At the meeting of the common council this morning R. A. Macintyre appeared to answer any questions regarding his suit of the N. B. Power Company. Mayor Hayes explained that the auditor had been absent from the city for some time and will very busy. He said, however, that he had an opportunity of remaining for a short time to answer any questions and asked the council to ask, but was ready to go on with the regular business as he had his report home and he had a number of questions he would like to ask.

WILL START WORK ON THE VOCATIONAL BUILDING AT ONCE

Frederickton, Feb. 20.—Scott & Forbes, contractors on the buildings being erected on the old Government House grounds by the Hospital Commission, were also the successful contractors for the vocational building which is to form part of the equipment. Work on the building will begin at once. The vocational building will be situated on the western end of the old Government House. The material will be the same as that used in construction of the other buildings, wood with stucco finish. The dimensions will be 102 by 82 feet, and a height of two and a half stories. The ground floor will contain offices and class-rooms. A completely equipped heating alley will be located in the basement. The ground floor will contain an auditorium with seating capacity for 400 persons. A moving picture machine will be a feature of the equipment here. The building also will contain drafting rooms and a work shop. The sanitary equipment will be complete in every detail. It is expected that the other buildings which were begun last autumn will be finished by the end of the month. The government has promised to swing a number of ridings which were carried by the opposition to the government. The government may yet have a majority of seventy-five as predicted at one time.

General Vaccination At Napodogan and Quarantine Established—Cases Concealed on North Shore

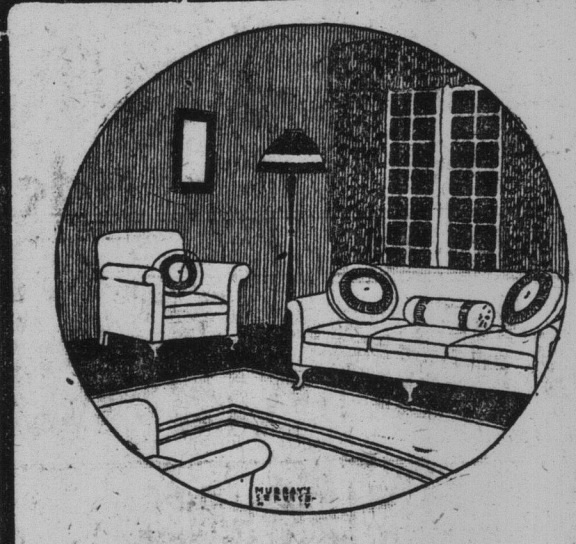

An Ottawa despatch says that "the extension of the franchise to women is already the established policy of the government, and it is certain that woman suffrage will be an established fact in Canada, at least before another general election comes around."

THE JUVENILE COURT.

In the city of Toronto the estimates for the juvenile court this year are \$16,637. The staff has been increased by one probation officer and one clerk. The mayor appeared to think that money could be saved by sending the work back to the police court, but that view was not upheld.

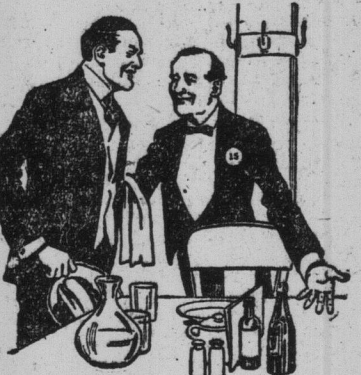

here, in which approximately 7,000 head of stock were quartered. All indications tend to show that the animals were killed by poison placed in the watering troughs.

PROBITION IS A BLESSING TO THE POOR MAN

Prohibition has been a great blessing to many homes in Toronto, says the Toronto Star. This fact is attested by the staff of nurses in the city medical health department in reports recently presented, following careful investigation. These reports were prepared in response to a request from ex-Controller James Simpson, who recently returned from a lecturing tour in England, where leading educationalists wanted to know what effect prohibition had had upon infant mortality, the education of children, and the condition of home life.

"One may say it is the poor man's blessing," says one nurse. "First it has meant the rehabilitation of the home. Wages that were formerly spent at the saloon on the corner are now used in the upbuilding of that home in buying not only the necessities of life, but a few of the luxuries as well. The moral tone of the family has also been raised to a higher standard as a result of prohibition, and there is a vast impression on the physical side as well.

