AMUNDSEN WINS SOUTH POLE RACE? CAPTAIN OF "FRAM" AT TASMANIA

Dealing With Miners, the Noted Norwegian Explorer Who Started Out With Expedition Late in 1910 in Contest With Captain Scott and Australian and Japanese Antarctic Adventurers is First Heard From-Report of Capt. Scott's Success Unconfirmed.

THREE TO BE HEARD FROM

HOBART, TASMANIA, March 7.-Captain Roald Amundsen, the Norwegian explorer, has eached here on his return from the South Polar expedition.

While an Australian and a Japanese expedition are attacking the pole, the really serious competitor of Capt. Amundsen, the distinguished Norwegian, who discovered the Northwest Passage, is Capt. Robert Scott. It is a peculiar fact that, cancerning the last hamed, a report was current in London yesterday that he had reached the south pole, but no confirmation has been received. HAD NANSEN'S VESSEL.

Capt. Amundsen's expedition is the first to be heard from of

Amundsen and Scott both started out about the same time November, 1910. Amundsen left Norway with the idea of making San Francisco and putting out into Bering Strait toward the close of the coming summer. Nearing Buenos Ayres, he resolved to make a try for the south pole, for his equipment was sufficient for ten years.

Amundsen had with him the Fram, the most remarkable polar ship ever constructed, in which Dr. Fridtjof Nansen traveled seven thousand miles in the Arctic Ocean, from 1893 to 1896. Amundsen left Buenos Ayres toward the close of 1910 and met Scott shortly afterward. The dark horse in the race has been Dr. Douglas Mawson, the Australian, who was with the Shackelton expedition. He sailed from Tasmania Dec. 2, 1910, laying a course for the south magnetic pole. The Japanese expedition sailed in 1910, but it is not taken seriously.

That the English-French schools of the province - the so-called 'bilingual" schools—are lacking in efficiency is the conclusion at which Dr. Merchant, the special investigator whom the government appointed to make a thoro inquiry into this whole question, has arrived.

Comprehensive and thoro, the long-looked for report, which was handed out yesterday afternoon by the minister of education, deals with every phase of the intricate situation which has arisen in this province thru the teaching of the English and French languages in schools.

From November 2, 1910, till February 8, 1912, Dr. Merchant has been carrying on his investigation. It was a tedious task. Out thru the rural sections of the province, all the way from the County of Essex easterly to the Quebec boundary, Dr. Merchant has some carefully. He has wormed als way thru the school sections in Northern Ontario and he has learned verything that is worth learning regarding the actual conditions in these primary institutions of learning. Having seen the methods of instruction in 269 schools with 538 teachers in charge, Dr. Merchant makes the following candid statement:

English-French Schools Inefficient.

"It is evident from an examination of the results of all the tests applied that the English-French schools are on the whole lacking in efficiency. The tests combine to show that a large proportion of the children in the communities concerned leave school to meet the demands of life with an

inadequate equipment in education." This is a serious admission, and Dr. Merchant appears to fully realize his responsibility. His remarks all thru the report indicate the difficulties that He in the way of a complete solution of the problem he has been wrestling with for about fifteen months.

A remedy is proposed by Dr. Merchant. It is two or three fold in its bearings, but if worked out properly will no doubt effectively deal with the whole situation. Further, Dr. Merchant affirms that a very large percentage of the teachers are handicapped in their efforts by the lack of academic and professional training. "There can be no doubt," says he, "that the efficiency of the French-English schools is seriously lowered by the employment of such a large proportion of teachers holding certificates of the lower grades. 'The key of the permanent solution of the problem." he states with emphasis, "can be found only in the closer connection of the English-French schools with the high school system of the province."

Tobacco, in bringing about a deprecta-tion of the nerve-cells, brings together with physical results like insomnia, lowered vitality and restlessness, their moral counterparts, like irritability, lack of concentration, desire to avoid responsibility and to travel the road of least resistance.

If there were some instrument to de-

termine it, in my opinion there would be seen a difference of fifteen per cent in the general efficiency of smokers and non-smokers. The time is already at hand when smokers will be barred out positions which demand quick bught and action. Already tobacco is forbidden during working hours in the United States Steel Corporation.





DREAMS OF THE BLIND.

Curious data have been gathered abroad with reference to the dreams of the blind. It appears that all dreams of normal ons are sight dreams and that dream is spoken of as a vision. If the blind have not been born so, it is said they may remember enough of what they have seen to enable them to imagine how things look, and when the

imagination has free play in sleep, to picture themselves as in full possession of the sense of sight.

Physiologists would explain this by saying that during the years in which the subjects possessed the sense of sight a certain part of the brain had educated to receive and interpret all these messages which the eye sends, and that when this part of the brain acts spontaneously in sleep the of some two hundred blind persons

of both sexes who were questioned it was found that those who became blind before their fifth year mever dreamed of seeing. Of those whose sight was lost between the fifth and the seventh year some did and some did not see in their dreams, while all whose eyesight was lost after the seventh year had quite as vivid dream visions as normally endowed persons. The fifth to the seventh year is thus shown to be the critical period. This period corresponds with the age which authorities assign as the limit at which a child becoming deaf will also become dumb, and also with the age of one's earliest continuous mem-

ory of onself.
It is interes is interesting to note that blind persons dream quite as frequently as normal people, and that, with those who do not see in their dreams, hearing plays the principal part. When dreaming of home, for instance, they will hear the voices of relatives, and perhaps will feel the familiar objects in the household.

OUTWITTING THE WILY COYOTE IN TEXAS.

How to get rid of coyotes and wolves Southwest Texas has been a question that has puzzled stockmen in that section for years. While the animals are trapped and shot in large numbers each year, their complete extermination has been impossible. A new and successful method of destroying them, however, has recently been adopted by A. C. Lorden, who has a ranch in Starr County. Mr. Lorden has made a study of the wfly coyote and wolf and was aware of the fact that these animals will seldom touch poisoned meat found above ground. Neither will they take meat from a trap unless desperately hungry. Altho they are known to be specially fond of tender kid meat, at is seldom that a choice bit of this morse will tempt them when it has been pois-

The ranchman ordered that the fresh carcass of a kid be soaked in parts green. When this was done, he tied a rope to it, and, tying one end to his saddle, he dragged the kid thru the chaparral for several miles, finally burying it in the earth to a depth of about two feet, firmly tamping the ground over it. A visit to the spot next morning re-

vealed nine dead coyotes and wolves, Since then more than 200 coyotes and thirty-odd wolves have been put out of existence upon the Lorden ranch by this method of poisoning them. Other ranchmen are adopting it, and it is believed that these wild ani-mal pests will be exterminated within the next few years in that part of the Texas ranch region.







SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 12 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Domision land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dutles.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.


