THIRTEENTH YEAR.

DUAL LANGUAGE DISCUSSED.

MR. ARMSTRONG INTRODUCES HIS RESOLUTION.

Two Amendments by Clarke Wallace and Mr. McCarthy. The latter says: "The House has come to face the question of the House discussing the Motion for Several Hours."

OTTAWA, May 30.—This being private members day the House has got through with quite a fair amount of work such as it was, and the order of business presents a much slimmer appearance than is usual at this stage of the session.

The first business was the announcement of the Speaker that the seat for Frontenac had been vacated by the acceptance of the office of Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario by the Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick.

The Dual Language Resolution. After a few unimportant questions had been answered, Mr. Armstrong moved his resolution:

"That it is expedient that power be given to the Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories after the next general election of members of said territory to determine the use of dual languages in the courts and the proceedings of the assembly, providing, however, that no school section as at present constituted shall be interfered with without the consent of the parties composing such section."

In support of his motion he said that he acted entirely for himself and not for his party. He thought the matter ought to be settled and that the fairest way to settle it was to leave it to the people of the Northwest, as his resolution proposed.

He said that he had an utter abhorrence of the idea that it was the duty of the majority in this country to stamp out the language of the minority.

Mixed Race a Strength. He considered mixed race a strength rather than a weakness to a country and instance the case of Great Britain as an argument.

There are one million persons, spoke Welsh, and no one thought they should be compelled to use their own language.

Clark Wallace has an Amendment. Mr. Clarke Wallace thought the resolution was a contradictory one and the part of it dealing with existing schools was likely to prove a heavy burden to the Northwest as other provinces, especially with regard to dual language he was not quite satisfied with the compromise offered at two years ago.

In conclusion he moved in amendment: "That in the opinion of the Northwest Territories, should be empowered to deal with all matters relating to education in the Northwest Territories."

Mr. McCarthy speaks. The debate was opened by Messrs. MacMillan, Devlin, Scriver and Macdonald, (Toronto) after which Mr. McCarthy said: "I am glad to see that the matter will be faced now. The Northwest has always been a bilingual territory, and it was not to be shown why the powers of the Assembly should be limited in regard to education in favor of the Northwest Assembly being given the main control of Parliament taking back into its own hands the question of dual language."

The House then adjourned. The debate was continued by Mr. Mills up to 10 o'clock, when it was adjourned until the rules of the House, and it is doubtful whether it will be reached again this session.

Sunday Observance. After recess Mr. Charlton's Sunday Observance Bill was taken up and occupied all the evening. The bill was passed on the motion to go into committee on the bill a division took place and the motion was carried by a vote of 70 to 50.

In the committee a long discussion took place on the clause relating to work on newspapers on Sundays and the clause was finally struck out by a vote of 26 to 10 against.

The clause relating to running trains on Sundays was slightly amended and the committee rose at 11:30, reported progress and asked leave to sit again.

FOREIGN NEWS OF A NIGHT.

HOW ULSTER WOULD BESETT A DUBLIN PARLIAMENT.

Paris, May 30.—A curious kind of a race began yesterday from Bordeaux to Biarritz and back, a distance of 203 miles. Eighty-one men left the Hotel de la Gare at 8 o'clock in the morning, moving in a line to test their speed and endurance.

THE WHITE MAN KNOCKED OUT IN THE FIFTH ROUND.

After the First Coupo of Bonnets It Was Evident That Slavin Had No Chance Against Jackson. The fight between Slavin and Jackson was a close one, but Slavin was knocked out in the fifth round.

London, May 30.—The National Club was crowded to suffocation to-night with spectators anxious to witness the Slavin-Jackson fight. The entrance became so much obstructed by the crowd that the owner of the building refused to allow any more to enter without a ticket.

PROUD OF CENTRE ISLAND.

Will Have No Hotel—Music For the People—Mimico Electric Railway.

The Parks and Gardens Committee decided yesterday afternoon during the summer 22 band concerts should be played in the parks of the city. Of these, 9 will be played in the Queen's Park, 4 in the Gardens, 1 in Riverside Park, 2 at the Centre Island, 1 at High Park and 3 at Bellwoods.

The Mimico Electric Railway Company made an offer of \$400 for the strip of land at Sunnyside, lying between the Grand Trunk tracks and the lake, or \$150 for enough that property to allow them to lay their track, or track space at \$200. The matter will probably be settled by arbitration.

Mr. Peter McIntyre came before the committee with an offer to accept a lease of a lot at Centre Island in exchange for lease of a city property which he already holds. He proposes to erect a large hotel and boarding house there. This offer did not at all meet the views of the committee, who feared that the hotel would degenerate into a saloon, and the Centre Island now a picnic ground, a resort for bilious young men.

AT THE BOARD OF TRADE.

The Business Dispatched by the Council Yesterday Afternoon.

The council of the Board of Trade met yesterday afternoon, the president, Mr. H. N. Board in the chair. The election of delegates to the London Chamber of Commerce resulted in the following gentlemen being appointed: Messrs. H. C. Gill, F. H. Burton and the president, H. N. Baird.

A communication was received from the National Mining Congress, Helena, Montana, inviting delegates to attend the second session of congress and transmitting blank credentials.

Communications were also received from the Rochester Chamber of Commerce favoring the construction of a bridge over the Niagara River and asking for a date to be fixed upon which Toronto will receive a delegation of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce to visit Toronto.

An informal meeting of the Parks and Gardens Committee was held in the Mayor's office yesterday afternoon to consider a proposition made by the Industrial Exhibition Board. Briefly it is as follows: Twenty acres lying on either side of Danforth-street was originally granted to the city for exhibition purposes. A large part of that is at present under lease. The Exhibition Board greatly need \$150,000 to make the necessary changes in the grounds owing to the annexation of the Garrison Commons. They ask the city to issue debentures for \$150,000 on the leased property already mentioned, promising, if when that property is sold it does not realize the amount of \$150,000, that the city would be satisfied. The proposal was considered a very fair one and will probably be submitted to the people in the near future.

Will They Move the Church? A joint meeting of the Session and Board of Managers of St. Andrew's (King-street) Church was held yesterday afternoon to consider the advisability of removing the church to a more central and convenient situation. A special committee presented a report on the subject. The matter is still under consideration, and the purpose of the committee's communication has not been made public. The committee has been enlarged, and will bring an additional report having further particulars.
