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



An enquiry by competent persons and an authoritative statement to the public are very desirable.





From Policeman to Mayor.

Then, a year or two back, Kingstonn-Thames did justice to one of its hardest workers on the local council by electing Councillor Clarke to the mayoral seat. No man in the place was more highly respected than the popular signalman, and in proof of this no fewer than 300 railwaymen, headed by Mr. Richard Bell, accompanied Mr. Owen to church on his first visit there.


