## ALEXANDER MANNING BEFORE THE COURT OF REVISION.

## HIS PROPERTY IS PAYING.

No Reductions to be Made at the Corner of King and Yonge-Sts.

Upon an investment of \$10,000, \$2300 a Year is Not a Bad Return—Some Reductions, However, Were Granted to the Big Land Owner—Personalities Assessed—Lumber Ought to be Bought by Tender—City Jottings.

The largest applicant against the assessment before the Court of Revision, Alexander Manning, who attacked the assessment upon a number of lots of which he is owner or lessee. The first piece of property under discussion was the southeast corner of King and Yonge. This property, which has a frontage of 30 feet on King by 100 on Yonge, was assessed at \$3300 per foot and the building at \$10,000. Mr. Manning made a pitiful appeal to have the assessment lowered, and declared that he would not be able to hold the property when his lease lapsed in a year or two if the assessment was not lowered. The court, after hearing the evidence, granted a reduction of \$1000 per foot, and the building at \$10,000. Mr. Manning's appeal was successful.

## SOMEWHAT OF A SNAP.

## AT OSOODE HALL.

An interesting case over a mortgage given at Collateral Security—See below.

At the non-jury sittings in Land Sec. v. L. v. L., judgment was given with costs for plaintiffs in an action for specific performance of agreement to purchase land.

The MacNab v. McKay judgment was given for plaintiff without costs. The case is interesting. The plaintiff is an assignee for benefit of creditors. The defendant held a second mortgage, given to him by the insolvent, on certain property as collateral security. He filed with the assignee a declaration proving his claim, and his solicitor attended a meeting of creditors, and when he was asked, there, what value he placed on the mortgage security, replied that he could not place any value upon it, meaning that he did not know its value. The assignee, however, thought he meant that the mortgage was valueless. In due course the defendant received 50 cents on the dollar of his claim. Subsequently the lands were sold and sufficient was realized to pay the debt and sufficient was realized to pay the debt and sufficient was realized to pay the debt.

Mr. Justice Meredith held that defendant was not entitled to receive the amount of his mortgage. The defendant had an appeal under the Writ Privileges Act, R.S.O. ch. 119.
