A NEW BRANCH ORGANIZED

Retail Merchants of Hamilton After Discussion Decide to Join the Association.

FIREMAN'S WIDOW REMEMBERED

Will Be Paid \$10 a Month for Two Years—Estimates Agreed Upon.

Hamilton, Jan. 22.—The Fire and Water Committee met this evening. The members agreed to pay the widow of the late Fireman Smith his salary till the end of this month, as well as the funeral expenses.

Dr. Craig was reappointed veterinarian of the Fire Department. The appointment of an engineer for the High-Level Pumping House will be made early in the week.

The committee decided to pay Contractor John Dickenson the balance due on the filtering basin contract as soon as Engineer Barrow gives his final certificate.

These estimates were agreed on: Waterworks expenses, \$35,000; construction, \$18,715; Fire Department, \$38,000. An item for \$10,000 on the High-Level Reservoir was struck out.

The estimates did not pass without some words between Ald. Burrill and Ald. McFadden, the chairman. Ald. Burrill expressed dissatisfaction at the way the Fire Department was run, and wanted \$5000 struck off the \$38,000 estimate.

A number of city retail merchants met in the Board of Trade rooms to-night, with J. Kirkpatrick in the chair, to discuss the advisability of forming a branch of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada.

After considerable discussion, it was decided, on motion of J. O. Carpenter and G. S. K. Lein, to form a Hamilton branch. These retailers were appointed to Provisional Committee to organize the various sections.

POSTCARD TOLD THE STORY

Thomas Gibbs, an Old Man, Beaten and Robbed at His Home Near Aldershot.

MINISTER MAY GO TO TORONTO

Canon Forester Asked to Leave His Charge in the Ambitious City to Become Assistant Rector.

Hamilton, Jan. 22.—In spite of the heavy snowstorm last night the Street Railway managed to keep its lines running fairly well to-day. The Great Trunk did not suffer much locally. The Toronto line was clear, and the trains from the west were from half an hour to two hours late. The worst part of the storm was east, about St. Catharines, Niagara Falls and Buffalo.

A Curious Postcard.

Chief Smith last night received a strange communication. It was a postcard, mailed in Hamilton, telling the police "to go over between Aldershot and Burlington, and untie old Mr. Gibbs, or he may freeze." Chief Smith communicated with Chief Twiss of Dundas, and Constable Sinclair was sent to investigate. He found Thomas Gibbs, the man mentioned on the card, who claimed that on Sunday night four young men had called on him and threw him on the floor, with his hands bound behind his back. By torturing the old man, \$5 was given up, after which the men departed. Gibbs managed to stagger up to the fire and burn the cord of his wrists. The police are continuing their investigation.

May Remove to Toronto.

Rev. Septimus Jones, rector of the Church of the Redeemer, Toronto, had a preliminary interview to-day with Canon Forester, and intimated to him that if satisfactory arrangements could be made, it was his intention to go to Toronto to rector an congregation of the parish. So far nothing definite is arranged.

It is the intention of the committee to have the monument erected in the City and County Councils for subscriptions.

A very pretty wedding took place this afternoon at St. Thomas Church, when Mary, the second daughter of Mr. Agnes Swalkemmer, was united in matrimony to Harvey, Rev. C. J. James officiating.

The property at the northwest corner of West-street and Baxter-street has been sold, and it is understood the purchaser is the Federal Life Assurance Co. It is said that the company will put up a handsome office building at the corner.

Boundary Dispute.

The Ontario reports that the question of the boundary dispute between the United States and Great Britain was revived to-day, temporarily, in the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations. The subject came up in connection with the treaty, authorizing the fixing of the meridian line, which was made before the Senate.

Deaths.

J. G. Seigler, son of J. G. Seigler, the well-known wine and liquor merchant, 292 East Queen-street, died at 12 o'clock noon yesterday at his father's residence, 194 Elliott-street, from blood poisoning, as a result of a serious frost a pla received in the back of the hand about two weeks ago. Nothing serious was thought of the scratch until last Thursday, when the hand became swollen and inflamed. He consulted Drs. Rowan and Peters, but was employed of the Hudson Bay Company, and returned owing to ill health. He was only 26 years of age, and his untimely death will prove a heavy loss to a circle of friends. The body will be sent to the morgue for burial by the G.T.R. at 1:30 p.m. to-morrow.