The nurses held their regular meeting today in one of the lecture rooms of the General Hospital, College street, at which Mr. Simpson delivered an address upon the question of prohibition and its effect upon child life and education. Following his address the nurses were invited to ask questions, and his explanation with reference to the progress of the temperance movement in the United Kingdom was given.

TENDENCY OF NATION TO SPLIT UP INTO SEPARATE REPUBLICS

LABOR SITUATION STILL CRITICAL

Washington, Feb. 20.—The labor situation, especially as it affects the navy shipyards, has assumed a critical aspect which, it is believed in many quarters, demands action on the part of President Wilson, if the war programme of the government is to be carried forward to success.

It is reported from many sections, it is stated, have shown a lack of co-operation, and a spirit of indifference among many workers which has developed into a serious menace. It is no secret that negotiations carried on up to this time, through various wage commissions and boards of conciliation, have not resulted in satisfactory adjustments and a maximum of efficiency.

The strike of 1,500 carpenters employed at Staten Island shipyards, because their demands for wage increases to meet the scale on the Pacific coast were not granted immediately, has served to concentrate attention on the general situation, with an insistent demand for a "showdown" which will reveal all of the existing conditions. These strikers, it is understood, were asked to await the decision of the shipping board's wage adjustment commission, and refused.

Reports have been heard in increasing numbers, also, of a tendency on the part of some groups of workmen in the shipyards to lag at their tasks, refusing to drive as many rivets as they were able to drive in a day's work, because other employees, not so efficient as they were, received the same wage. It has been reported also that in some instances rules recognized by organized labor were not conducive to the swift achievement of maximum results.

There have been increasing and insistent demands also for congressional action or open investigation in some other quarters, which would place before the public, without censorship, the actual facts in detail and prove or disprove the rumors which have been in circulation. It has been hinted here that President Wilson's attention has been called to the necessity of speaking plainly to the employees as well as to capital if a cure for the reported existing conditions is to be found speedily, and anything approaching a satisfactory working basis arrived at in time to avoid a more serious crippling of the shipbuilding programme.

