### MATTER OF PRAYERS FOR DEAD DISCUSSED AT THE SYNOD MEETING

Toronto, Sept. 19—Recitation of the creed of St. Athanasius is no longer obligatory in the Church of England in Landa, according to a decision arrived at yesterday by the general synod, after a discussion which lasted throughout the morning and afternoon.

The historic creed will be printed in the prayer book with a rubric to the effect that it may be sung or said in place of the Apostles' creed at morning or evening prayer on any day of the year. The Lambeth translation was the text decided upon.

Late in the evening a discussion regarding prayers for the dead was precipitated by Archdeacon Patterson-Smythe, who favored the inclusion, in the prayer book, of a prayer used in the Scottish church. The Bishop of Ontario, while expressing sympathy with these sentiments, thought that the matter involved a question of principle, and therefore was a violation of the compact by which the revision of the prayer book was determined upon at the last session of the synod. Archbishop Matheson also took this view, and ruled the matter out of order.

## COULD NOT USE CANADIAN TOOLS

German Soldiers Got Some Bad Tosses When They Tried To Handle Captured Railway Scra-

London, Sept. 18—(Canadian Press de-

When the Canadian railroaders followed up on the heels of the advances, repairing, reconstructing and laying new stretches of standard and light gauge tracks, they found scrapers and other things neatly stacked up and surmounted by notice "verboten" and other verbiage that gave warning that those tools were not to be used.

### SERBIAN PRISONERS

SOLD AS SLAVES BY CENTRAL POWERS

Paris, Sept. 18—The Serbian government is in possession of documents proving beyond possible question that thousands of Serbian prisoners have been sold as slaves for a specified period to Turkey by Bulgaria, Austria-Hungary and Germany, according to a Balkan agency despatch from Corfu.

The prisoners, it is stated, were delivered to contractors who are engaged in work in Asia Minor and Anatolia. It is said they were subjected to terrible treatment and that thousands have died from typhus, cholera and hunger.




