STANDING RULES AND REGULATIONS

—OF THE—

COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION

—OF THE—

UNITED COUNTIES OF STORMONT, DUNDAS AND GLENGARRY,

As Revised and Adopted by the Council, October, 1886,
and as subsequently altered and amended.

Meetings and Adjournments of the Council.

1. The Council shall meet at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the Court House, Cornwall, unless otherwise especially provided; and if at the time appointed there be no quorum, the Warden, or the Chairman appointed in his absence, may take the chair and adjourn with the consent of the majority then present. Hours of meeting and adjournment
2. When the Council adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Warden or Chairman leaves the chair. When members shall leave seats.
3. Whenever the Warden or Chairman is obliged to adjourn the Council for want of a quorum, the hour at which such adjournment is made, and the names of the members then present, shall be inserted in the minutes of the Council. When names to be taken down.
4. When a quorum is present, the Warden or Chairman shall take the chair and call the members to order. The roll shall then be called. Appearance of a quorum.

Minutes.

5. Immediately after the Warden or Chairman shall have taken the chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk. Any error or omission in the minutes shall then be corrected by the Council. Minutes to be read.
- All the reports, by-laws and memorials adopted by the Council shall be printed in the appendix to the minutes. When reports etc. to be printed in body of minutes.

Warden.

6. In the election of Warden, the names of the candidates shall be placed in the hands of the Clerk immediately after the members shall have taken their seats, and in case of more than one candidate being proposed, then the Clerk shall name two scrutineers from the members present, and shall proceed to take the vote by ballot. He shall check the vote after being counted by the scrutineers, and shall declare the number of votes cast for each candidate: he shall continue the ballot—dropping the name of the candidate having the least number of votes—until a majority of the members present has been obtained for one of the candidates, when he shall declare the candidate who has so obtained said majority duly elected. In case of a tie the question shall be decided as provided by R. S. O. 1887, chap. 184, sec. 227. The Election of Warden.

7. The Warden or Chairman shall preserve order, and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Council. Order, etc.

8. When the Warden or Chairman is called upon to explain a point of order or practice, he is to state the rule applicable to the case without argument or comment, and when objection is taken to the ruling of the Warden or Chairman, members may discuss the point of order before the vote is taken. Points of Order, etc.

9. In case the Warden shall not be in attendance the Clerk shall call the meeting to order until a Chairman be chosen, who shall When chairman is to be chosen.

preside until the arrival of the Warden. If the Warden or Chairman desire to leave the chair for the purpose of taking part in the debate, or otherwise, he shall appoint one of the members of Council to fill his place until he resumes the chair.

Members Speaking.

10. Every member, previous to his speaking to a question, shall rise and address the chair.

Two or more members rising.

11. If two or more members rise at once, the Warden or Chairman shall name the member who is first to speak.

When members may not vote.

12. Every member present, when a question is put in Council, shall vote thereon, unless the Council shall excuse him.

Order when putting a question.

13. When the Warden or Chairman is putting a question, no member shall walk out of, or across, the Council chamber; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member hold discourse to interrupt him, except to order, nor pass between him and the chair.

Members called to order.

14. A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Council, if appealed to, shall decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal the decision of the chair shall be submitted to.

15. No member shall speak beside the question in debate.

Members may request motion to be read.

16. Any member may, of right, require the question or motion to be read for his information at any time of the debate but not so as to interrupt a member speaking.

Limitation of right of speaking.

17. No member other than the one proposing a question or motion (who shall be permitted to reply,) shall speak more than once on the same question, without leave of the Council, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which must be void of improper personalities.

Strangers.

Strangers.

18. No stranger shall be admitted within the bar of the Council without permission from the Warden or Chairman.

Rules of the Council.

Rules in Committee of the Whole.

19. The rules of the Council shall be observed in a committee of the whole Council, excepting the rules limiting the number of times of speaking, and of taking yeas and nays, and the rule requiring that motions shall be written and seconded.

Divisions of the Council.

When names to be recorded

20. Upon a division of the Council, the names of those who vote for, and of those who vote against the question, shall be entered upon the minutes, if any member require it.

Motions and Questions.

Motion to adjourn.

21. A motion to adjourn the Council shall always be in order, except when a vote is being taken.

Motion to leave the chair in Committee.

22. In committee, a motion that the Chairman leave the chair shall always be in order, and shall take the place of any other motion without debate.

What motions need not be in writing.

23. No motion, except for adjournment, for going into committee of the whole on By-laws or Reports, or for receiving Reports and Petitions shall be debated or put, unless the same be in writing, and seconded.

Motions not to be withdrawn without leave.

24. After a motion has been read by the Warden or Chairman it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Council; but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment, with permission of the Council.

Motions on questions under debate.

25. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received unless to amend it, or commit it, or to postpone it to a certain day, or for the previous question, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment.

26. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment and debate of the main question; and shall be in the following words, "Shall the main motion be now put?"

The previous question.

27. A motion for commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment to the main question.

Motion for commitment

28. All questions, whether in Council or Committee, shall be put in the order they are moved, except in filling up blanks; the shortest time and the lowest sum shall be put first, and amendments shall take precedence of original motions.

Order of questions.

29. No motion having a preamble shall be admitted by this Council; but resolutions may have preambles.

No motion to have a preamble.

30. Every motion when seconded must be received and read by the Warden or Chairman in Council, except in cases otherwise provided for in the rules.

Reception of motions when seconded.

31. It shall be the duty of the Warden or Chairman in Council, whenever he shall conceive that a motion which he has received and read, is contrary to the rules of the Council, to apprise the Council thereof, immediately before the question on such motion is put, and to all the rules applicable to the case.

Motions contrary to rules

32. No motion for a grant of money, the discharge of any special committee, or for the appointment or dismissal of any officer, or for the introduction of any charge against an officer of the County, shall be made until after one day's notice thereof has been given; except upon recommendation of a standing committee.

Motions requiring one day's notice

By-Laws.

33. Every By-law shall be introduced by a motion for leave of which one day's notice shall be given, specifying the title of the bill, or by a motion to appoint a committee to prepare and bring it in, or by order of the Council on the report of a Committee.

Mode of introducing

34. No By-law shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

Two readings before commitment Amendments reported by Committee

35. All amendments made in Committee shall be reported to the Council by the Chairman standing in his place. After report, and the By law has been read a third time, it shall be subject to a debate and amendment in Council, before the question to pass, sign and seal shall be decided.

Readings.

