VOTING IS LIGHT IN FEDERAL ELECTIONS

ABOUT 15 PERCENT CAST BALLOTS UP TO NOON

Weather Fine Throughout Country Except in Middle West—Keener Interest Being Taken in Upper Canada; Issues to be Decided

UNLESS the electors in Saint John go to the polls during the rest of the afternoon and up to 7 o'clock this evening, daylight time, in larger numbers than they did this morning, the total of votes cast in this city in the Federal election of 1926 will be very small.

This figure is the result of tabulation of the numbers who had voted at 16 polling booths at that hour.

FIGURES FROM BOOTHS

The vote up to 1:15 o'clock was extremely light in the North End. In one booth in Lansdowne ward only 54 out of 284 had cast their ballots, while in another booth only 44 out of 288.

In Queen's the voting was a little heavier, 88 out of 280 and 84 out of 288 having cast ballots. In this ward about two-thirds of those who voted were women.

At East Saint John the workers reported a very light poll this morning, but this afternoon a number of places of business were shutting down and it was expected this would result in a fairly heavy vote for the day.

More than 60 votes were cast in the three advance polls in this constituency. At the Court House about 40 votes were cast, at the Lancaster poll 118 ballots were cast, and at East Saint John three persons voted.

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The Liberal campaign in Saint John Albert was closed in West Saint John when the candidates, R. T. Hayes and W. M. Byan, and W. E. Scully, former M. P., addressed a crowded and enthusiastic meeting in the Oddfellows Hall, Dr. A. F. Emery presided.

To give opportunity to the staff to post the money order window of the Post Office was closed at 1 o'clock this afternoon and registration and general delivery windows were closed between 1 and 2 o'clock.

At the Court House about 40 votes were cast, at the Lancaster poll 118 ballots were cast, and at East Saint John three persons voted.

PATENAUE'S FIGHT.

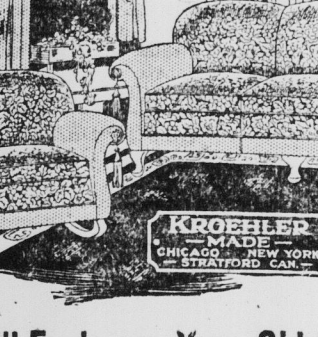

Mystery in Return of Valuable Book

Fifteenth Century Manuscript Stolen in New York, is Returned

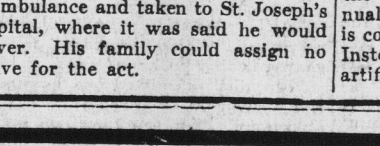
NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—The Fifteenth century Attavanti manuscript which disappeared on Aug. 25 from the National Arts Club, Gramercy Park, has been returned to its owner, Dr. Otto Vollbehr, by Edward M. Garlock, an attorney. Mr. Garlock presented the old manuscript book of prayers for the dead to Dr. Vollbehr in the presence of Charles K. Carpenter, a member of the Board of Governors of the National Arts Club.

THE KING'S OWN SCOTTISH BORDERERS

For lack of any available authentic history of The King's Own Scottish Borderers, that distinguished corps with which our local regiment, the Saint John Fusiliers, has lately been affiliated, it is not easy to reconstruct the story of that regiment. Nonetheless, what few gleanings can be gathered may prove of interest.

The K. O. S. B.'s were first raised in 1689 and the regiment was called in Edinburgh in the record time of four hours—some people say two hours. It was raised by Lord Leven and was originally known as the Edinburgh Regiment of Foot, or alternatively as Leven's Foot, and before it was four months old it fought for William III at Killbuck. As usual, its name has been changed a number of times. In 1751 it became the 28th (Edinburgh) Regiment of Foot; in 1782, the 29th (Sussex) Regiment of Foot; in 1805, the 25th (The King's Own Borderers) and in 1887, The King's Own Scottish Borderers. Usually it is known throughout the Service by its initials, the K. O. S. B.'s, but it also bears the nickname of "The Borderers." This sobriquet is partly a play on "Borderers," but it also refers to a privilege allowed the regiment to recruit without permission of the Lord Provost.