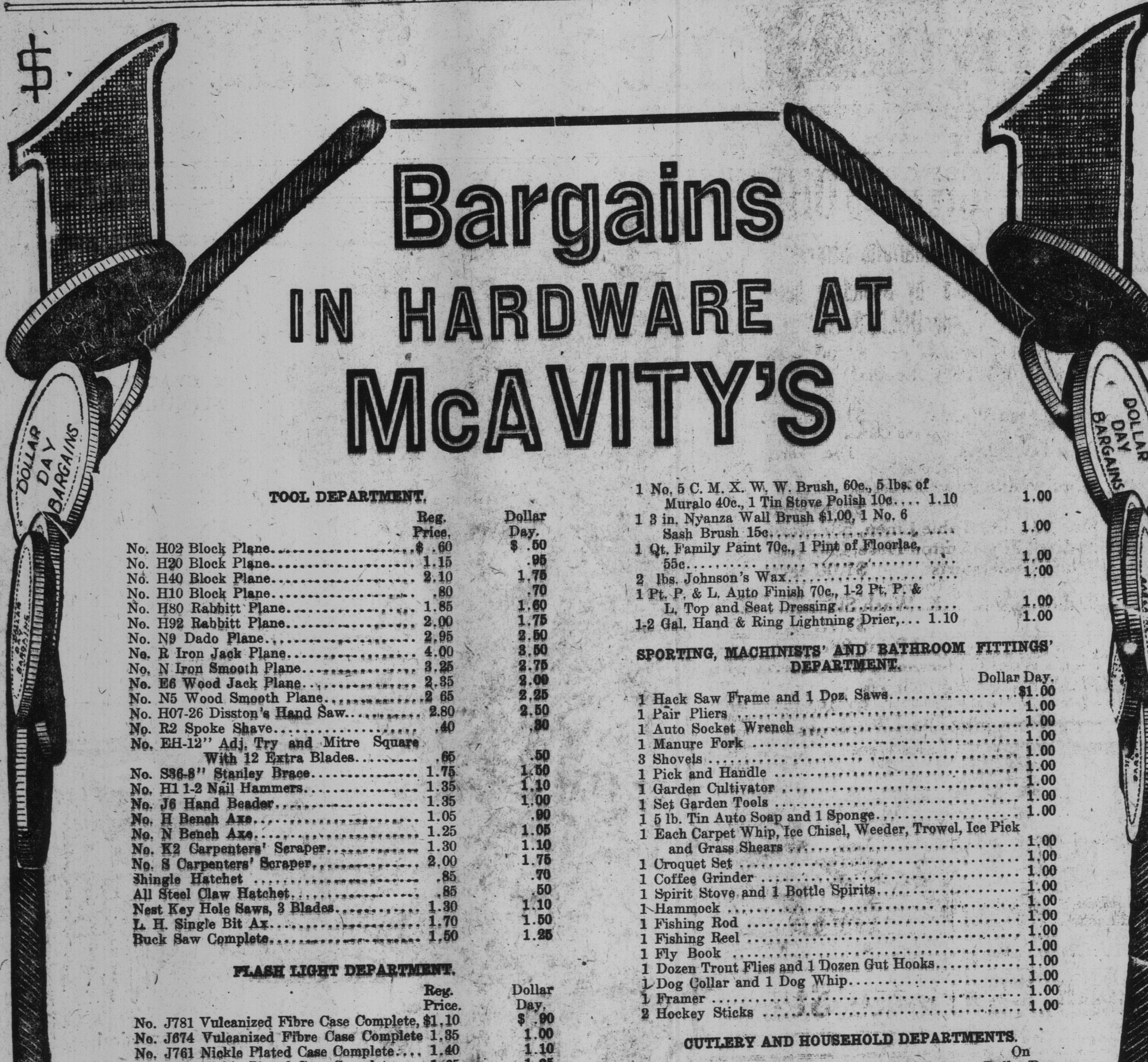

CASH AND CARRY SYSTEM TRIED

Ottawa Merchants Watch Experiment With Interest—If Successful, May Become Universal in Capital

Ottawa, Feb. 17—If an experiment now being made by one Ottawa grocer proves the success expected, the "cash and carry" system is likely to be generally adopted by the stores of the capital.

The case in question is that of B. G. Crabtree, Ltd., which firm is acting upon a suggestion of the food controller, and has undertaken to give the scheme a thorough trial.

As a result of the trouble experienced, it was decided to adopt the suggestion of the food controller regarding the "cash and carry" plan, and it is being put into effect immediately.

Whether the "cash and carry" system proves a success or not, some steps toward effecting a reduction in present delivery costs are to be taken at an early date.

It is probable that an organization capable of handling the deliveries of the principal business houses will be effected, and the city laid out in zones, under direction of a central office.

At the same time, it is expected that customers will be encouraged to carry much larger volume of purchases than at present, with reduced prices as the inducement.

Merchants were reluctant to express an opinion on the merits of the "cash and carry" plan, but all said the present experiment would be watched with great interest, and that its success would result in general adoption of the scheme, which has proved successful in other cities.