36. Every By-law shall receive three several readings, previous to it; being passed, which readings may be on the same day, unless objected to by three or more members present, and all motions for the introduction of the several readings of By-laws, and the passing, signing and sealing of the same shall contain, as well as the number, the title of the By-law.

Three readings on different days

37. When a By-Law is read in the Council, the Clerk shall certify the readings and the time on the back.

Clerk to certify readings

38. By Laws committed to a Committee of the whole Council shall first be read throughout by either the Clerk or the Chairman, and then debated by clauses, leaving the preamble and the title to be last considered.

To be read in Committee of the Whole

39. When a By-law passes the Council, the Clerk shall certify the same with the date thereof at the foot of the By-Law, and shall be signed by the Warden and Clerk and have the Seal of the Corporation attached thereto.

When passed by the Council, to be certified

Petitions.

How presented 40. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Council shall be presented by a member in his place, who shall be answerable to the Council that they do not contain improper or impertinent matter. Every petition, remonstrance, or written application intended to be presented to the Council may be delivered to any member thereof, and the member to whom it shall be given shall examine the same, and endorse thereon the name of the applicant and the substance of such application and sign his own name thereto, which endorsement only shall be read by the Clerk, unless a member shall require the reading of the paper, in which case the whole shall be read.

To be examined and endorsed

Endorsement to be read, or the petition if required

41. No petition or account shall be received by this Council after the second day of each meeting, unless it shall arise out of any matter before the Council.

Papers Laid Before the Council—Form of Reading.

Papers addressed to the Council to be read by the Clerk. 42. Papers laid before the Council, or referred to a committee for their consideration, are of right to be read once by the Clerk or Chairman at the table; but when once read to the Council or Committee, they are then like every other paper that belongs to the Council, to be moved for to be read, and if objected to, to be decided by taking the sense of the Council or Committee.

Committees.

Committee of the Whole. 43. In forming a Committee of the whole Council, the Warden or Chairman shall leave the chair, and shall, before leaving the same, appoint a Chairman to preside, who shall have the same authority in the chair of the Committee as the Warden in the chair of the Council, and in other Committees the Chairman shall have the same authority.

Motion to rise and report. 44. On motion in Committee to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

45. When in the Committee of the whole a motion to rise has been put and carried, before any definite action has been taken in respect to the matter under consideration, the subject referred to Committee shall be considered to be disposed of in the negative.

Members referring motion, etc., to Special Committee to be one. 46. When a member introduces a by-law, petition or motion, upon any subject, and the same is referred to a special committee, the member introducing the by-law, petition or motion, shall be one of the Committee without being named by the Council.

Majority of Committee to form a quorum. 47. A majority of any Committee may proceed to business.

Standing Committees.

48. In the first Session of the Council in each and every year, standing Committees, to consist of not less than seven members each, besides the Warden, shall be appointed to the following purposes, viz:—

All Documents relating to those subjects shall be severally referred, unless referred to Special Committee.

49. The several Committees on Education, County Property and Roads and Bridges shall meet the second day of each Session of Council at 9 o'clock a. m., and those on Finance and Assessment,

and Printing and Communications, at 2 o'clock p. m.
50. The Committee on Equalization shall consist of the Reeves of the several Municipalities, and in their absence of the Deputy Reeves

51. The Warden shall, for the purpose of consultation, as well as of voting, be ex officio a member of every Committee.

Warden ex officio of Standing Committees.

Orders of the Day.

52. The orders of the day shall have preference over any motion before the Council.

Orders of the day to have preference to motions. To be taken up in succession.

53. When any order or orders of the day shall be left undisposed of at the time of an adjournment, either for want of a quorum or otherwise, such order or orders shall be taken up in succession as the first business after a daily routine at the next meeting of the Council.

Routine Business of the Council.

The daily routine business of the Council shall be as follows: -

Collison and Coulter, thanked the Council for the honor conferred upon him.

MOTIONS.

Upon motion of Mr. McNaughton (Lancaster), seconded by Mr. Lawson, this Council adjourned for ten minutes to allow the Warden-elect to take his declaration of office.

The Warden, having duly subscribed and made his declaration of office before Mr. J. A. McDougald, J. P., Council resumed.

The minutes of the last day of the last November session were read by the Clerk, and upon motion of Mr. Ault, seconded by Mr. Adams, were adopted in Council, and signed by the Warden and Clerk.

First—The Treasurer's statement ending 30th December, 1893, shows a balance of cash on hand of \$1,123.59, after payment of all outstanding notes and accounts.

Second—The notes for \$8500, at present under discount, is for expenditure upon River Beaudette Drainage improvements. Your committee think it advisable that this sum should without delay be covered by the issue of debentures chargeable to the municipalities interested.

Third—The arrangement between the Treasurer and the Bank of Montreal met

with our approval. The Interest account shows a monthly credit on our operating accounts, and the total interest paid during the past year for all purposes is the smallest for many years.

Fourth—Your committee find that the municipalities are in arrears at the close of the year in the amount of \$13,071.25. This amount should be chargeable with interest as in the past.

Fifth—We regret to find that the excess of expenditure over revenue for 1893 amounts to \$1,279.09. The auditors' report reads as follows, and says: "The various rates ordered by the Council under the several by-laws have been duly levied, and are shown in the foregoing accounts, and also to the reduced general rate of taxation, and also to special expenditure, there is a considerable deficit this past year in the Revenue and Expenditure account."

Sixth—The expenditure on account of the several county registry offices should be met by a further special levy on each respective county in June next, and your committee would so recommend.

Seventh—Your committee recommend that the following gentlemen be appointed county officials and officers for the current year at the following salaries, viz.:

C. J. Mattice, Treasurer, at a salary of \$800, and \$100 in lieu of the percentage allowed by statute for certain collections, in all	\$900 00
A. I. Macdonell, Clerk, at a salary of ..	400 00
Allan Cameron, Caretaker, " ..	150 00
Arthur H. Plimsole, Auditor, " ..	50 00
Duncan McMartin, Messenger " ..	100 00

Eighth—Your committee recommend that a by-law be passed authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow a sum of money not to exceed three thousand dollars, for general purposes, if the same may be necessary before the June sessions.

Ninth—The bonds of the Treasurer will expire on 1st March next, and your committee would recommend that they be renewed at the proper time to the satisfaction of the Warden.