To recount all the campaigns and battles of the K. O. S. B.'s would take too much space. Suffice to say that the regiment fought with distinction in Flanders during Marlborough's campaigns, took part in the defence of Gibraltar, fought against Napoleon in Egypt and served in the West Indies, India, South Africa and finally in the Great War. Apparently it did particularly good service in Martinique in 1809, but there is no record of service on the continent of North America.

One of the most notable exploits of The King's Own Scottish Borderers was at Chitral when the regiment, brigaded with the Gordons and a regiment of Sikhs, carried the heights in a particularly important action. During this action the Gordons and the Borderers together cleared the ridge at the point of the bayonet, and had suffered so severely that they bivouacked on the ground while other regiments had to finish the battle.

Those who are interested in the uniforms worn by regiments at different periods of their history should read Kipling's "The Men That Fought at Minden," to visualize the appearance of the K. O. S. B.'s at that period. "The men that fought at Minden, they were armed with muskets,—also they were drilled by 'alderiders.'"

An illustration in the book entitled "Scotland Forever" shows an officer of the K. O. S. B.'s in 1812 whose uniform stands a resplendent figure with powdered hair, a high black stock and scarlet swallow-tail coat, heavily frogged with gold and bearing gold epaulettes. His skin-tight breeches are of white buckskin and his close-fitting boots of black leather with gilt hose spurs. His sword looks more like an oriental scimitar than a Scottish claymore and his hat is of the large cocked variety commonly associated with the Duke of Wellington.

One battalion of the K. O. S. B.'s formed a part of the original Expeditionary Force which left England in early August, 1914, under Lord French and fought in all the early actions of Mons, the Aisne, the Marne and the first battle of Ypres. In the last mentioned battle we had two battalions amalgamated—whence came the second is not clear. This, however, was a not infrequent occurrence amongst the units of the Old Contemptibles and might be taken as an indication of severe losses sustained during the first fighting. It can, therefore, be assumed that the K. O. S. B.'s of the regular army maintained their reputation as hard and dogged fighters and the records of the subsequently raised battalions of Kitchener's army will without doubt have an equally inspiring tale to tell.

A GREAT NURSE

The Canadian West today is giving a heart-warming reception to Dame Maud McCarthy, G. B. E., Matron-in-Chief of the Territorial Army Nursing Service of Great Britain. During the war this wonderful woman was Matron-in-Chief of the British Nursing Service in France, and at present she is touring Canada as the guest of the Canadian Nurses' Association.

She came to Canada as a representative of the nurses of Great Britain at the unveiling ceremony at Ottawa, in regard to which Saint John felt a particularly keen interest because one of its own daughters was on the Roll of Honor—a monument being erected to the nurses who gave their lives in service during the war. Dame McCarthy, having taken part in the Ottawa ceremony, decided to accept invitations given by associations of nurses in various parts of Canada, and she has been moving westward across the continent, being received everywhere with man-

ifestations of admiration and esteem. Hers has been a most noteworthy career. She began her work in South Africa during the Boer War, and at its close she received a special decoration. Since that time her deserved harvest in decorations has been rich: G.B.E., R.N.C., with bar, Legion d'Honneur, Medaille de la Reine Elisabeth, croix (Belge), Medaille des Epitaphes on Vermeil (Français); Lady of Grace, St. John of Jerusalem; civil Florence Nightingale Medal and American Red Cross Medal.

There is a great heart and a great mind behind this formidable array of decorations. Dame McCarthy is known to hundreds of thousands of Canadian women today as the heart of all the nursing services maintained in France by Great Britain and the British Dominions during the Great War. The Modern Girl