SEVEREST STORM IN YEARS

Fourteen Inches of Snow Fell in Toronto on Wednesday, Paralyzing Traffic.

ALL TRAINS WERE MANY HOURS LATE

Storm Started in Kansas—No Snow Fell in Some Parts of Ontario.

Toronto was buried beneath a mantle of snow yesterday of a depth of fourteen or fifteen inches on the level, and several feet in spots. It was the worst snowfall in a quarter of a century, with one exception. The exception was December 5 and 6, 1898, when there was a fall of sixteen inches of "the beautiful."

On Tuesday evening, between 10 and 11 o'clock, the snow began to fall heavily, and as the night advanced the storm developed the proportions of a blizzard. There was no let up till noon on Wednesday, when the Observatory reported that fourteen inches had fallen. The strong wind piled the snow high on the streets, particularly in front of the doorways, and the public had to be made to wait for the snow to be cleared off.

Street Cars Kept Going.

The Street Railway Company are entitled to credit for their efforts to keep traffic open. Care was running on the lines all Wednesday morning, and, although the speed was not fast, the public were glad to avail themselves of the chance to ride. Ordinary locomotion was difficult, the snow being knee deep, and it had not been for the Street Railway Company there would have been little or no traffic.

The Roadmasters of the Street Railway Company were early on the scene yesterday morning, trying to get the system in order. The first rush from 6 to 8 o'clock. All the cars were in operation, and as soon as the rails were clear, they were filled again. Cars were run on the uptown lines, and the snow in the streets, which was drifting into the gutters, was swept up by the street cars.

Women as Telegraphists.

London Economic Journal.

Women possess the ability to perform the routine duties of telegraphy when carried on at low, even pressure as efficiently as men. A broader education gives them the judgment and ability necessary to perform the duties of a higher character, and their training in the use of the telegraph is so general that they are not only competent to perform the duties of a higher character, but they are also able to do so with a minimum of supervision. They are not lacking in energy, they possess less nervousness, however, than men, and this quality will decrease as women become more conscious of their economic value and responsibilities. As a set-off to their attractive qualities they suffer from certain disabilities and disadvantages which detract from their value and tend to neutralize the economy in money wages. They would appear to have a lower individual output than men, and, as a consequence, it is necessary to employ a larger staff of women than of men for the same work. They suffer much more from sickness than men, which reduces their trustworthiness and value. This sickness is largely due to causes that are natural and inherent, and therefore ineradicable, such as menstruation, and is considerably shorter than men's, and they are thus lost at the period of their highest efficiency. They possess less powers of endurance and are, therefore, of much less value in sudden emergencies, such as frequently arise in telegraphic work. A social prejudice prevents the performance of night duties by women, although there seems reason to believe that this can and will be overcome.

Stops Business.

Port Colborne, Jan. 22.—The heaviest snowfall in many years set in last night, and continued all day, with clearing weather to-night. Business is almost at a standstill.

Worst of the Season.

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—The snowstorm to-day has been the worst of the season. It forced the closure of the Street Railway Company to keep up any thing like a regular service, but they managed it except during about an hour in the afternoon. The Great Northwestern telegraph office was down here and Toronto, and the Toronto train due here at 5 p.m. was five hours late.

Roads Are Impassable.

Peterboro, Jan. 22.—A rainstorm, snow set in last night about 9 o'clock, and continued all night long, with a very heavy hail and sleet, and a strong wind from the west. The G.T.R. trains from Port Hope and Belleville and Lindsay came in from one to two hours late. C.P.R. trains had a harder fight; the Montreal west-bound express due here at 5:10 a.m. did not arrive until 11 o'clock, while the local from Havelock, due here at 7 a.m., did not arrive until 10 a.m. The country roads are impassable.

Stage Routes Blocked.

Belleville, Jan. 22.—A rainstorm, accompanied by a heavy gale, did great damage to trees in this district to-day. Snow preceded and followed the rain, and several of the stage routes were blocked.

Shut Up for Days.

