For the purpose of accertaining the causes of street accidents and fatalities, and discussing means for their prevention, a meeting was called by the Automebile Club of Canada yesterday afternoon in the club's headquarters, New Birks Building. Representatives from the Juvenile Delinquents Court, the Coroner's Court, the city police depart-ment, the School Commissioners, and portation companies were present, the question was descussed and some

the question was descussed and some suggestions were made. J. A. Duchastel, president of the club, as chairman, referred to the alarming increase in the number of fatalitines, and explained the purpose of the meeting. Mr. Lorenzo Prince, deputy coroner, submitted statistics showing the number of fatalities which have occurred during the present year to date. Of the fifty-five automobile fatalities, twenty-three of the victims were children under ten years of age, the average being seven years. In five cases the children who were hanging on passing horse drawn vehicles, had either jumped or fallen in front of passing motor cars. Women drivers did not figure in any of the fa-talities, it being the consensus of opinion that the women were more conscientious that the women were more In preventing accidents.