Tenth—We have carefully examined and passed accounts on General Counties' account, amounting to \$788.28, as shown per Schedule A hereto attached.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Sir and Gentlemen,—Your committee having been assured by H. H. Ross, Esq., Member for County of Dundas, that the Dominion Government will furnish funds for completing the Nation River Drainage work, for a sufficient outlet for the great area of drowned or flooded lands in the County of Dundas and other western counties, if the ratepayers interested would furnish and construct a suitable dredge to do the said work, a deputation written on Hon. C. F. Fraser, Minister of Public Works for Ontario, for the purpose of procuring from the Ontario Government financial assistance to build the said dredge. Your committee have been assured by the Ontario Government that four thousand dollars will be brought down in the estimates at next session of Ontario Legislature, to assist in defraying the expense of constructing the said dredge. Your committee have also a sum of money remaining to their credit in the County Treasurer's hands, amounting to something over twenty-two hundred dollars.

Your committee would therefore recommend that immediately after the said sum of four thousand dollars, promised to be contributed by the Ontario Government, is received by the County Treasurer, your committee be empowered to take such steps as are necessary to effect the building and equipping of a dredge for the purposes aforesaid, the price of which is not to exceed the funds then available from said sources for the purpose.

Report of Committee on Communications.

All members present.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee had referred to them a communication from the Canadian Institute, Toronto, requesting them to assist in procuring materials for a compilation of a history of the early settlement of this Province. Your committee would recommend that the Clerk be instructed to procure a copy of the work entitled "Lunenburg, or The Old Eastern District," by His Honor Judge Pringle, and transmit the same to the secretary of the Institute. Your committee consider that this work contains as valuable information as can be obtained with regard to this particular portion of the Province, and recommend that the same be procured and forwarded at the expense of the Counties.

2. The report of the Grand Jury at the recent December Court of Sessions was referred to your committee, and was referred by them to the County Property Committee as we considered the recommendation contained therein as to the placing of urinals in the Grand and Petit Jurors' rooms comes properly within the province of that committee.

3. Your committee have had referred to them a communication from the County Clerk, Ottawa, soliciting certain specified amendments to the Consolidated Municipal and Assessment Acts. Your committee, after careful consideration, would recommend that the Warden and Clerk memorialize the Legislative Assembly to amend at its next session the said acts as to extend to township councils the powers conferred upon cities, towns, and incorporated villages by Section 32 of the said Assessment Act. Your committee have also considered the 2a and 3rd sections of said communication referring to townships, and granting power to township councils to unite the offices of treasurer and collector, and recommend that no action be taken in connection therewith.

4. Your committee have had referred to them a petition and communication from the Prisoners' Aid Association, suggesting certain reforms in prison administration, and soliciting the co-operation of this Council. Your committee recommend that the Warden and Clerk sign a petition similar to that received, and forward the same to the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly for presentation at next session of the same.

5. Your committee have had referred to them a communication and petition from County of Frontenac, praying this Council to co-operate with them in presenting to the Legislative Assembly a petition praying that County Councils be extended the power to appoint all officials whose salaries are paid by the respective counties. Your committee deem the petition not sufficiently explicit, and would therefore recommend that no action be taken in the matter.

6. We have also had under consideration a communication from the County Clerk of the County of Hastings, asking co-operation in a petition to the Legislative Assembly to reduce the fees of all county officials appointed by them. Your committee would recommend that the Legislative Assembly be memorialized by this Council to that effect.

7. Your committee have had under consideration an application from Mr. J. P.

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Whitney, on behalf of Mr. Walter E. Thom, for appointment to Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, for the unexpired term of the year 1893-94, in place of A. W. McIntyre, appointed by resolution at the November session. The committee have also had referred to them a letter from Mr. A. W. McIntyre consenting to defer his appointment until the year 1894-95 and agreeing to the appointment of Mr. Thom in the meantime. Your committee would therefore recommend that a resolution be passed by this Council appointing Mr. Thom as student to said college for unexpired term, and that Mr. McIntyre be given the preference in the appointment for the year 1894-95.

8. We have also had under consideration a communication and petition from the Single Tax Association, Toronto, and recommend that the petition be endorsed and signed by the Warden and Clerk and forwarded to the Legislative Assembly.

9. Your committee have had a communication from the county clerk of county of Grey asking the co-operation of this Council in petitioning the Legislative Assembly of Ontario and the Dominion Parliament, respectively, for such amendments as will require the various lines of railway operating under Dominion and Provincial charters to lower their passenger rates for first-class accommodation to a maximum rate of two cents per mile, and to a maximum rate of one and a quarter cents per mile for second-class passengers, and your committee would recommend that the accompanying petitions be signed by the Warden and Clerk and be forwarded to the Legislative Assembly and Dominion Parliament, and that the Clerk be instructed to notify the county clerk of the county of Grey of the action of this Council.

10. We have also had before us communications from Minister of Education, Toronto, the Attorney-General of Ontario, and from the Minister of Railways and Canals, Ottawa, acknowledging receipt of petitions forwarded by this Council at the last November sessions; also card from the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly for Ontario acknowledging receipt of Prohibition Plebiscite returns.

We also had brought to our notice the fact that a piece of land on the north side of gaol wall, being a portion of the Counties' property, has for some years been used or occupied as a roadway by parties who have not leased the same, and who might in time claim it by possession. Lest such a contin-

gency should arise, your committee would recommend that the County Treasurer, C. J. Mattice, Esq., be and is hereby instructed to look into the matter, and have the said roadway closed by a gate so as to bar entrance thereby, or have said premises leased in a proper way, so as to secure the Counties against any adverse title, and to report thereon at the June sessions of this Council.

3. Your committee had also placed in their hands a report of the Grand Jurors, presented at the December, 1893, General Sessions of the Peace for the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, wherein they request that a urinal be provided in a corner of the Grand and Petit Jury rooms where there is space to spare for the purpose. Realizing the necessity therefor, your committee would recommend that the same be provided as asked, and also that a closet and wash basin be placed in the judges' room, considering that these are real and necessary conveniences, and that C. J. Mattice, Esq., County Treasurer, be and is hereby instructed to look after the same.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report as follows:

That they have met with Mr. Connor and Messrs. Nesbitt and Niblock, as representing Mr. Hill. That Mr. Connor made a proposition to accept \$750 in full settlement on his part, and Mr. Nesbitt, on behalf of Mr. Hill, stated that he was authorized to settle on the basis of the United Counties' paying the balance due Mr. Hill's solicitors (Messrs. MacLennan, Liddell & Cline), the amount of which he was unable to say.

