

A critical examination of the speed of the English railway trains, writes a correspondent, does not sustain the emmonly accepted notion of their great velocity, nor prove that progress in accelerating speed which was to be looked for in the country where the failway was born and cradled. The fumous 'Flying Dutchman,' on the Great Western Railway, makes the run from London to Exeter; 194 miles, in four hours and fourteen minutes. With four stops it attains a speed of almost forty-six miles an hour.
