THE HORSES THAT WILL BE ALLO TED WEIGHTS NEXT WEEK.

A Good Entry List-Betting on the Suburban—Argonant Rowing Club Annual Meeting—Toronto Defeated at Evanaville—
The N.A.L.A. Meeting—Spots of Sport.

The Ontario Jookey Club handleaps, which closed on Wednesday last, certainly have an excellent showing, both as regards quality and quantity, and the club is to be congratulated on its success. The popular handleap, the Cash, 1½ miles, shows an increase over last year, while the class of horses is also much better than in any previous season, including such good ones as Drake Carter, Harry Cooper, Minnie Palmer, Purse, Shamrock, Lady Reel, etc. It will afford the handleappers a rare chance to equalize the horses and convince the public that they understand the true meaning and intent of a handleap, viz., to give every horse named in a handleap with the humblest pretensions of racing form the same chance of catching the judge's eye as the best horse in the Race.

The ability of handleapping is one of the latest and horse in the latest.

there is certainly no sense in giving purses with weight for age, as in nine-tenths of such races the horse who is master of his weight and dis-tance, all things being equal, is almost sure to win; but in order to equalize the horses and give all presumably equal chance handleaps were invented, so that upon purely republican principles the sovereignty of weight should level all distinction.

But as charming as the idea may appear it is purely fictitious, as no reasonable difference of weight can bring an indifferent horse in both speed and stamina upon an equality with a good race horse over a distance of ground, for every furlong in distance makes a decided difference between horses of nearly equal merit in speed but differing in stamina. Weight which would bring a dozen within a space of two lengths at a link in three-quarters of a mile would separate the same lot more than a distance at one-and-a half miles.

The top weight should not be less than 130 pounds, and might be 135 pounds. Then the handicapping may have a chance to equalize the good horses at least, and show to the public that they have not only uone what handicappers are expected to do, study the form of the various horses, but so adjusted the weights that the result will be in doubt until the race is over. Certainly no owner can complain if the moderate horses shall have a chance to pass the winning post first, and such an adjustment of the weights will bring to the post fully as large a field as the system of allowing the best horses, moderately weighted, ich save the finish to themselves and the field strung out behind them for a furlong.



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

Cayuga, on account of its central location, was chosen as the capital of Haldimand County, but Dunnville is larger and more important commercially. 

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
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
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
