt, March 28.

Colonel Roosevelt delivered an address before the students of the University of Egypt to-day. He was cordially received, and at the conclusion of his remarks there was much applause. Mr. Roosevelt upon entering the hall of the University found it crowded by officers, students and women. Prince Amid Pourad, President of the University and an uncle of the Khedive, introduced Mr. Roosevelt with a brief speech in French. Responding to the welcome Mr. Roosevelt expressed his thanks, but said his address was intended only for the students of the University. As a man who spoke frequently, he warned his auditors to have nothing to do with the man who did not make good his works by acts. The speaker referred to the assassination by a student last month of Boutros Pasha Ghali, Prime Minister, as a calamity to Egypt, and his denunciation of the assassin was received with great applause.

New Italian Ministry.

Lugi Lussit, Minister of Agriculture in the Cabinet which resigned March 21st, has practically decided upon the Ministry of the formation of which was entrusted to him by King Victor Emmanuel. It will include the Marquis Adl Sangulifuro, Foreign Minister, who held his office in 1906; four members of the Giuffe, three radicals, and Signor Pantano, who was Minister of Agriculture in the first Senino Ministry 4 years ago.

New Swedish Princess.

Crown Princess Gustave Adolph of Sweden, formerly Princess Margaret of Connaught, gave birth to a daughter to-day. The other children of the Crown Prince and Princess are Prince Gustave Adolph, born in 1906, and Prince Sigvard, a year younger.

ATTRACTIVE FUNCTION.

The Opening of the New Armoury for the C. L. B.

The C. L. B. new Armoury was opened last night with great eclat. Long before the hour of opening the street in front of the building was thronged. Hundreds were obliged to return home not being able to gain admittance. It is estimated that there were over 4,000 in the hall.

After the band had played Hayden's "Creation" the Lord Bishop dedicated the hall for the C. L. B. and then pronounced the Benediction. "Fight the Good Fight," the Brigade hymn, was then sung by the audience and played by the band. His Excellency Governor Williams then formally opened the hall. In his address he referred to the fact that though Newfoundland had as yet no recognized body of volunteers, yet the forming up of the Boys' Brigades would be an important step in this direction. It was the boy that made the man, and he hoped that the lessons learned in youthful days would not be forgotten. The early training given boys in Brigades would result in more lively patriotism and love for the Empire which was the greatest that the Almighty ever permitted to exist. True the greater portion of the Empire was separated by the seas. This should make us more loyal, as loyalty can pierce distance. He hoped that every possible effort for the defence of the Empire would be made, not that he expected war but that love of Empire would prevail. His Excellency then declared the Armoury opened, and expressed the hope that the Newfoundland Volunteers would be the next movement. Cheers were then given for His Excellency. The band having played an appropriate air, after which Lieut.-Col. Rendell delivered an address on the finances of the Brigade. When the building was commenced the Brigade had \$7,000 on hand. The entire cost of the Armoury when finished would be about \$16,000. The intended cost was first set down at \$13,500. It was believed that about \$2,500 would be required. A sum of \$1,500 had been already collected and the debt now may be set down at about \$7,500. He referred to the fact that this money had not been begged for but that full value had been given for the money. Receipts were as follows:—

The balance had been made up by receipts of concerts given by Miss bright and her pupils. Besides a large amount of free labour had been given by Messrs. Davey Bros., Mr. Hall and ex-C. L. B. members. Mr. Rendell referred to the great advantage the hall would be to the working boys who would get every chance for exercise and recreation. On behalf of the Brigade he expressed his thanks to the British Government for the gift of 1,000 rifles, and to Sir Edward Morris who although pressed with affairs of State found time to attend to the interest of the Brigade. He thanked His Excellency the Governor for his able speech and his great kindness in coming to open the Armoury.

Several marches were given by the Brigade Band during the collection, after which the National Anthem was played. The Armoury is a fine building and a great credit to all concerned. A detailed description of it has already appeared in the Telegram.

