Mr. Brooks' Letter.

As a politician he says our schools are in a bad condition, but listen to what he says as an inspector drawing a good salary from the government:

I will read an extract from the report of Inspector A. J. Brooks, 1920, as it appears on page 27 of the annual report of the schools of New Brunswick:

"White overseas I had an opportunity of observing educational conditions in other countries and particularly noting the interest taken by the general public in this most important work. I am certain our system compares very favorably with any I have seen, but I do not believe our people, in general, take the same interest in education as the people of the old countries. As, for instance, you would not find in those countries, ratepayers electing as trustees, men whose sole interest in schoolwork is to make it as cheap as possible and in many cases neglecting to employ teachers unless absolutely work is to make it as cheap as possible and in many cases neglecting to employ teachers unless absolutely forced to do so. This condition does not prevail only in a few, but I am sorry to say, in a number of districts. 'Anything is good enough for the school as long as our taxes are kept down' is too often the sentiment. The old government sold school books through political vendors, that is to say, only political supporters of the government were allowed to handle school books, and it was anything but a success, for in 1914, ninety-two vendors made no returns of the books they handled. When we came into power we found a number of outstanding accounts which amounted to a considerable amount of money, accounts that were uncolfectable because the government gave credit to their political vendors, and when a vendor failed in business, his stock of books, which really belonged to the government, was included in the stock in trade and in frequent instances were sold to satisfy creditors, and the province stood the loss. We changed that policy, but still adhered to the policy to sell the books at cost, not to political vendors, but to any merchant or to anyone who desired to handle them. Any dealer could obtain them upon application, but the business has since we came into power been conducted on a cash basis.

True it is that the prices of school books have increased enormously, but the principle under which we handle them is there, namely, of selling them at cost. You all know that during the war the cost of labor and material entering into printing and publishing went up remarkably and the year 1920 showed the greatest increase in prices that had taken place in the publishing business. The increase from 1917 to 1920 was over sixty per cent. Our friends of the opposition complain that we have increased the prices of school books. But I would like to point out that in the year 1914 the province made a profit on school books sold. But in 1917, the last year of the old government, when the prices were named by order-incouncil, a profit was also made. But every year up to last year, a loss was shown upon our school book transactions, a loss no less than a total of \$24,000 for the years 1919, 1920 and 1921. But when our opponents charge us with reckless extravagance, some comparisons are in order. All you have to do is to examine the figures in the Comptroller General's report and you will find in 1908 the bonded debt was in round figures \$6,000,000, and that at the 81st of October, 1916, it amounted to in round figures nearly sixteen millions, or an increase in eight years of about \$10,000,000. But when they went out of power they left considerable debt behind them—in round figures about \$8,000,000. So that in their eight years they had added about \$18,000,000 to the bonded debt, or an average of \$1,500,000 per annum. Some Comparisons.



FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

By Edward N. Davis

Formerly Technical Electrical Expert For U. S. Government

The fundamental units of an electric circuit are—VOLT, the unit of pressure—AMPERE, the unit of a current—OHM, the unit of resistance. Ohm's Law states that the current in a circuit equals the voltage divided by the

ELECTROMOTIVE FORCE.

Electromotive force or voltage may be generated by chemical action in primary or secondary batteries or by mechanical action applied to alternating or direct current generators.

STORAGE BATTERIES. Two types of storage cells are in general use, the lead plate-sulphuric acid cell, and the nickel-iron-alkaline cell. Both types of cells require charging from an outside source and deliver current until discharged.

THE RADIO TRANSMITTER. The essential features of a radio transmitter are shown in this lesson by a simple diagram. The direct current motor provides mechanical energy for the operation of the alternating current generator. The voltage of the generator is greatly increased by the power transformer and used to charge a battery of condensers. The discharge of the condensers across the spark gap creates rapid oscillations which are transferred by means of the oscillation transformer, to the antenna circuit and the energy radiated in the form of electromagnetic waves.

THE ALTERNATING CURRENT GENERATOR.

By the mechanical rotation of armature coils in a magnetic field of constant strength, the generator developes an alternating voltage and current. The magnetic field is produced by electromagnetic magnets so wound as to have north and south poles, the direct current necessary for excitation being received from an external source. In the radio transmitter the alternating current and voltage of the generator supply energy to the primary winding of the power transformer.