Your committee then appointed Messrs. D. McNaughton, F. D. McNaughton, and the chairman, as a sub-committee to wait upon Mr. MacLennan, and ascertain the amount due by Mr. Hill, and upon what terms a settlement could be effected. This sub-committee reported that they had an interview with Mr. MacLennan, who stated that he had through Mr. Reveler received a letter from Mr. Hill, stating that he would settle in full and withdraw his suit by the United Counties paying his solicitors the amount that he owed them. Mr. MacLennan stated this amount to be something over \$2000, but, in order to facilitate a settlement, he would accept \$1500 in full of all claims on Mr. Hill's account. At a subsequent meeting of your committee, Mr. Connor offered to accept \$500 in settlement of his claim, provided that Mr. MacLennan's offer on Mr. Hill's behalf was accepted.

Your committee would therefore recommend that with a view to ending what has been a very troublesome and expensive matter to all concerned, the sum of \$500 be paid to Mr. Connor in settlement in full of all costs, damages, and expenses of every kind in connection with the suit of Connor v.

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Middagh, and he to withdraw his suit now
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 the judgment of the Court of Appeals for On-
 tario, in favor of the United Counties, to
 stand.

And that the further sum of \$150 be paid
 to Mr. Hill through his solicitors, Messrs.
 Macleannan, Liddell & Cline, he and his so-
 licitors agreeing to accept this sum in full
 settlement of all claims for costs, damages
 and expenses of every kind in connection
 with the suit of Hill v. Middagh, they agree-
 ing to withdraw the appeal now pending be-
 fore the Supreme Court of Canada, and allow
 the judgment of the Court of Appeals for On-
 tario, in favor of these United Counties, to
 stand.

And that J. P. Whitney, Esq., as solicitor

Members all present.
To the Warden and Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Sir and Gentlemen.—Your committee beg to report that it has been assured by Mr. H. H. Ross M. P. for Dundas that the Dominion Government will do the dredging necessary to complete the Nation River drainage scheme as soon as a dredge is provided.

That your committee has been further assured that the Government of the Province of Ontario on being applied to for the funds necessary to build a dredge has expressed a willingness to contribute \$4000, the sum which it was at first thought a dredge would cost.

That it is now found that a suitable dredge cannot be constructed for less than \$7,500.

That your Council has in hand \$2000, which can be applied to the building of a dredge, but that there are no other funds available for that purpose.

That those interested in the drainage have been already so heavily taxed that the levying of any further sum upon them would be a very great hardship.

Your committee would recommend that those interested in this drainage scheme, in conjunction with your committee, should appeal to the Ontario Government to grant the \$5500 required, in addition to the \$2000 now on hand, to pay for the construction of a proper dredge.

Your committee would further recommend that, as soon as the necessary funds are obtained, your committee be authorized to build a dredge, and have the work of dredging proceeded with as rapidly as practicable.

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario.

The petition of the County Council of the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, in session assembled, respectfully sheweth,

That in the case of a union of counties, Section 534 of "The Consolidated Municipal Act of 1892" operates harshly and unjustly as against many municipalities composing said counties within such union, inasmuch as those of the other two counties derive no benefit from a bridge located in a village in an adjoining county within such union, and yet are liable for their proportion of the expense of constructing and maintaining the same.

That the entire benefit of such a bridge as is referred to in the latter part of said section is derived by the various municipalities situated within the individual county in which the incorporated village containing

such bridge is located, and the expense of building and maintaining the same should consequently be borne exclusively thereby.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your honorable body at its approaching session do so amend the said section of said act as to extend to the county council of a union of counties the powers conferred upon them by the amendment to Section 533a of said act enacted at the last (1893) session of your honorable body, and enable them if so disposed to pass a by-law enacting that the several municipalities within the county within which such a bridge as is referred to in said section 534 is situated or may hereafter be built shall alone be liable *pro rata* on the basis of their last equalized assessment for the price of the building or maintaining of such bridge.

MEMORIAL

From the Municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, in Council assembled.

To the Honorable G. Kirkpatrick, Lieutenant-Governor.

Your Honor,—Whereas, The Prison Reform commissioners appointed by the Ontario Government in their report to the Lieutenant-Governor in April, 1891, state that one of the principal causes of crime in this Province is drunkenness; that the evidence of sheriffs, gaolers, etc., shows that the present gaol treatment of habitual drunkards has very little deterrent effect; that their presence in the county gaols is a double evil: firstly, because it prevents a proper classification of the other prisoners, on account of overcrowding; and, secondly, because it is found difficult or impossible to supply such prisoners with proper industrial employment;

And whereas, said Prison Reform commissioners have recommended the establishment of one or more Industrial Reformatories in the Province by the Ontario Government for habitual drunkards, both with a view to their reformation and also with a view of making their labor remunerative both to the Province and to their families;

And further, whereas, said commissioners recommend the reorganization of the Boys' Reformatory, so that farming may be well taught, and proper classification effected; and whereas, the commissioners also recommended the removal of the Refuge for Girls from association with the Woman's Reformatory.

We, the undersigned Warden and County Clerk of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, for and by order of the County Council, hereby beg to endorse these recommendations of the Prison Reform commissioners, and we trust full effect will be given by Government to the same with as little delay as possible.

That the fees of county officials at present appointed by and under the control of your honorable body, whose fees and fixed salaries are payable out of county funds, such as sheriff, clerk of the peace, gaoler, etc., are unreasonably high and it is considered necessary and expedient that a material reduction in the same be immediately effected by legislation.

Your petitioners therefore pray

That your honorable body at its approaching session adopt such measures to amend existing statutes and tariffs by which the salaries or fees of such officials are now fixed or ascertained as will tend to materially reduce the fees and salaries at present earned and derived by all county officials whose appointment is vested in your honorable body but whose said fees and salaries are payable directly or indirectly out of the funds of the county or union of counties in respect to their respective offices or appointments.

And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

REPORTS.

Report of Committee on Equalization of Assessment.

All the members present.
To the Warden and members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.
Gentlemen—Your committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. That after a careful consideration of the question referred to us we have resolved and would so recommend that no change be made in the Equalized Assessment and that the assessment as equalized last year be the basis for this year.

2. In endeavoring to arrive at a satisfactory and equitable assessment, it has been made evident to us that the assessment rolls for various townships, or the certified copies thereof returned to County Clerk, do not contain all the requisite information to enable us to arrive at an intelligent and satisfactory assessment on account of all the columns of the roll, particularly 29 and 30, not being filled up, rendering it impossible for your committee to judge as to the relative quantities of waste or swamp lands in the respective townships and consequently as to the relative value and acreage of the same. We would therefore recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to write all Township, Town and Village Clerks requiring them henceforth to notify all assessors appointed by their respective Councils to fill in all columns of their rolls and particularly those above mentioned so that the Equalization Committee may be in a position to arrive at the comparative values of the workable lands of each Municipality and also to instruct the Clerks of such Municipalities to return to the County Clerk a certified copy of such roll, including all columns, instead of the skeleton copies which some of them have heretofore been in the habit of transmitting.