The modern girl is so often the subject of criticism on the severe side that she will read with refreshing appreciation on her behalf, sentiments expressed by a large audience in New York, the British House of Commons is at the present time on a holiday visit to the sports-loving girl of today and to many people seem free-and-easy in some ways, too willful in others, and impetuous, noisy and undisciplined in all ways. According to these critics, the modern girl has suppressed the finer graces of her womanhood and is without domestic faculty. If the modern girl is anything of a creature she will have found that literature is rich in examples of the frivolity and irreverence of youth of both sexes. As far as books reflect the sentiment of their day, there never was a grander mother who was not eclipsed in wickedness by the granddaughter. The modern girl, therefore, is not a new phenomenon, but one of the oldest types in history. In December, 1869, the girl of that period was described as "a fast, strong-talking, bold-thinking, dissipation-loving young woman," and there was a controversy over the question, "What will be the household and the children of the next generation? Manifestly, then, pretty much the same things that are being said today about the modern girl have been said innumerable times before and in all ages.

If the fears so long expressed had been realized, what would be the condition of womanhood today? Has it degenerated? Some of the truth, but not the whole honorable truth, in answer to the question is given in Lady Astor's speech on a Thursday night. "Look at the war," she said. "Women took the war to show some men what women were." The record is there for universal respect. The feminine generation about which some people profess a haunting fear is more apparent than real. Conditions have changed, and the widened outlook the modern girl has on life reflects her in a light which, if different, is not necessarily worse. As Lady Astor expressed it, "This is a transition time for women, but I do not believe the modern girl is less virtuous than her grandmother, although she may be more venturesome." In the transition she has obtained more freedom and frankness and lost a lot of shyness. The change is not decay; and Lady Astor's tolerant view of her modern sister will enhance her popularity even though, unlike her, she confessedly has not bobbed her hair.

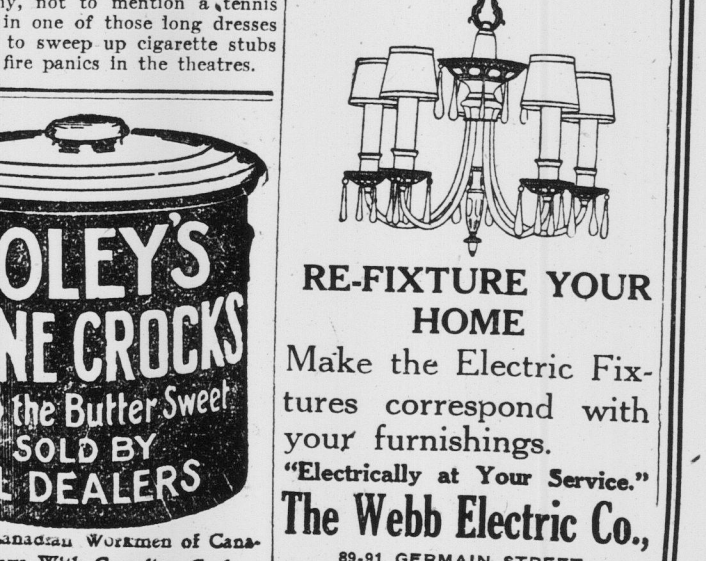

WHO'S WHO

JOSEPH STALIN

JOSEPH STALIN has become almost overnight the uncrowned dictator of Russia. In place of the triumvirate—Stalin, Zinoviev and Kamenev—that took over the reins when Lenin passed, there now reigns a singular personality. His real name is Dzhugashvili. "Stalin" was one of the aliases he assumed to conceal his real identity from the imperial police. His long revolutionary career testifies to his undiminished courage. He was five times arrested and expelled by the Imperial police, and five times he fled from exile, risking his life, struggling against overwhelming odds, and finally, in 1917, when he was expelled from the country, he returned to Russia.

Stalin has been devoted to the cause of communism since he was a boy of 17, when he was expelled from a religious seminary in Tiflis for his radical affiliations. His father had sent him there to study for the priesthood. Six years later he had achieved prominence in party circles and had been appointed to a committee that directed the activities of the Social Democratic Party—later to split into the Menshevik groups. It was then that he was first arrested by the police and sent to Siberia for three years of exile.

In 1904 he escaped from Siberia and became one of the active party agitators, organizing and writing revolutionary pamphlets. Four years later he was again captured by the police. After another escape and another arrest he eluded the authorities again and was appointed to the Central Executive Committee of the Bolshevik Party at Petrograd. More arrests and more exile followed until, finally, when the Revolution of 1917 came, he was free of the coils of the law and entered at once into the inner circle of the new rulers of Russia.

