# In Two Months Russians Have Captured MoreThan 358,000 of Enemy's Men Clothing, Arms and Muni

Continued Success in Region of Carpathians—A Lull on the West Save For Artillery - Minor Infantry Engagements Near Pozieres

Petrograd, Aug. 16.—(Via London)—Between June 4, when the Russian offensive was inagurated and August 1, General Brusiloff's forces captured more than 358,000 men. This the war office announced today.

Great numbers of guns also were captured, says the report, which gives the following figures:—Officers captured, 7,757; men, 350,845; cannon, 405; machine guns, 1,326; mine and bomb throwers, 338; powder carts, 292.

The Russians have captured a series of heights to the west of Vorokhta and Ardremoy, in the Carpathians. In the Vorokhta and Delatyn regions the Austrians are retiring to the west.





Everywhere the language of diplomacy is French, except in the communications between Britain and the United States, or between Germany and Austria, and in Belgium the prevailing language is French. Writing on this subject Ex-Attache says in the Pittsburg Despatch:

"Now, while Governor General von Bissing's elaborate and costly propaganda has failed to reconcile the Flemings to German rule, it cannot be denied that his manoeuvres have had the result of reviving the former so-called Flemish People's Party and the promulgation anew of its platform. The latter demands that on the evacuation of Belgium by the Germans the kingdom should be reconstructed as a federal union of two entirely distinct states, the one Flemish and the other Walloon, under the sceptre of King Albert. The platform provides for complete autonomy for each of the two states on the lines of Austria and Hungary before the present war. The foreign policy of the kingdom, the customs, the army and navy, the currency, the railroads, postal, telegraph and telephone services and the national finances are all to be dealt with by the federal government. All other matters are to be regarded as state affairs, and Flemish is to be the official language of Flanders and French that of the Walloon portion of the dual kingdom.

Looking to Evacuation.

"The leaders of the Flemish People's Party repudiate any sympathy or friendship for the Germans, insisting that they want to be neither German nor French; and in reply to the arguments that the discussion of such racial questions is lacking in patriotism while the German invader occupies the land and while 200,000 Walloons and Flemings are fighting side by side in the trenches for their common country, namely, Belgium, they contend that peace may come quickly and even unexpectedly, that Belgium must not emerge from the war as she was before the war, and that therefore no time must be lost in preparing for the struggle for their rights. That the Belgians, from their gallant monarch downwards, look for an evacuation of their country by the Germans at a far earlier date than is irreamt of here is shown by the fact that King Albert and his government has ap-



Dr. Joseph L. Lockary of 106 Warren street, one of Roxbury's best known physicians, died last evening at St. Stephen, N. B., from cerebral hemorphage.

Dr. Lockary left Boston about a month ago to take a much needed rest at his summer home at Oak Bay, N. B., and was stricken while there, being taken to the hospital at St. tSephen.

He was born at St. Stephen N. B., about forty-five years ago and was graduated from McGill University, Montreal, with high honors, and had been practicing in Roxbury about twenty years. His wife, who was Miss Kathryn Ladrigan, died about five years ago.

Dr. Lockary is survived by five brothers, Rev. Fr. Frank, who is in France, chaplain of one of the Canadian battalions; Lewis, now convalescing in a military hospital in England; John, Fred and Edmund; and four sisters, Catherine, Margaret, Sister Adrian, who is on Bangor, Me., and Sister Carmelita, who is in Portland. He has one son, John, about eight years of age.

Interment will take place at St. Stephen on Wednesday morning, and there will be a requiem night mass on Wednesday morning at nine o'clock at St. Joseph's Church, Roxbury.

He was a member of Massachusetts Medical Association, the Catholic Order of Forester, New England Order of Protection, being medical examiner of Algonquin Lodge of Roxbury, the Knights of Columbus, and many other fraternal and charitable organizations, where his ever ready assistance will be greatly missed.

## Russians Win Gateway To Plains of Hungary

Petrograd, via London, Aug. 15, 10.20 p.m.—The Russians have aptured Jablonitza, one of the most important gateways through the arpathians to the Hungarian plains, and have taken nearly 1,500 lditional prisoners, according to an official statement issued by the

war office tonight

Petrograd, via London, Aug. 16, 12.33 a. m.—The Russians have delivered another telling blow against the right flank of General Von Bothmer's retreating army at Tustobaby, three miles west of the Zlota Lipa and northwest of Monasterzyska.

The Austrians crossed the river at Korjoba under the shell fire of the Russian batteries, suffering heavy losses. They attempted to make a stand on the high ground on the west bank, where they had previously prepared strong entrenchments and wire defences. While shells raked the Austrians from across the river the Russians moved up from the south, where they had been expanding their positions during the last few days in the neck formed by the Zlota Lipa and the Dniester. They poured a grilling fire from machine guns on the Austrians, who withstood the Russian attacks for five hours, and then fell back on the Gorojans river, four miles to the west.

Northward battles are raging with terrific intensity along the Zlota Lipa, the Russians having succeeded at several other points in gaining a foothold on the west bank. General Sekharoff has made a considerable advance in the last thirty hours against the left flank of General Von Bothmer's new positions. He has out the Tarnopol-Lemberg railway at a new positions. 