Brown Esq., of Morrisburg, Civil Engineer, to make a survey or examination of all the lands interested in or beneficially affected by the prosecution of such drainage works and prepare plans, profiles, estimates and an assessment upon such lands in proportion to benefits to be derived and submit same together with his report thereon to this Council at its next October session and that your Council take all necessary steps to secure the performance of such work.

Report of Committee on County Property

Members all present.
To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen—Your committee beg leave to submit to you their report as amended, as follows:

1. Your committee have examined the gaol and offices of County Buildings and recommend that certain improvements be made which we herein submit.

2. We have had placed in our hands reports of Grand Jurors for the Spring Assizes dated 4th April 1894, and for the General Sessions of the Peace dated June 14th, 1894, also report of T. F. Chamberlain, Esq., Inspector of Prisons, all of which recommend that a bathtub be provided for the prisoners as there is no convenience of that kind. Your committee would recommend that a suitable bathtub be provided.

3. We also find that the floor in a portion of the public building is in need of being painted and would recommend that the same be done.

4. Our attention has also been called to defects of drain leading from Gaol to main sewer on Water Street and your committee recommend that a new tile drain of sufficient capacity be provided.

5. T. F. Chamberlain, Esq., Inspector of Gaols and Prisons, having waited on your committee during this session, requested that a window be placed in front of gaol basement on Water Street for the purpose of lighting and ventilating the cellar occupied by the Turnkey, there being no window of any kind to admit light or air. We would recommend that his request be complied with.

6. Your committee have examined the closets for Petit Jury room and Judge's room and find the work well performed as far as we can see, but we beg leave to state that after learning from the report of the Committee on Finance the amount charged for said closets we consider it as being an exorbitant price and greatly in excess of the necessary demands and would recommend that in the future when any work is to be done to our County Buildings involving an outlay of twenty-five dollars or over, tend-

ers be asked for by the Clerk where practicable; and that those in charge of said work do carefully guard against undue extravagance.

7. Your committee have also had in consideration that piece of land belonging to these Counties on the north side of the gaol wall and we recommend that the Clerk request Peter Davros, who is the occupant adjoining said land, to sign a lease at a rental of one dollar per year for use of same and in the event of a refusal to sign lease to close up said piece of land by a substantial fence in the rear and a proper gate on the front, lying on Pitt Street and that the Gaoler have charge of the same.

8. In conclusion, your committee further recommend that the store-named Improvements be made under the supervision of Wm. Gallinger, Deputy Reeve of Cornwall Town, and D. McDonald, Reeve of Cornwall Township.

3. We would further recommend that no action be taken upon the request of County Clerk, Owen Sound, re. reduction of passenger rates on railroads, this Council having at its recent January session taken the desired steps in petitioning Minister of Railways for Canada and Local Legislature towards that end.

Report of Nation River Drainage Committee.

Members all present.
To the Warden and gentlemen of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Sir and Gentlemen: Your committee beg leave to report as follows:

Your committee held a meeting at Brinston's Corners on March 23rd, 1894. Members present, Beckstead, Midlough and Collison. It was moved and seconded that the chairman be instructed to ask for tenders for building a dredge and that the committee meet on 30th April, 1894.

Your committee did meet on the 30th April at Troquois. Members present, Messrs. Hamilton, Midlough and Collison. Mr. Bouty of Welland appeared before the committee and placed before them two tenders with plans and specifications, the one for a \$6500 dredge and another for \$7500.

At a later date Messrs. Carriere, Lavine & Co. of Point Levis put a tender in also. The above plans were placed in Mr. Ross' hands that he might place them before the Chief Engineer, Mr. Costa. He reported both good dredges and that either would give good satisfaction.

Your committee has on hand \$2200 or thereabouts, and the Legislature of Ontario brought down in supplementary estimates \$100 for the construction of a dredge to complete the work on Nation River, leaving a balance to provide of \$1500 for the construction of a dredge to cost \$7500, a plan of which was submitted to the Public Works Department of Ottawa and approved of by the Chief Engineer.

Your committee would recommend that bylaw No. 733, passed in the year 1881, be amended so as to provide for the raising of \$1500, and that debentures be issued for the same to run from the expiration of second issue, and that a bylaw be passed authorizing Treasurer to pay to the order of the Drainage Committee sums not exceeding the amount at the credit of the Nation River Drainage work.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen: Your committee beg leave to report as follows:

1st. The Treasurer's statement handed to us shows the amount required to be levied for this year to be \$17,412.22, and that according to the equalized assessment of last year it will require a levy of one mill on the dollar to raise the necessary amount.

2nd. The rates for 1893 have all been paid to the Treasurer. A number of the municipalities are charged with interest on balance of unpaid rates on 15th December last, as previously directed by resolution of this Council, which interest amounts in the aggregate to \$106.40.

3rd. Non-resident taxes have been received by the Treasurer amounting to \$154.71 up to the 1st inst. and distributed among the various municipalities in the proportion to which they were respectively entitled.

4th. The receipts for pedlars' licenses are \$180 for present year and for auctioneers' licenses \$48, being less than last year by \$92.

5th. The amount borrowed under bylaw No. 1060 for general purposes is \$4001, of which amount \$200 was paid in the matter of the Midlough suits.

6th. The amount of cash on hand in the bank is \$710.21. To meet the expenses of the next five months, which will include sittings of the Queen's Bench, Administration of Justice, accounts passed by the Board of Audit in July, and October sittings of Council, and the accounts usually passed by them, it will be necessary to borrow further sum of money, and your Committee recommend that a bylaw be passed authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow a sum not to exceed \$400.

7th. The note of \$850 re. the River Beaudette Drainage is still being renewed and there has to be added to this amount \$791.15 paid for interest &c. We would recommend that the municipalities interested be asked to issue debentures to cover the amount, not later than the next October session.

8th. Your Committee recommend that a Bylaw for the levying of amounts expended during the past five years on the Registry offices of these United Counties should be passed.

9th. Your committee are of opinion and recommend that the sale of lands in arrears for taxes should take place this year. The Treasurer has the list prepared and will submit it to the Warden, and that the advertisements of sale be published in the "Morrisburgh Herald" for Dundas, "Cornwall Standard" for Stormont and the "Glengarryian" for Glengarry, and that a copy of each paper be forwarded to the Reeves and Deputy Reeves within the county where paper is published.

