LIVE STOCK AT THE CENTENNIAL, PHILA-DELPHIA.

A happy solution has been reached of the troublesome problem how to provide adequately for that department of the International Exhibition which comprises horses, mules, horned cattle, sheep, swine, etc. It was manifest that these could not be accommodated in the vicinity of the Agricultural Building of the Exhibition, or within the Park enclosure, since, in the first place, the only available drainage of any such tract must be into the Schuylkill at a point above the Water Works of the city and of the Exhibition; and next, the area of disposable ground in that locality is wholly unequal to the magnitude of the live-stock exhibition to be provided for.

In this emergency the Board of Finance have been fortu. nate in leasing from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company the stock-yards, above twenty-two acres in extent, which are now used as drove-yards by that company, but from which they intend to remove in December next, and which are situated upon the south side of its main line of tracks between Belmont avenue and Forty-first street, within a few hundred feet of the principal entrance to the Exhibition Grounds. This ground is passed by street railways on both of the bounding streets, as well as by the Pennsylvania Railroad, which will erect a depot upon it for passenger accommodation, and has already sidings and platforms within the enclosure for the unloading of animals, so that these can be brought by rail from any point of transshipment. The existing shedding will be cleared away, and the whole surface handsomely renovated and supplied with stalls of a convenience and neatness unusual at live-stock exhibitions. Many of the impor tant preliminaries are already provided, since, in addition to the essential railroad facilities already mentioned, water is now distributed throughout the entire tract by service pipes twenty-five feet apart; thorough drainage can be secured through the adjacent city sewers; much of the surface is

paved; large numbers of neighboring sheds and barns provide sufficiently for storage of hay, grain, etc.; and hotels hard by, formerly used by the drovers, will accommodate exhibitors and their agents. When it is added that the area of the land is such as to admit the construction of a half-mile track for the exercise of the animals and their examination by the judges, it will be seen that the managers of the Exhibition have provided the means of giving its due prominence to this very important department of the Agricultural Exhibition.

Special series of live-stock exhibitions have been provided for as follows:—Horses, from September 1 to September 15; neat cattle, from September 20 to October 5; sheep, swine, dogs, from October 10 to October 25; poultry, from October 25 to November 10.

Persons who intend making entries for this exhibition should do so without delay, in order that the managers may be able to estimate the number of stalls and extent of other preparations that will be needed. In the large Agricultural Exhibition Building, though it covers ten acres, so many applications for space have been made by exhibitors of agricultural products and machinery as to necessitate an enlargement of the original plan. The display of live stock is likely to be no less popular; and those wishing to participate in it, even though their applications may require future amendment, should lose no time in communicating with Mr. Burnett Landreth, Chief of the Bureau of Agriculture, International Exhibition.

English Stallion-purchasing Subscription.—Lord Calthorpe has inaugurated a project for raising £10,000 in annual subscriptions of £100 for five years, to accumulate a fund for the purchase of ten or more perannum of thoroughbred sires of sound constitution and good action, such as no private capitalist would find it profitable to purchase. These stallions are to be placed each year in a district to be selected by a judicious committee, and travel through it for the purpose of serving half-bred mares only. At the end of five years, fifty choice stallions, purchased by the association, would have begotten five thousand foals of superior mares. This would have a powerful influence in elevating the breed of horses in the country.

TERMS OF SALE.—Cash on delivery. At the option of the Board, Notes at 6 months, with approved security, will be accepted from individual purchasers. Societies desirous of making available for this sale their Annual Grants for 1875 (payable at the end of December) may arrange to do so by previously applying to the Secretary of the Board.

The Horses and Cattle to be kept for service in the Province for a term of five years, the Sheep and Pigs for three years.

In order to encourage the more general diffusion of Thorough-bred Stock throughout the Province, the Board have determined to allow a discount on the sale prices of 10 per cent. to all purchasers from the Island of Cape Breton, and of 5 per cent. to other purchasers who reside at a distance of not less than 30 miles from a Railway Station. No discount will be allowed upon animals purchased for localities within a distance of 30 miles of a Railway Station, and should any animals not be taken forthwith to the localities for which discount is allowed, the respective purchasers will be required to refund whatever amounts of discount they may have received.

Animals must be taken charge of by purchasers immediately after the sale.

