AN ASSASSIN AFTER FAURE. Bomb Thrown at the French President. A SUSPECT UNDER ARREST. But the Real Culprit is Believed to Have Escaped.

The President was on his way to the Race Course to see the Race for the Grand Prix and the Bomb was Thrown from a Thicket. The News Spread Like Wildfire and Caused Tremendous Excitement.

Paris, June 13.—An attempt was made today to assassinate M. Felix Faure, the President of the French Republic, while he was en route to witness the Grand Prix. While M. Faure's carriage was passing a thicket near the Cascade restaurant, in the Bois de Boulogne, a bomb, which subsequently proved to be a piece of tubing about six inches long and two inches in diameter, with a thickness of half an inch, charged with gunpowder and swab, exploded.

The bomb was probably lighted by the explosion of a cigarette. The man who was seen to throw the bomb was a young man about 25, who stood in the crowd a hundred yards or more from the race course and the explosion. The police are making a thorough search of the Bois de Boulogne, and believe that the supposed pistol shot was merely the noise of a bullet striking the bomb which was a clumsily-made affair, to which a piece of fuse was attached, and the fuse was probably lighted by a paper fixed in the end of a stick, as seen by the head of the procession coming in view. The pre-arrangement was that the bomb was to be thrown at the President, and in any case the bomb could not have done much harm.

The Assassin's Implements. In the thicket where the police found the remains of the bomb they found also a pistol, upon which were engraved the words "Mort a Felix Faure," and the names of the assassin and his accomplices. Near the pistol was a small dagger bearing a similar threatening inscription, and a few feet away the police found a newspaper with a cartoon grossly insulting to the President. This contained an offensive inscription in regard to the execution of M. Faure.

A SERIOUS OUTLOOK. Turkey Appears to be Determined to Hang on to Thessaly, and Shows No Intention of Surrendering to the Powers. London, June 13.—A special despatch from Athens to the Exchange Telegraph Company reports that the armistice between Greece and Turkey has been broken by the mobilization of reinforcements, fortifying Volo and Preveza, and sending troops to various islands. The despatch also reports that the Turkish fleet passed out through the Dardanelles at 10 o'clock last night.

THE BOOM INCREASES. Its Assumed Large Proportions in British Colonies. Mining Journal. The London (Eng.) Mining Journal of June 5 contains the following: "The boom is largely assumed large proportions. Over 100 people are coming into the Kootenay daily from the east. So great was the influx into Revelstoke lately that the count-house and smelter had to be utilized for the visitors to sleep in. Besides these passengers numbers are coming in from the south. The mines in that district are chiefly owned by Americans, and many of them, such as the Slocan Star, Idaho, Ilico and Rosland group, are paying large dividends, but English capital is following in the wake of the English and Canadian, who are opening up the interior and the coast. Among the districts which are being most developed in the interior, Lillooet is easily first, although its progress was retarded by the want of means of communication. Mines are being opened all over Canyon Creek River, in the working which gold-bearing quartz was found long ago. Since the ore in this district is chiefly free-milling it is likely that it will advance very rapidly. On the south side of the Fraser, in the Nicola and Similkameen districts, several discoveries are reported in the old placer districts. The coast is being probed to be a locality where large copper deposits exist, and immense bodies of the ore of this metal are being opened up on 'Fossil Island,' Jersey Inlet and the Carleton Channel. Smelters will be erected to treat these at one or more points.