10th. Your committee have had before them a communication from the Treasurer asking that his bonds be reduced to \$10,000 and saying that he would give as security the bond of the Guarantee Company for the amount, and your committee would recommend that his request be not granted, and that the security be let at the former sum of \$12,000.

11th. Your committee have carefully examined and passed accounts on general

counties' account amounting to \$1663.19, as shown by schedule "A" hereto attached.

Gentlemen: Your committee had referred to them a communication from the Municipal World, published at St. Thomas, Ont., soliciting subscriptions to the paper by this council. Your committee, while recognizing the value of the paper in question, would recommend that the matter be left in the hands of individual members of Council to subscribe or not as they deem fit.

2nd. Your committee had referred to them a communication, with petition attached, from H. J. Hill, Esq. Manager and Secretary of the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto, intimating that it has been proposed to hold at the city of Toronto in the year 1895 a Dominion exhibition, and soliciting the co-operation of this council in petitioning in favor of Government aid being granted so as to enable the association to hold such an exhibition.

As it is a matter of national interest and of special importance to this Province, your committee would recommend that the Warden and Clerk sign petitions similar to those received and forward the same to the secretary of the association.

3rd. Your committee had referred to them a communication from the county clerk of the county of Kent asking co-operation in a petition to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario relative to abolishing the fee system in the payment of the county officers appointed by the Ontario Legislature.

As your committee do not deem the petition sufficiently explicit, they recommend that no action be taken in the matter.

4th. We have also had under consideration a communication from the secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada soliciting the council to memorialize the Dominion Government asking for the establishment of a reformatory for young men who were first offenders and prevent their association with confirmed criminals.

Your committee would recommend that the council memorialize the Government and that a petition similar to that received be signed by the Warden and Clerk and forwarded as suggested. Your committee would further recommend that a grant of fifteen dollars be given the association to aid them in carrying on their work.

5th. The report of the Grand Jury at the recent June Quarter Sessions was referred to your committee and was by us referred to the County Property Committee, as we considered the recommendation contained therein as to the placing of a large bathtub in the gaol comes properly within the province of that committee.

We also had an acknowledgment with their cordial thanks from the Canadian Institute, Toronto, for the receipt of a copy of "Lancashire or the Old Eastern District," sent them by this council; also acknowledgment from the Deputy Minister of Education for the receipt of school reports for these United Counties for 1893. There is also

a statement from the auditors that they have audited the Public School returns for the various municipalities in these counties and found them correct and properly vouched for.

 Whereas, the Ontario Prison Reform Commissioners in their report to the Lieutenant Governor in April, 1891, recommended, inter alia: (a) The establishment by the Dominion Government of a Reformatory for young men, first offenders, between the ages of sixteen and thirty; (b) the inauguration of the indeterminate sentence and parole system; (c) conferring upon the Provincial Governments all necessary authority to deal absolutely with all youthful offenders without reference to Dominion authority; (d) providing for the separate trial and separate custody of all children under arrest.
 And whereas, at an interview with a deputation from the Prison Reform Conference in Toronto in January, 1893, the Premier of Canada was pleased to signify his approval of these Prison Reform recommendations;
 And whereas, one session of Parliament has passed since the interview referred to without practical effect being given to the same;
 Therefore resolved, That the Counties' Council of the above corporation, in session assembled, desires to signify its approval of the recommendations referred to and its regret that as yet practical effect has not been given to the same.
 And whereas, the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada is desirous of extending the Prison Reform movement, but being without adequate means at their disposal for so doing;
 Therefore resolved, That in the opinion of the Counties' Council of said corporation a small grant of public money to aid in this movement would be a wise appropriation.
 Resolved further, That a duly signed copy of these resolutions be either forwarded to Sir John S. D. Thompson, Premier, or His Excellency the Governor General of Canada.

That in the opinion of your petitioners such an exhibition could be advantageously held by the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto, at Toronto, in the year 1895; but for the holding of such a Dominion Exhibition, at which all the Provinces would be fittingly represented, the said association will require not only the moral support of but also substantial aid and assistance from the Government of Canada, which in the opinion of your petitioners the circumstances warrant being given and granted.

Your petitioners therefore pray that it may please His Excellency the Governor General in Council to approve of and sanction and the Parliament to grant such substantial aid to the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto as will enable it to hold a Dominion Exhibition at Toronto in the year 1895, open to the world, at which the several provinces will be fittingly represented.

Whereas, by 54 Vic., Chap. 57, Sec. 31, and subsection 6 thereof, as amended and explained by 55 Vic., Chap. 43, Section 38, County Councils of every County or union of Counties shall levy and collect from the Municipalities composing each county in such union of Counties the sum or sums for which said union of Counties is annually liable for the proportionate maintenance of county pupils (as described by 54 Vic., Chap. 57, Section 2, Sub Section 5), at the High Schools within each such County, less the fees paid by such County pupils as certified to the County Treasurer by the High School Board or its Secretary or Treasurer.

And whereas, by said 55 Vic., Chap. 43, Section 38, the County Council of any union of Counties may pass a bylaw for the purpose of apportioning the amount to be levied for High School purposes so that each County forming such union shall be liable only for the maintenance of County pupils attending the High Schools situated within such County.

And whereas, application has been made to this Council by statutory requisitions by the Treasurer of the High School Board of the Morrisburg Collegiate Institute and by the respective Secretary Treasurers of the Boards of the Cornwall High School and Iroquois High School, asking this Council to levy in their respective municipalities for the maintenance of the said schools as above recited during the year 1894 the following sums, viz.:

BYLAW No. 1081.

Bylaw to fix the fees payable by county pupils attending High Schools or Collegiate Institutes in County of Dundas under section 37, sub-section 1. of "Consolidated High Schools Act, 1891," and amendments thereto.

Be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted, a bylaw of the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, that a fee of two dollars per term for each of the three terms comprising the school year on all county pupils as defined by said act attending the Iroquois High School and Morrisburg Collegiate Institute be imposed, such fees to be payable to and receivable by the Treasurer of the Board of the said respective schools.

This bylaw to come into effect from the beginning of the High School term next ensuing after its final passing and to remain in force for a period of three years from such time.

And whereas, the sum of four thousand dollars is still required to complete the work, which said sum the said townships cannot now raise.

Be it resolved, that in view of the magnitude of the said Drainage works and the importance of having the same completed at an early date, this council do petition the Dominion Government or the Governor in Council for the said sum of four thousand dollars, and that the Warden and Clerk be authorized to sign such petition on behalf of this council, affix the official seal, and forward the same to the Governor in Council. Carried unanimously.

