ROME IS UNWASHED Vienna Finances

Is Fast on Bar Broken Water Main Makes Ser-

Blaze in Lower Manhattan is Believed of an Incendiary Origin.

FLAMES AT BEDSIDE

Families on Lower Floors Retreat in Panic as the Flames Spread.

(By Canadian Press.) New York, Feb. 19.-Thirteen lives were snuffed out in a few minutes in a fire, believed to have been of incendiary origin, basement to roof of a five-story tenement in the heart of New York's lower East Side Ghetto. Seven of those killed were child-

The blaze, fanned by a draft from the tenement's open front door, flared up the stairs, blocking escape of the eight families

who occupied the building. Some of those in the two up per stories, awakened to find the flames at their bedsides, met death before they could even try to brave a dash through the roaring furnace with which they were confronted.

Retreat in Panic.

Terrified on opening their hall doors to find a vortex of flames mushrooming down from the roof through the smoked-choked corridor, the families on the lower floors retreated in panic to the windows from which they managed, in some cases by seemingly impossible means, to reach safety. Several were severely burned; others were injured in falls.

Of the dead, five were boys and two girls, four women and two men. One of the children who lost their lives was an infant, whose charred body was found at the breast of its dead mother. The fire was discovered by a passing policeman, who saw smoke and flames rising against the inner side of a win-





DEFECTIVE BEAM IS **BLAMED FOR DEATH**

Jury Hears Evidence in the West Side Fatality on Saturday.

The inquest into the death of William Mosher, jr., of 18 Hanover street, a 'longshoi eman who fell into the hold of the Anchor-Donaldson Line ship Alconda, at No. 6 berth, Saturday afternoon about 5 o'clock, was continued last evening before Coroner Dr. F. "Greed" Closest Approach To Novel

(By Jack Jungmeyer) (By Jack Jungmeyer)

Hollywood, Feb. 19.—I have just had the rare privilege of viewing the first novel-length motion picture, "Greed," literally translated from Frank Norris' "McTeague" by Erich Von Stroheim. Cloistered in the Goldwyn Pictures projection room with Von Stroheim, members of his staff and studio officials, I saw "Greed" unfolded in fortyodd reels. It took from ten in the morning to after six at night of continuous showing.

odd reels. It took from ten in the morning to after six at night of continuous showing.

In this original extended presentation it leaves the most profound impression of any picture ever made; partly because of its material and treatment, partly because it has adequate time to absorb the beholder. It creates, indeed, the precise effect which the unhurried reader gets from the book.

Under present conditions, "Greed" cannot be exhibited in any such length. It will be trimmed to twelve reels at most, to conform to exigencies of time, crowds and theatrical status quo.

It will be argued that any artist, at least the one addressing himself to the masses, must learn to adapt his genius to the prevailing art forms. That is the commercial dominance of art.

But Von Stroheim's rendition in "Greed," as I saw it in the projection room, is an intensely interesting experiment. It demonstrates what may be done with vigorous dramatic material given sufficient space limits. By contrast with the standard length movie, it shows why of necessity the latter, hop-skip-and-jumping, skimming surfaces, so seldom leave a sharp imprint.

The story of McTeague is essentially

The story of McTeague is essentially one of soul searching. The picture had to find action equivalents for states of mind, to shadow forth the crawl of weird thoughts, of crooked fears and manias. And to this the genius of Von Stroheim proved fully equal.
