Lost Two Men.

The s.s. Glenmarvis, Capt. Tin-mouth, arrived in port last night with two thousand tons of coal, after a A sure cure for persons afflicted with rough and eventful passage of fourteen days from Cardiff, and reported the loss of two of her crew, an Irishnan and a Portuguese. The steamer left the other side of the water or Wednesday, June 11th, and at the outset there was a slight westerly breeze which increased as the passage advanced. After being four days at sea a strong gale from the S.S.W. raged with mountainous seas running. The vessel, although deeply laden, was knocked about badly. Early the next morning the ship began to roll nuch, causing the cargo to shift. Or the same day, Monday, June 16th, two able scamen, George Butler, an Irishman, and Antonio Jose, a Portuguese, were lost. At eight o'clock in the morning they were seen standing on the deck tightening on the hatches and a half an hour later were missing. Nobody, said Capt. Tinmouth to-day to a **Telegram** reporter, saw the men lisappear. It was very rough at sea at the time and the assumption is that the unfortunate fellows were carried off the deck with a heavy wave and drowned. Both seamen were unmarried. The sad affair has cast a gloom over the ship which is on her maiden yoyage. She was built in Londonderry and was only launched on the 4th June. She is owned by Messrs.