All the animals are in a perfectly healthy condition; none of them have been fed up for competition or sale. In the case of animals of sufficient age, the greatest care has been taken to select only those actually known to be fertile and free from vice and all other ascertainable faults.

For convenience, and in the interest of purchasers, the fullest information that can be obtained is given in this Catalogue, nothing whatever being withheld that might affect—either beneficially or injuriously—the value or utility of any of the Stock; but the animals will be sold entirely at the risk of the purchaser, with all faults and errors of description, should any appear.

The Horses were selected in the Province of Quebec and in the State of Maine by Donald Archibald, Esq., M. P. P., Chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the House of Assembly, and David Matheson, Esq., of Pictou, a Member of the Central Board of Agriculture. This splendid Bull is of the fashionable Wild Eyes or Winsome tribe, and it will be seen from his pedigree that his breeding is remarkably pure in that line. His sire, Grand Duke 10th, is also sire of the two thousand guinea cow sold at Whitehall on 9th Sept., and of many other animals of the highest value. Wild Eyes' Cow, Lady Wild Eyes, was sold at the Conishead sale to Lord Skelmersdale for 820 guineas.

Baron Lightburne was purchased at the sale at Conishead Priory of Alex. Brogden, Esq., M. P., of Lightburne, near Ulverston, North Lancashire, England, on 14th Sept., 1875. Mr. B. is one of the oldest established and best known of Short Horn breeders in the North-west of England. The following is Mr. Thornton's description of the animals offered at the Conishead Priory sale:

"This catalogue contains the pedigrees of a large number of very highly bred Shorthorns of the fashionable Bates blood. They have been selected and bred from the celebrated herds belonging to the Duke of Devonshire, Earl of Bective, Mr. Cheney of Gaddesby, Mr. Foster of Killhow, Mr. Harward of Winterfold, Mr. Harvey of Walton-on-the-Hill, Mr. Leney of Waterinbury, Mr. Roberts of Lillingstone Dayrell, Mr. Slye of Beaumont Grange, and other noted breeders. Of late years few tribes have risen more highly in public value than the Winsome (or Wild Eyes), the Princess, and the Kirklevington; these tribes have each several representatives, while the Waterloo family, so admired at Gaddesby, has three specimens. The Gwynnes, another branch of the Princess tribe, is well represented, and there is also a very choice heifer of the Lally tribe, as well as two of the Barrington, both of which spring from one source. At Holker last year the Rose of Raby tribe was in great request, and the catalogue contains three members of this favourite family, as well as two of the highly fashionable Cherry tribe. MEAT-PRODUCT PER ACRE

Mr. J. J. Mechi, one of the leading scientific farmers of England, considers meat-making one of the main points of his agricultural success. He regards it as an essential point in good farming, to make meat and manure in summer as well as in winter. This, however, cannot be done without shelter for animals, combined with good ventilation to protect them from flies and other insects; with proper provision for this necessity, he has succeeded in putting on both growth and fat in summer-time. He acknowledges that there is no profit in feeding stock at market prices, but where a farmer has sufficient capital and knows how to use it, he will find stockfeeding profitable, on account of its sure product of the best and cheapest manure he can obtain. Mr. Mechi finds his margin of profit in the very large grain, root, and green crops which he is thus able to raise at a cost below market-prices. He gives the following balance-sheet of his live stock operations for 1874 on his farm of 175 acres at Tiptree:

The increase in value of the live-stock and poultry at the end of the year was £188 3s., or £51 5s. 6d. less than the amount paid for new animals during the year. This deficit shows the extent to which the whole live stock value, old and new, was reduced, and must be deducted from the aggregate sales to show the net meat-product of the year. This will leave £684 8s. 6d., which, at 9d. per pound, gives an average of 104 pounds of meat per acre, worth £3 18s. The total cost of feed, including produce raised on the farm and purchased from without, amounts to £717 16s. 5d., from which deducting the wool sold, £43 14s. 10d., there remains £674 1s. 7d., or £3 16s. 4½d. per acre as the actual cost of production, leaving a margin of only 1s. 71d. per acre to pay for labor and attendance, which is estimated at £100 in the aggregate, or 11s. 5d. per acre. Mr. Mechi's profit, then, must have been in the raising of his home crops, and in the fertilizing elements added to his land by his abundant produce of manure.
