Therefore, son, I can give you no better advice about how to retain your affection for your wife than just to focus your eyes upon her shining virtues and willfully blind yourself to her faults.



Hard Schedule for Week Lies Ahead for League Leaders

THE race in the big leagues is assuming all the carmarks of the most bitter struggle in the history of organized baseball, for not only is Cincinnati now tied for first place with the St. Louis Cards and the Pirates snapping at their heels, but in the American League the Yankees dropped to within five and one-half games of Cleveland coupled with the series scheduled to open tomorrow in Cleveland for six games between the league lead-

It is now a race to the end between St. Louis and the Reds, each having 12 games to play. St. Louis plays at Bos-ton today, while the Reds are at Brook lyn. Tomorrow, St. Louis starts a four game series with Philadelphia, while comorrow the Reds still are at the Brooklyn ball yard. On Sept. 16, Cincinnati joins issue with New York in a three-game series. Pitsburgh plays New York today and tomorrow, and then moves over to Brooklyn for a four game series. With the Pirates only two and one-half games behind, the leaders cannot afford any slip-ups.

VESTERDAY'S RESULTS

NEW YORK, Sept. 14-Cincinnati and St. Louis were thundering down the home stretch neck and neck race, the banner attraction at the big league race track. However, there can be no dead heat in this baseball thriller. Both clubs have 12 games to go, and even though they keep abreast and win 11 contests, one team must lose in the other for one game remains to be played between the Cardinals and Reds before the season's curtain drops. Bolstered by their third consecutive conquest in Brooklyn by 4 to 0, the Cincinnati outfit drew up on equal terms with St. Louis which gave way by 5 to 4 in 14 innings at Boston. The Cardinals' schedule calls for six games with Philadelphia, three with New York, two with Brooklyn and one with Cincinnati, before the finish while the Reds have three with the Giants, two with the Robins, three with the Braves, and three with the Phillies in on to the start against St. Louis.