A YOUNG man writes me: Love to retain a husband's or wife's affection passes the buck to the other party. It puts the job of keeping a man vamped up to his wife, and sentences a man to a lifetime of domestic philandering if he wishes to keep his wife from offering her lips instead of the back of her ear to his kisses.

Undoubtedly, these tips about how to keep the home fires burning are worth playing. If we wish to be loved we must make ourselves lovable. If we wish to be attractive we must keep ourselves looking good. There is nothing in a slovenly, untidy woman, in a soiled gown and run-down-at-the-heels slippers to raise a thrill in a man's breast. Nor does the man with a thread of beard on his face, a dirty shirt, and no collar, look like the hero of any woman's girlish dream.

Neither do any of us, male or female, enjoy the society of one who knocks our faults and reminds us of our shortcomings, who doubts our every plan and enthusiasm with cold water, and who is fretful and whining and complaining, or glum and grouchy.

SO WHEN a woman is told that if she wishes to keep her husband in love with her she must make herself easy on his eyes, and go daily fishing for him with the bait which she originally looked him, it is good advice. And when we tell a man that if he wishes to keep his wife thanking God that she married him, instead of wondering what on earth made her fool enough to do it, he must look the part of the lover instead of resembling an old clothes dummy; that he must bear in mind that getting married did not pull his wife's sweet tooth, and that she craves love-making and compliments just as much as she did in their courting days, it is sage counsel.

But you can't turn the entire business of keeping you in love over to the other party. You have to lend a hand at the task yourself.

A WOMAN should do all she possibly can to keep her husband fascinated. It is literally true that we can think ourselves in love, or out of love. We can glorify the good qualities of our husbands and wives so that we see them as we want them to be, and not as they are, or we can turn a spotlight on their bad qualities and gaze upon them until they become unendurable afflictions.

IT IS when a man begins to let his thoughts dwell with how fat and frumpy and middle-aged his wife has become, instead of how faithful and devoted she is to him; it is when a woman begins turning over and over in her mind how seldom her husband takes her out to any place of amusement, and how long it has been since he paid her a compliment, instead of remembering how hard he works to make her comfortable, that love falls sick and pines away and dies in their households.

Another way to keep yourself in love with your wife is to follow the Boy Scouts' motto, and do some good deed for her every day. The more we do for people the more we care for them, and any man can keep himself a romantic lover just as long as he cultivates romance and treats his wife as if she were his sweetheart. The anniversaries a husband remembers, the candy and the flowers he takes his wife are double action. They not only retain the wife's affection but they keep the husband himself in love with her.

TODAY'S RECIPES
Halibut Steak with Parsley Sauce
Place steaks in baking pan, sprinkle with flour, add salt and enough water to prevent burning; dot with butter, basting frequently. Serve on platter decorated with parsley and sliced lemon. Parsley sauce is finely chopped parsley added to rich cream sauce.

Jellied Tomatoes—Peel and slice four medium sized tomatoes and place in a bowl. Drain one tablespoon gelatin in one-half cup cold water. Have ready one pint beef stock (clear) seasoned to taste. Have this boiling and stir in gelatin. When cool pour over tomatoes and set on ice till required. This is better made the previous day.

Potatoes with Maitre d'Hotel Sauce—These are the potatoes remaining from lunch. Cut potatoes into slices. Mix one ounce butter, one tablespoon flour, one-half pint milk, bring to a boil, add sliced potatoes, season and allow to heat thoroughly. Add one-half tablespoon finely chopped parsley, juice of one-half lemon and one well beaten egg. Stir over fire till the mixture thickens being careful not to break potatoes.

Ribbon Cake—This is any plain white cake, but when baking divide it into three portions, coloring one chocolate, one pink and leave one white. Put together with butter cream.