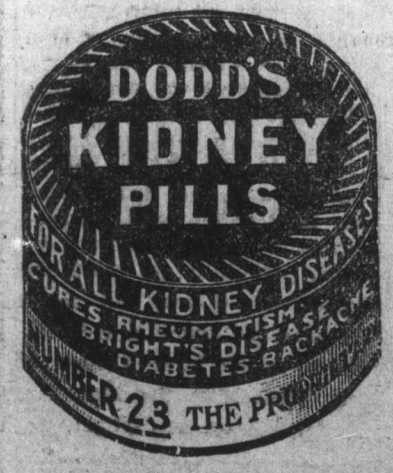

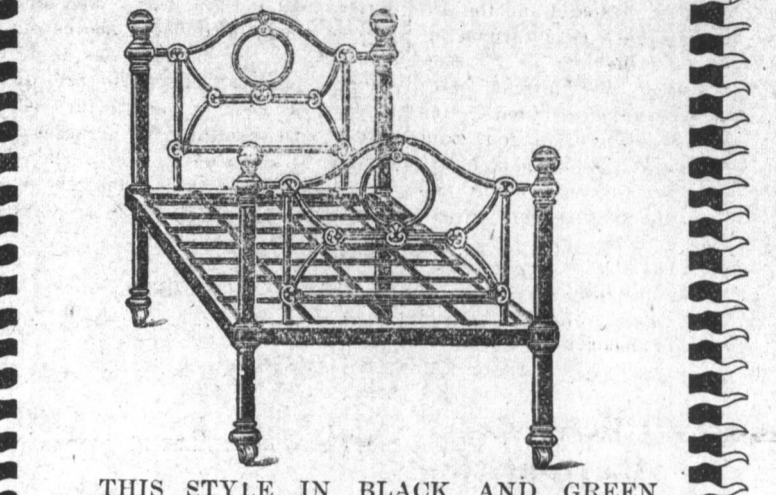
Not Smallpox.

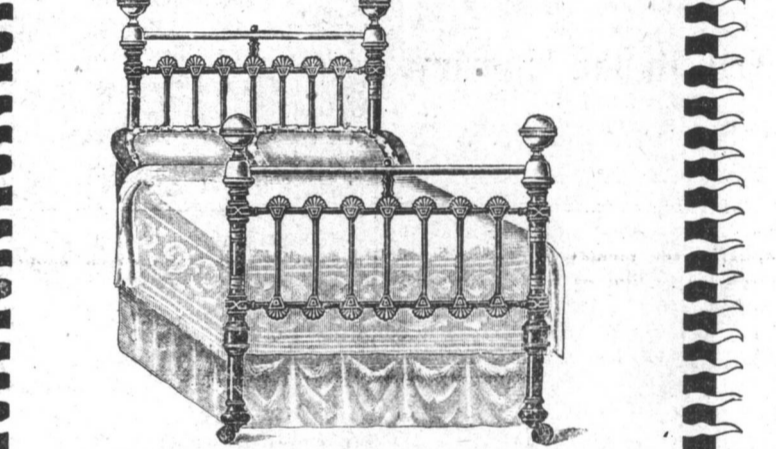

McAuliffe's Picture of the "Matthew" Entering the Narrows.

We learn that Mr. McAuliffe is desirous of selling his picture of the "Matthew" entering the Narrows, to the Government or some other public body. Mr. McAuliffe has chosen St. John's for the site of Cabot's Landfall, and pictures a ship of the Cabot period outside the Narrows. Mr. Gosling, the honorary secretary of the local committee of the Festival of Empire, wrote to him asking for a loan of the picture to send it to the Crystal Palace for exhibition as the work of a St. John's artist. In reply Mr. McAuliffe stated he wished to sell it, and that the price in Boston was \$500. He is prepared to make a special price to the Government or the Historical Society. He will probably send some other picture for exhibition in the Newfoundland Court at the Crystal Palace.

Mr. McAuliffe was a St. John's boy, who served his full time here to sailing-making and was well-known to Mr. Isaac Morris and others. While working at his trade in Boston, he came into prominence as an artist from a picture of the ship "Constitution," renowned in American history.

Messrs. Vickers, Sons and Maxim recently entered into a contract with the Spanish Government to construct a warship on Spanish soil. The Espana is now being rapidly rushed to completion at Ferrol, Spain, by the above-named firm. She will be of 14,763 tons, driven with four screws, and Parsons' turbines will be installed, giving her a speed of 19 1/2 knots.