(Lochiel), that in the opinion of this council the compensation allowed to the Clerk is inadequate on account of the large amount of extra work performed this year, and the saving effected by him in the outlay of this council for legal work, etc., and it is therefore recommended that he be paid the sum of twenty-five dollars as a slight remuneration for such extra services. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. McDonald (Cornwall Tp.), seconded by Mr. McDougall (Maxville), and resolved, that in the opinion of this council it is desirable that a House of Refuge be erected for the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

The above motion was lost upon a division in council taken by a show of hands.

Upon motion of Mr. Warner, seconded by Mr. McEwan, the report of the Committee on County Property was presented and received and read by the chairman, Mr. Adams, and upon motion of Mr. Whittaker, seconded by Mr. Ault, the same was referred to a committee of the whole.

Mr. Adams in the chair.

The committee rose and recommended the adoption of the report without amendment, and upon motion of Mr. MacPherson, seconded by Mr. Sangster, the same was adopted in council.

It was moved by Mr. McRae, R. F. (Lochiel), seconded by Mr. McNaughton (Finch), that whereas, under the pres-

the Ontario Game Law, and amendments, the shooting of deer, is permitted at certain seasons in any part of Ontario, and the use of hounds is also permitted;

And whereas, in many parts of Ontario, and particularly in these United Counties, deer hounds have committed serious damage in killing sheep, etc.; and cattle have frequently been killed, and human life endangered, and in some instances nearly sacrificed, by stray bullets fired near a clearing in thickly settled districts and missing their mark;

And whereas, the posting up on one's premises of notice forbidding trespassers has in nearly every instance proved a signal failure, and has only resulted in the abuse of the party so posting;

Therefore be it resolved, that this council do petition the Ontario Legislature to so amend at its next session the said The Ontario Game Act, by fixing a distance from a clearing upon which habitations are built or horses or cattle grazing which will be a protection to human life and property, and that such other restrictions upon shooting in such closely settled districts be incorporated in said Act, as will effect the same object. Carried.

Upon motion of Mr. Meikle, seconded by Mr. Whittaker, the Warden vacated the chair and the same was taken by Mr. McNaughton (Finch).

It was moved by Mr. Meikle, seconded by Mr. Ault, that this council desires to place on record its appreciation of the very able and impartial manner in which Thomas Hamilton, Esq., has filled the difficult and important position of Warden during the past year. It would also seek to express its sense of the unvarying courtesy with which every member has been treated by him and the valuable assistance which his long experience and sound judgment in municipal matters has enabled him to render to the different committees.

The above motion was carried unanimously and with applause, all the members standing.

Mr. McNaughton, chairman, having tendered the foregoing resolution to the Warden, the latter suitably and feelingly replied, thanking the members and county officials for their courtesies

Gentlemen: Your committee beg to report as follows:

1st. That we have had referred to us an

acknowledgment from the Department of Attorney General for Ontario, of the receipt of the petition forwarded by this council at June session re. reduction of toll rates on toll roads in Ontario and stating that the matter would receive attention in due course.

2d. We have also had referred to us a communication from R. B. Jamieson, Esq., Assistant Superintendent of Canadian Pacific Railway Company, calling attention of council to bad state of repair of highway from Green Valley to Alexandria, and requesting that immediate steps be taken to repair same. Your committee, after a full and careful consideration of the matter, would recommend that the matter be referred to the Municipal Councils of the various municipalities interested in and bordering on said road, to take such steps as may be necessary to make said highway available for the carriage of heavy traffic, especially so as it appears that some of said municipalities have already taken some action in the matter, and made monetary grants in that direction.

3d. Your committee had also referred to them the report of James C. Casselman, Esq., appointed commissioner re. Chester-ville bridge, shewing the work done by him under instructions of this council, and submitting a detailed account of the expenditure, which amounts to \$199.79 net.

We recommend that the amount be paid, and I have referred the accounts to the Finance Committee for that purpose.

REPORT OF NATION RIVER DRAINAGE COMMITTEE.

Members all present.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Sir and Gentlemen: Your committee, as instructed by resolution of your council, passed at last June session, waited upon the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa, the Hon. Mr. Oulmet. There were present on that occasion Messrs. Hamilton (Warden), Middagh, Snider and the chairman, and the object of the deputation was to endeavor to induce the Dominion Government, through its Minister, to grant financial assistance towards the expense of constructing a suitable dredge to complete the drainage improvements. The hon. minister, however, declined to take any action in the matter.

Your committee on July 28th last held a meeting at Morrisburgh, when there were present Messrs. Beckstead and Collison (chairman), but nothing, however, was done.

Another meeting was held at Morrisburgh on July 30th last, there being present Messrs. Hamilton (Warden), Middagh, Beckstead and the chairman.

The question of the advisability of having a dredge constructed was fully discussed, but nothing in that direction was accomplished. Your committee would recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to communicate with as little delay as possible with Messrs. Beatty & Sons, Welland, dredge builders, repudiating any liability on the part of your council for the expense of building the proposed dredge, and intimating to them that in acting upon any alleged contract purporting to be signed by the chairman of this committee, or by anyone else, for the construction of any such

dredge, they will be acting without the knowledge and authority and against the wishes of your council or of the Nation River Drainage Committee, neither of which bodies have given any authority for entering into such contract and will decline to ratify it.

Your committee have passed accounts for expenses of committee meetings, deputations, etc., in connection with said work aggregating \$106, and would recommend the payment of same.

REPORT OF RIVER BEAUDETTE DRAINAGE COMMITTEE.

Members all present.
To the Warden and Members of the municipal council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry in session assembled.
Gentlemen: The committee and commissioner appointed in the matter of the drainage of River Beauvette beg leave to report as follows, viz:
That since last report the amount granted by the Government of the Dominion has been all or nearly all expended, with very good results. Your commissioner and J. A. McLaughlin, receiver of Lancaster, made a thorough examination of the work done from the military road to the eastern terminus at Glen Nevis, and found that the work was well done with the exception of some flood wood piled too near to the bank of the river, and liable to be carried into the stream by the spring freshets if not removed. Your committee and commissioner are convinced that with a little additional expenditure this work will be a success and afford good drainage to lands sought to be benefited by the work.
Your committee are advised that some difficulty arises to the amendment of the bylaw under which this work has been carried on, owing to an amendment of the drainage law passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature.
Your committee therefore recommend that steps be taken to procure such amendment of the drainage act as will permit of the issuing of new debentures to pay the debentures not yet matured and the amount due the counties to extend over a period of twenty years and thereby obviate the necessity of adding to the present annual as-

essment on account of this work.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO SUPERINTEND THE PROCURING OF FILES, ETC., FOR STORMONT REGISTRY OFFICE.