Permanent magnets and electromagnets possess north and south poles and the lines of force leave the magnet at the north pole and enter at the south pole. Like magnetic poles repel and unlike magnetic poles attract. Lines of magnetic force flow more easily through iron or steel than through air.



REVENUE \$300,000?

Fredericton Gleaner:-New Brunswick will have more than 16,000 motor vehicles licensed in 1922, according to a vehicles licensed in 1922, according to a prediction made yesterday by Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works, while here on a departmental business trip.

There were 12,585 automobiles and 875 motor trucks licensed in the province last year and the minister said that he expected to see 2,000 more cars in New Brunswick this year than last. Receipts from motor vehicle license fees to date are about \$225,000, while last year the total reached for the entire twelve months was \$276,232. It seems to be the expectation that the \$300,000 mark in expectation that the \$300,000 mark in receipts will be exceeded this year.

COAL FOR BOSTON.

Although 7,000 tons of Cape Breton coal was recently shipped from International Pier to Boston in the S. S. Wilton, the Dominion Coal Company has no contract for the supply of fuel to the New England metropolis. What has happened is that a Massachusetts concern, the Everett Gas Company, has come to Everett Gas Company, has come to Cape Breton for the coal, which, on account of the American strike, it can no longer obtain through its usual chan-nels. As soon as the strike is over the shipments from Sydney will cease, it is said. At present it is believed the Wilton will take about eight cargoes or 56,000 tons to Boston during the coming







HALIFAX VIEW OF CONFERENCE

Welfare of That City and of St. John Bound Up With Each Other.

(Halifax Chronicle.) The value of such conferences as that now being held by the St. John and Halifax Boards of Trade is not perhaps fully realized. The welfare of one city is so bound up with that of the other in their interests may be called practically identical. The closer co-operation of the maritime members of parliament may well be regarded as essential for the furtherance of maritime province interests. Too often in the past their failure to co-operate has resulted in failure to secure recognition of maritime right. Warehousing and terminal facilities are also vital questions, and what separate effort may win. For these and kindred reasons the conference may well be termed timely and important. The eyes, not only of the people of both cities, but to a degree of all Canada, must be certainly and important.

COMMITS SUICIDE AFTER DISMISSAL

Miss Long Removed as Principal of School After Twenty-Seven Years of Service.

Chicago, June 2.—Feeling against the school board in Elgin, Ill., which was fanned to fever heat at the election two months ago, expressed itself again at an indignation meeting, following the suicide of Miss Mary Elizabeth Long, for twenty-seven years a teacher in the schools of the Kane County city.

Miss Long, who was removed at a meeting of the school board as principal of the Sheridan School—a post she had held for the last fourteen years—ended her life by drinking carbolic acid in her mother's home in Elgin. A few hours later, Mrs. Jennie Long, widow mother of the teacher, wept at the inquest as she declared that the action of the school board alone was responsible for her daughter's act.

As the school board met to pass a formal resolution of regret for Miss Long's death, more than thirty teachers who had either been dismissed or placed on probation by the same order planned to meet in the office of Attorney Frank A. Russell. So many flocked to the gathering, however, that it developed into a popular protest meeting and had to adjourn to a hall, where speeches bitterly assailing the action of the board as "un-American," and charging it with "the murder of Miss Long," were delivered.








CROWN PRINCESS IS LAID TO REST

Body of Margaret of Connaught Taken to Burial Place.

Stockholm, May 15—(By Mail)—The remains of the late Crown Princess of Sweden, Princess Margaret of Connaught, were today transferred to the beautiful site in the Haga Palace Park, outside Stockholm, which she herself had chosen as her last resting place. Pending the necessary arrangements for converting this site into a consecrated burial place, to be used in future for uncrowned members of the royal family, the coffin of the crown princess has been lying on a catafalque in Stockholm Cathedral.

Today's ceremony was private, being attended only by the royal family and members of the court, but the attitude of the people all along the road followed by the British and Swedish flags, showed the lasting and affectionate devotion to her memory shared by high and low. The same feeling was prevalent when a few days ago, a memorial window in the English church in memory of the crown princess, for which contributions were received from her friends in England and from friends and members of the congregation here, was dedicated by the Bishop for North and Central Europe (Dr. Bury), the Archbishop of Upsala, Primate of Sweden, taking part in the ceremony of dedication, which was attended by the crown prince and his children and other members of the royal family.

The late crown princess of Sweden, the eldest daughter of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, died at Stockholm on May 1, 1920.