St. Catharines, Jan. 22.—A Great storm has been raging through the Niagara district for the past twenty-four hours, and has been completely demoralized. There is over two feet of wet snow on the ground, and owing to the high winds which have prevailed the drifts in some places are fully five feet deep. Traffic on the streets is almost at a standstill. The trolley lines are tied up tight. The Grand Trunk have managed to get their trains on fairly good time. It will be some days before traffic in the city and surrounding country can be resumed.

A ROYAL YACHT 300 YEARS OLD.

The royal yacht in which Rameses and other ancient kings of Egypt made their trips to the Nile thousands of years ago has been preserved in the Carnegie Museum at Pittsburgh, Pa.

The boat was dug out of the sand near the bed of the Nile last year and shipped to this country by Mr. Andrew Carnegie, who presented it to the Pittsburgh Carnegie Institute. In size and shape it does not differ materially from the boats used on the Nile waters to-day. In its building not a nail or screw was used. Heavy cedar timbers, forming the hull, are dovetailed to gether in unique fashion. The timbers forming the hull are dovetailed to gether in unique fashion. There are no evidences of row locks. In the stern are the remains of a console deck which was used to draw the steering gear. A pole twelve feet long found with the boat may have been used as a mast to support the mainsail.

From the appearance of the ancient yacht it is evident that the old shipbuilders of the Nile did not depend on a smooth sea as that of a modern vessel. When it is taken into consideration that the Nile is not a turbulent stream, the absence of a clear inlet in the stern of the yacht's good sailing qualities are easily explained.

The wood of the hull is very well preserved. Although the timbers are decayed and worm-eaten, time has not been able, in thousands of years, to part the joints and seams that the Egyptian carpenters worked together. On the starboard side of the hull are the faint remains of hieroglyphic inscriptions.

The ancient craft does not differ greatly from the boats of the Nile to-day which are used upon the Nile for carrying passengers. Every tourist who has been to Egypt is familiar with them. They are extremely simple vessels to ride in, and as one glides along the placid Nile in the exquisitely clear moonlight of Egypt, among its stupendous ruins, one can easily imagine one's self back in the days of the Pharaohs.

The Board endorsed the recommendations of the City Engineer for an asphalt pavement on Baldwin-street, from Spadina to Augusta-avenue, a tar macadam roadway on Macpherson-avenue, from the east side of Avenue-down-avenue, from Bloor-street to Jeanette-avenue, St. George-street, north of Berrick-avenue, Wellesley-street, from Jarvis to Home-wood-avenue; Wellington-place, from Spadina to Portland; First-avenue, from De-Grassi-street to Logan-avenue; Wellesley-street, from Park-avenue to East-King-street, from Power to Kew-ville-street, Sherbourne-street, from Queen to Union-avenue; Fairmount-street, from Winchester to Amelia; Leith-street, from Broadview-avenue to Bloor-avenue; Brook-avenue, from Howland-road to Logan-avenue; Carlton-street, from Spadina to Gifford-street; Bellevue-avenue, from Bellevue-place to Oxford-street; Huron-street, north of D'Arcy-street; Plank sidewalk for Janet-avenue and Wallace-street.

The report of the Assessment Commissioner in regard to the extension of a lane between Gerrard-street and First-avenue was referred back for a complete estimate as to the cost. Starting on the Cheap. City Commissioner Coatsworth is starting early to economize in his department, with a view to avoiding another over-cast of \$20,000. The pruning knife has been put upon the wages of the women who keep the City Hall clean. There are 27 of them, they have been receiving on an average \$5 a week. Their wages in future will be \$4.20 per week, thus saving the city over \$100 a year. The manner in which the Commission has been commenced to cut expenses is not commented upon very favorably around the hall.

Controler Graham brought up the matter in the Board of Control, and expressed his disapproval of the Commissioner's action. He pointed out that a week ago fare to go to and from work, the matter will probably come up again in the Board of Control. Scaffold Inspection. The recommendation of the City Engineer that the City appoint a scaffolding inspector at \$2.50 per day for nine hours will be further taken up to-day. Mr. Coatsworth states that it is absolutely impossible for his present staff to see that the provisions of the by-laws of the city relating to the construction of scaffolding are carried out.

Waterfront Improvements. City Solicitor Caswell was instructed to press the application before the Dominion government for water lots on the lands patented to the Harbor Commission, near the Queen's Wharf and the water lots south of the Exhibition grounds. The C.P.R. has applied for the water lots, and may get it, the city getting the remainder. Must Give Details. The Works Committee asked for \$50,000 for interim appropriations in advance of the estimates for the year. The matter was taken to several of the items, and the matter was laid over until to-morrow, when the City Engineer will explain.