SEE-SAWING ON BROADWAY
NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Broadway reports a boom market in freaks. Agents handling everything from snake charmers to bearded ladies find their offices swamped with orders. Many of them go unfilled. There hasn't been an outstanding new freak in some years.
THE result, of course, is a demand for higher pay from "first class freaks." Midgets, I hear, are in particular demand. With the American market almost exhausted cables are going to Europe.
ONE agent tells me that the world's supply of tiny entertainers is growing small. There seems to be actual danger of the midget race disappearing from the map.
Most of the midgets, it seems, come from certain small villages in Hungary. Midgets were literally bred for the show market. The birth rate has dwindled. For what reason, nobody seems to know. They merely state that Lilliputian demand is far greater than supply. And so the little people now in America are asking wage increases.
SINCE the time of Barnum, circus agents have canvassed the European Lilliputians. One town, it was said, had a population made up largely of midgets.
A great rush of these yardstick folk was started some years back when Lilliputians who had played in America returned to their native land with fat bank rolls.
A large number have "retired" and will not return to the show game for any sum.
ONCE before a midget famine threatened, but the situation was saved by the discovery of another midget colony on the Tisza River, in the lowlands of Hungary.
Trading in them was carried on largely by peasants who, say the Broadway agents, are now demanding exorbitant prices because of the midget scarcity. Parents of midgets are said to be reeling in the price exacted for a single child. Recent figures were \$500 per "midge," I am told.

HEALTH BOARD APPROVES NEW RAW MILK LAW

Some of Former Requirements Are Deleted in New Draft

MRS. R. J. HOOPER OPPOSES CHANGE

Will Not Have to Kill Cattle Infected With Tuberculosis

The Board of Health, at a special meeting held yesterday afternoon, accepted a set of regulations governing the sale of raw milk in Saint John and will submit them to the Minister of Health, Hon. Dr. H. I. Taylor, for approval.

Dr. Warwick's recommendations are in amendment to the regulations of the Saint John Sub-District Board of Health and additional to the regulations of the Department of Health regarding dairies and milk under authority of Section 44 of the Public Health Act, 1918.

Section 2 of the regulations of the Board of Health and additional to the regulations of the Department of Health regarding dairies and milk is hereby further amended by the addition after the words "certified milk or cream as hereinafter defined," of the words, "and except raw milk—Grade A—as hereinafter defined," and by the addition to the same section of

an additional sub-section (C), which shall read as follows:

THE AMENDMENTS.

(C) It shall be unlawful to apply the term raw milk—Grade A, to any milk which does not comply with the following standard:

1. It shall be taken from a herd, all animals of which have been subjected annually to the tuberculin test and certified without reaction. Such tests to be made by a veterinary surgeon in the employ of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, or one approved by the Sub-District Board of Health.

All animals falling to pass such tuberculin test shall be removed from the buildings, yards and pastures in which the herd or any part thereof is kept.

2. Raw milk—Grade A, shall (unless otherwise specified in these regulations) conform to the standards provided, and be produced and handled strictly in accordance with the regulations of the Department of Health of New Brunswick regarding "Dairies and Milk."

3. It shall be free from blood, pus, sediment or disease-producing organisms.

4. It shall be free from disagreeable odor or taste.

5. It shall be cooled to 35 degrees or under, within one hour after milking, and kept at or below that temperature until delivered to the consumer.

6. It shall, immediately after being cooled, be bottled in sterile bottles which shall be immediately sealed.

7. It shall be plainly labelled raw milk Grade A (not pasteurized) with the name of the dairyman producing same and the day or date of milking.

8. Every person whose work brings him or her in regular contact with the production or handling of raw milk—Grade A—shall hold a certificate from

a regularly qualified physician certifying to the fact that within 12 months laboratory and other examinations have been made indicating that such person is free from tuberculosis, that such person is not a carrier of typhoid, and that such person is free of any disease capable of being spread through milk supplies.

9. Any dairyman who receives a permit from the Saint John Sub-District Board of Health to supply raw milk—Grade A—shall send notice to the said Sub-District Board of Health within 24 hours of any infectious, contagious or communicable disease or other illness occurring among the persons employed upon his dairy farm or among the members of any household in which such persons live.

