FATALITY AT QUALICUM. NANAIMO, June 7.—(Special)—A telegram from June 7 today says Harry Thames, of Qualicum, shot himself through the head with a revolver yesterday.

LONDON, June 7.—The final event of the bayonet bouts, dismantled, at the military tournament in the Agricultural Hall, Islington, was won to-day by Private Stewart of Canada, who defeated Private Wesson of Canada, thus winning the first prize of £5.

CANADA WINS AGAIN. LONDON, June 8.—At the royal military tournament at the Agricultural Hall, Islington, to-day, the bayonet fighting between the Regulars and Colonialists the prize was carried off by the 48th Canadian Highlanders.

THE CROWN AGAIN PREMIER. MADRID, June 6.—The Queen Regent has confirmed Senor Canovas, the Premier, in his ministerial power, and the cabinet will remain in office with the personnel unchanged.

THREE FIREMEN KILLED. SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—A fire in the southeastern part of the city at noon to-day cost three firemen their lives and entailed a property loss of \$100,000.

RAILWAY MEN BENEFIT. OTTAWA, June 7.—The special committee appointed to inquire into the railway bills of Messrs. Casey and Maclean reported to-day to the main features of Mr. Casey's bill as amended.

THE BRITISH ASSOCIATION. TORONTO, June 7.—(Special)—At a meeting of the British Association committee on Saturday it was announced that the government of Manitoba agreed to spend \$500,000, and that of British Columbia \$1,000,000, in showing the natural resources of these provinces to visitors.

A MISSING SHIP. PHILADELPHIA, June 7.—Heavy premiums are being asked for re-insurance on the British ship Crown of Scotland, which sailed from Philadelphia on November 22 for Japan.

MONTREAL, June 7.—(Special)—Tribulation is threatened between the English and French societies in connection with the Jubilee parade. The parade was actively taken in hand by the St. Jean Baptiste Society, who made no provision for the English societies.

QUARANTINE AGAIN.

The opponents of the Empress line to the Orient are using the quarantine regulations at this port to draw travel from Asia to San Francisco instead of Victoria and Vancouver. In every Asiatic seaport notice is conspicuously given that saloon passengers are not detained in quarantine at San Francisco, and the detention of the passengers on the Empress of China is being used for all it is worth, and a great deal more.

It is the opinion of the best medical experts and the practice of the great commercial centres of the world sustained such a system of quarantine as is considered proper and necessary at William Head in regard to saloon passengers, there would be nothing to be said on the subject; but as the detention of saloon passengers, under such circumstances as those in the case of the Empress of China, is opposed to the best expert opinion, and is without parallel in any of the great commercial cities in Europe or any other part of the British Empire except Canada, we urge the Department of Agriculture to take into consideration the propriety of forthwith revising the quarantine regulations so that saloon passengers may in all cases be permitted to proceed at once to their destination after disinfection and medical examination in the case of infected vessels. This being a practical, and not merely theoretical question, we shall not discuss any question as to the merits of extending different treatment to the saloon passengers to that accorded to those in the steerage. Oriental immigration and business, and pleasure travel from the Orient are distinct matters, and ought to be treated differently.

It is certainly a great mistake and very unparliamentary for the British Columbia correspondents of American papers to send out exaggerated accounts of floods and matters of this kind. It is true that if their stories are sensational they sell better, but this consideration ought to have very little influence with right thinking people.

The Columbia promises great things in regard to its campaign against the local government. We shall see what we shall see.

This reference to Mr. Laurier, which was as graceful as it was unexpected, was received by the house with cheers. Such incidents are very pleasant and do much to soften the asperity of politics.