School Board Finances. The City Auditor, as instructed at the last meeting of the Board, reported that the appropriation of \$200,000 to the Public School Board for repairs in 1901 was \$20,000 out of \$25,000 asked. The amount expended was \$23,573. The Mayor wanted to know if the latter amount was all paid. The matter was left over.

Want Interviews. Col. Patterson's letters in regard to the dismissal of Mr. Taylor from the City Commissioner's Department were read, and he will be asked to wait upon the Board next Wednesday. Mr. Ferguson asked an interview with the Board in reference to arrears of Western Hospital taxes. He is invited to attend next Wednesday's meeting.

Request of the Technical School. The request of the Technical School for the use of the City Engineer's office for the purpose of holding the liability of 1901, was passed. City Hall Notes. The County Council will confer with the Civic Works Committee regarding the pavement of Dundas-street between Bloor and the Junction.

In the vital characteristics of the statesmanship which they both aspire to, the thumbs may be on different sides, but that is all. Whether the two Liberal Imperialists, now agreeing in everything essential except their opinion of each other, are to work together for the gain of the empire or against each other to the loss of the empire, is a question which no one could determine. DIED IN IRELAND.

Rev. Samuel Houston, M.A., of Canada, Passes Away.

The Ballymena Telegraph (Ireland) of Saturday, 11th inst., has the following: "The death of the Rev. Samuel Houston, M.A., occurred at the house of Mrs. John Hyndman, Killybegs, on 3rd inst. A widespread sensation was caused through the village neighborhood by the sudden and unexpected death of this gentleman, who had been in usual good health up to the day of his decease. He was 62 years of age, and was a native of Ireland. His heart was in his native land, and he was desirous of his birth, was destined to be the ancestor of his race. He was a man of the kindred dust of ancestral generations. Mr. Houston began his career as an arts and theological student in Derry and Belfast. His course was pursued with much credit and distinction. Thoroughly versed in his work at every step. Graduating with his M.A., he was licensed by the Presbytery of Ballymena in 1837, and in 1838 he crossed to Canada, where he received a call to the congregation of St. John's, and was ordained and duly inducted. His second ministerial charge was Balfour, and the latter years of his ministry were spent among the people of a large and flourishing congregation in Kingston, having ministered with much acceptance and appreciation in all these places. He finally received an appointment from the Canadian government to lecture throughout Ulster on the resources and advantages of Canada. All who were acquainted with him felt him to be one of those rare spirits of whose company one never tires. His gentleness, kindness of heart, good humor, fine tone of spirituality and wealth of information made him a prime favorite wherever he went. To his great credit it must be said that he first sought the office of the Gospel ministry in the face of many obstacles and at a material sacrifice of no small cost. He loved the work, and the fire kindled in earlier days never seemed to burn low. The funeral took place on the 6th inst. His remains were honored by a large and representative body of sympathizers, an appropriate address being delivered by the Rev. Thomas E. H. Jones, B.A., minister of Killybegs, and prayer being offered by the Rev. Robert Erwin, B.A.

GERMANY TO UNITED STATES.

Chancellor Says He Desires to Keep Traditional Good Relations.

Berlin, Jan. 22.—During the course of the debate on the estimates of the Chancellor's department in the Reichstag, the Imperial Chancellor, Count Von Bülow, referred to the relations between Germany and the United States.

"I can only repeat," said he, "what I said three years ago in the Reichstag, that we are filled with an earnest desire to maintain, on the basis of perfect reciprocity and mutual appreciation, the traditional good relations which have always existed between ourselves and the United States. The voyage of Prince Henry to America is an expression of those good relations, and I am convinced his reception will be in accordance with the friendly feeling the two great nations have for one another."

The Chancellor's statement was greeted with prolonged cheers.

Archduchess Elisabeth Will Marry Vienna, Jan. 22.—The Archduchess Elisabeth, in view of her marriage Jan. 23 to Prince Otto Von Windisch-Graetz, who is not of royal blood, today took the oath renouncing all claims to the throne of Austria and the Austrian throne.