Present:—Messrs. Adams, Warner, Hodge, McNaughton (Finch) and D. McDonald, chairman.
To the Warden and municipal council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.
Sir and Gentlemen: Your committee beg leave to report as follows:
That since the last June session the various parties or firms who had tendered for the required supplies, have been communicated with by the clerk and all expressed their willingness to let tenders stand over at same figures. Only one, however, consented to further reduce their tender, viz., Jas. A. Brook & Co. Since the June session we have received a further tender from the Office Specialty company and the various tenders are as follows:
Jas. A. Brook & Co., wood or metal files, \$10 83 per dozen.
Canadian Office and School Furnishing company, Preston, Ont., metal files, \$20 40 per dozen.
J. B. Snider, Waterloo, wood or metal files, \$14 40 per dozen.
Office Specialty company, Montreal, wood files from \$10 80 to \$11 88 per dozen; metal files from \$11 88 to \$12 96 per dozen.
The above being simply for files alone, without cabinets or other appurtenances.
We also received a separate tender from the Office Specialty company agreeing to furnish two metal cabinets containing 153 metal document compression files, and with spacing and roller shelves sufficient to accommodate all the Registrar's books of whatever size, and a separate metal shelved cabinet for maps, plans, etc., all according to a plan prepared and submitted to us, for the sum of \$35 free of freight, etc., and placed in the registry office.
Your committee had an opportunity of examining the material and working of said cases, files, shelves, etc., and were much pleased with them, and believing as we do that complete metal cabinets, files, etc., are preferable in a registry vault to wood, on account of their durability and indestructibility, we would recommend that the tender of \$350 of said Office Specialty company or the above named supplies complete be accepted upon certain conditions as to size, quality and spacing, to be specified by the clerk, whom we have fully instructed in the matter, to said company.
We would further recommend that upon the satisfactory arrangement of these details, the clerk be instructed to prepare a contract with said company for such supplies, so as to insure that such shall be according to plans and samples, and that upon the execution of same he be authorized to give the necessary instructions for procuring said supplies at as early a date as possible.
Your committee have passed accounts for expenses of committee meetings, etc., heretofore held, aggregating \$35, and recommend that the same be paid upon the order of the chairman of this committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COUNTY PROPERTY.

Members all present.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen: Your committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. Your committee have examined the gaol and county buildings and found everything in apparent good order. The recommendations which this committee made at the last June session for certain repairs have been carried out and upon examination have been found satisfactory.

2. Your committee having been apprised of the fact that that piece of land belonging to these counties on the north side of gaol wall has not been leased by Peter Darois, after due notice having been served on him by the County Clerk, according to instructions given at the last June session, and having ascertained the fact that he is at present making use of said piece of land, would recommend that he be forthwith notified by the Clerk to evacuate said land, or otherwise be prosecuted for trespass.

3. Your committee had under consideration the condition of the yard north of county buildings, which is now considerably lower than the new granolithic sidewalk, and by reason thereof will be flooded in springtime, and probably at other times, unless some scheme for draining it off is devised. Should this not be done the surface and surplus water will flow into the basement through the windows and render the working of the furnaces practically impossible. We would respectfully recommend that a tile pipe leading down into drain which connects with the main sewer from county buildings, and grate on top, be immediately constructed, that said yard be so levelled as to drain into said pipe, and also that the said yard be enclosed on Pitt street by a large gate and small hand gate, in order to prevent the yard from being used for purposes for which it was never intended. That the said work be done under the supervision of Wm. Gallinger, Deputy Reeve of Cornwall Town, and J. G. Adams, chairman of County Property Committee, who are requested to ask for tenders for work if deemed necessary.

4. Your committee would also recommend that the ceiling in one of the upper chambers of the Gaoler's residence be repaired, as at present a portion of the plastering has fallen off.

5. Your committee, knowing that from time to time prisoners are committed to gaol to serve various lengthy terms at hard labor, and believing that the work required to be done about that institution is not sufficient to give them reasonable daily employment, would recommend that an attempt be made, through A. I. Macdonell, County Clerk, to negotiate with the Cornwall Town Council, so that stones, to be furnished by that corporation, may be broken by such prisoners on the gaol premises, and supplied to said town, for use upon the streets, at a rate of, say, 20c. per yard, the proceeds of such to be paid quarterly to the County Treasurer.

Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to request the House of Commons for Canada, at its next session of Parliament, to grant the sum of Four Thousand Dollars, to complete the said drainage work, which will be of great benefit to the parties interested, who have already been heavily assessed, and who at present, by reason of such burden, are unable to raise by further assessment the requisite amount.

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, in session assembled.

The petition of the municipal council of the corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, in council assembled, humbly sheweth:

That your petitioners, the said council in session assembled, unanimously adopted a resolution in the words following, that is to say:

"It was moved by Mr. McRae R. F. (Lochiel), seconded by Mr. McNaughton (Finch), that whereas, under the present Ontario game law and amendments the shooting of deer is permitted at certain seasons in any part of Ontario and the use of hounds is also permitted.

And whereas, in many parts of Ontario, and particularly in these United Counties, deer hounds have committed serious damage in killing sheep, etc.; and whereas, cattle have frequently been killed and human life endangered and in some instances nearly sacrificed by stray bullets fired near a clearing in thickly settled districts and missing their mark.

"And whereas, the posting up on one's premises of notice forbidding trespassers has in nearly every instance proved a signal failure and has only resulted in the abuse of the party so posting.

Therefore be it resolved, that this coun-

oil do petition the Ontario Legislature to so amend at its next session the said The Ontario Game Act, by fixing a distance from a clearing upon which habitations are built, cattle are grazing, within which buckshot or ball cartridge may be fired, as will be a protection to human life and property, and that such other restrictions upon such shooting in such closely settled and densely populated districts be incorporated in said act as in the opinion of said Legislature will effectuate the desired object. Carried."

Your petitioners therefore pray— That your honorable body, in view of the foregoing unanimous expression of opinion of the municipal representatives of these United Counties, will be pleased to devise some means, pass such prohibitive legislation and impose such restrictions as may give effect to the spirit of such resolution and the prayer of this petition, amend the said act in accordance therewith, and thereby provide a sorely needed safeguard to life and property and abate what is fast becoming a dangerous nuisance in this locality.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

BYLAWS.

BYLAW NO. 1082.

Bylaw of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, to authorize the Warden of these United Counties, with the Treasurer, under the seal of the corporation, to borrow a sum of money to meet current expenditure.