Provided that no milk shall be sold offered for sale, held for sale or supplied by any person, or be in the possession of any licensed milk vendor within the Saint John milk district as raw milk—Grade A, unless such milk shall have been produced and handled strictly in accordance with all the regulations of the Department of Health of New Brunswick respecting dairies and milk, and with the regulations of the Saint John Sub-District Board of Health respecting raw milk—Grade A—and the producer thereof shall have received a permit from the said Sub-District Board of Health to supply such raw milk—Grade A.

The word "Milk" wherever it occurs in this sub-section (c) shall mean and include milk and cream.

ALTERED PROVISIONS.

The amended regulations passed by the Board of Health yesterday among other things obviate the necessity of slaughtering milk cattle not withstanding the tuberculin test; they shall be rigidly segregated instead, subject to surveillance. They also demand proper lighting, sanitation, cleanliness of utensils, screened windows, absence of

unsure pills, butterfat quality, etc., in connection with milk houses. Provision is made that labels on Grade A milk also bear the words "not pasteurized" as additional information to purchasers, and that section 9, dealing with infringements of the regulations, be couched in legal phraseology in collaboration with the board's solicitor, Col. E. C. Weyman.

Another point developed by the proposed new regulations is that the necessity of examination, indicating the health of milk handlers, shall be yearly only, and not every three months as suggested by the government committee a few weeks ago.

A still further point is that under the proposed new rules it will be unnecessary to prove sale in court of law. To discover contraband milk in possession of a dealer will be sufficient evidence.

MRS. HOOPER DISSENTS.

When a vote was taken on the passage of Dr. Warwick's amended regulations there was but one dissenting voice, that of Mrs. R. J. Hooper, who expressed lack of faith in the sincerity of both the lawyers and the milkmen involved in the controversy. Other members, however, felt Dr. Warwick's revision of the government's own amendments designed some weeks ago to meet a deadlock condition as between milk producers and the sub-district Board of Health, were logical and fair to all concerned. What was of paramount importance they did not compromise in any degree the strong stand taken by the board in the protection of public health, it was said.

MR. WIGMORE'S STAND

Commissioner R. W. Wigmore, who moved the passage of the regulations, felt the board would be doing its duty well in accepting Dr. Warwick's amendments. He was strong believer in "home rule" in such matters since

Saint John city and county only were affected by the present milk question the sub-district Board of Health was the immediate authority to deal with it. He felt certain the intelligent general public would concur in this view, and it was with a clear mind and a dutiful spirit he supported the regulations. W. H. Golding in like vein seconded Commissioner Wigmore's motion.

DR. WARWICK'S VIEW.

Dr. Warwick commenting upon his revision of the government's amendments said he felt they represented the minimum of what could be safely adopted for the sale of raw milk. He was as considerate of the interests of the milk producers as his professional experience would admit and surrounded the public with every reasonable safeguard.

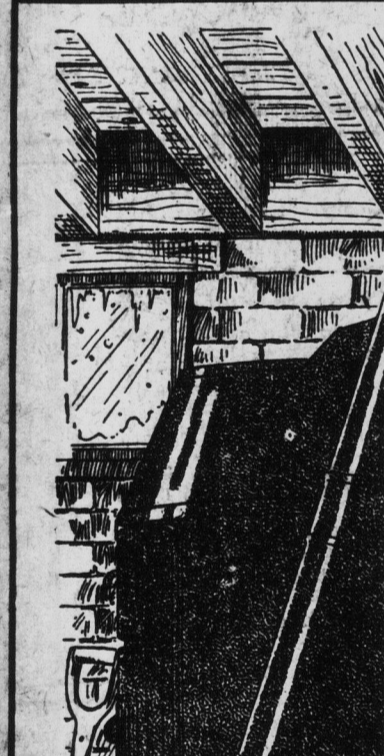

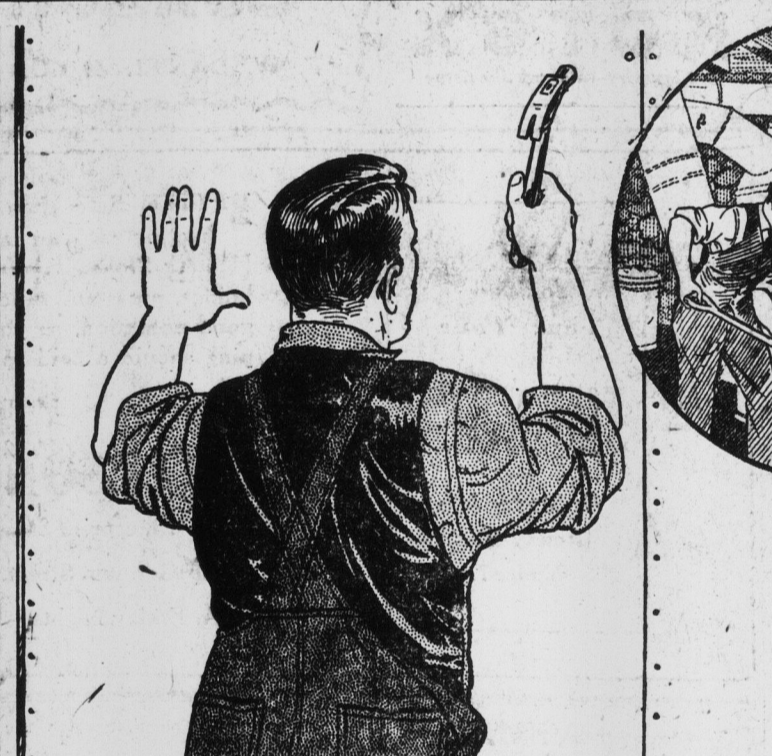

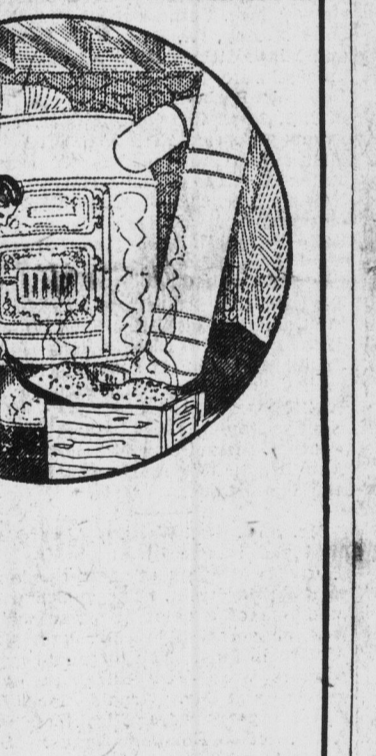

This has been accomplished through the untiring efforts of the present president of the M. P. B. A. U. of C., a branch of the parent, S. F. Doyle, of Charlottetown.

"Many important problems are to come before this meeting, foremost among them the question of the re-instatement of many Maritime athletes who have been under the ban for some years. Outstanding among these athletes are Alex McDonald, Charlie Campbell, Johnny Patterson, Joe McCarthy, Cape Breton men—Leo Moore, Lester Lowthry, Paddy Nolan, Simon Higgins, Billy Richardson, Blair Carroll, George Carroll and many others. All of them are after amateur cards and in their quest for re-instatement they have the support of the officials of the M. P. B. A. U. of C.

"Contrary to general opinion Cape Breton and mainland athletes have not been granted cards but Mr. Doyle has hopes that after the meeting in December every man in the Maritimes will have received a clean bill from the Dominion authorities.

"Heretofore Maritime athletes have not received a square deal at the annual meeting of the C. A. U. of Canada because the case for the Maritimes was ill presented and in some cases, deliberately ignored. The M. P. B. elected certain delegates to attend the annual meeting of the C. A. U. and those delegates generally consisted of officers of the M. P. B. I have to say that the present president of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. that in at least one case a Maritime athlete was discouraged from getting a card at the annual meeting when that delegate, who was a past president of the M. P. B. stood up in the meeting and said 'No, as long as I have anything to do with it, he will never get a card.'