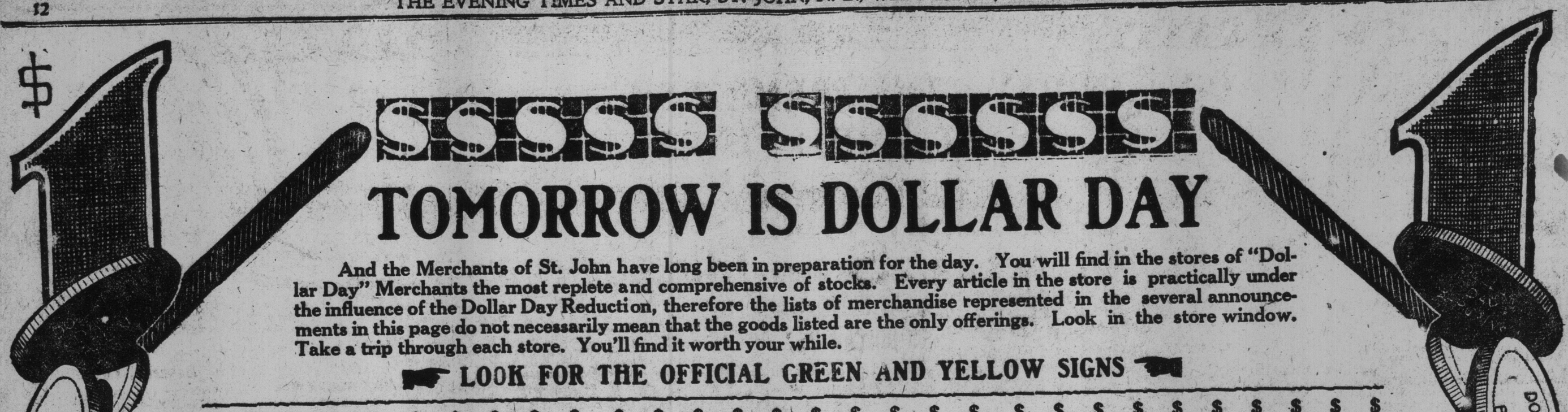

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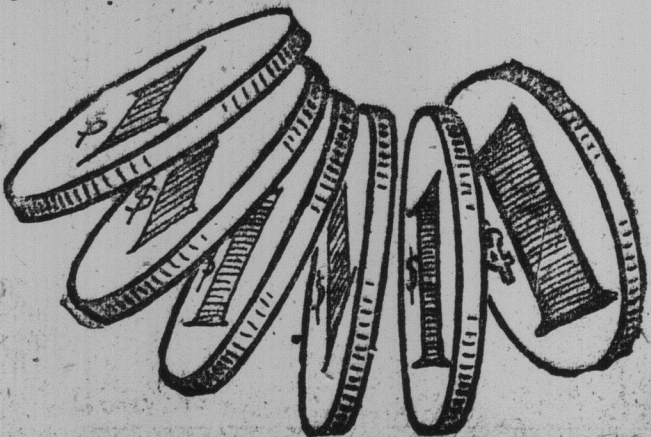

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HOSPITAL WILL HAVE 1,000 BEDS

Two New Wings and Reception Hall Added to Present Accommodation in Winnipeg Institution

By further additions about to be made by the Military Hospitals Commission to the Manitoba Military Convalescent Hospital, Tuxedo Park, Winnipeg, that establishment is to be increased to a thousand bed centre, the largest military hospital in Western Canada.

Ward accommodation is to be provided in two wings at the north-west corner of the group of buildings, overlooking the river bank. These wings will be connected by heated passage ways with the active treatment centre in what was formerly known as Roblin Hall and with the dining pavilion, erected a year ago by the Military Hospitals Commission.

During the past few months extensive facilities for the use of electrical treatment, remedial baths, massage, and such treatments as require special apparatus have been installed in one building specially set aside for this purpose.

A fitting room and repair shop for artificial limbs has also been established at this hospital as a branch of the Artificial Limb Factory conducted by the M. H. C. Owing to the growth of the institution a residence building for female help, including nurses, dietitians, masseuses and others, is now to be built. The site chosen for this residence is to the east of the campus near the power plant. On the recommendation of the commission's engineer important additions to the central heating and power plant are also being made to avoid the danger of under-heating the new buildings.

Recreational Facilities. Another important addition to the group of buildings is a recreation hall containing a stage and auditorium, bowling alley, canteen, etc. This structure will stand just inside the gate to the west. The auditorium will have seating accommodation for between nine hundred and a thousand.

As it is the policy of the Military Hospitals Commission to provide recreation facilities in all institutions, a morning picture show will be inaugurated, and by screening the windows and installing gymnastic apparatus opportunity for playing indoor games will be given. The spacious campus affords excellent opportunity for out-door games during the fine weather.

A Western Centre. In developing this large hospital at Winnipeg the commission is carrying out its policy of having, at stated points, active treatment centres where the most advanced treatment requiring elaborate and costly equipment can be installed. It would be quite impossible and unjustifiably expensive to duplicate certain kinds of equipment in numerous small institutions. The expectation is that Western Canadian cases, requiring the class of treatment which can be given only in such an institution, will be assembled at Winnipeg for that purpose.

Other similar institutions containing the most elaborate facilities for treatment are at Halifax, N. S., St. Anne de Bellevue, Que. and Whiting, Ont. A additional reason for expanding the Winnipeg institution to this size is the exceptional vocational training facilities which have been developed at this centre. One whole building has been set aside for vocational training purposes and much equipment has been installed.

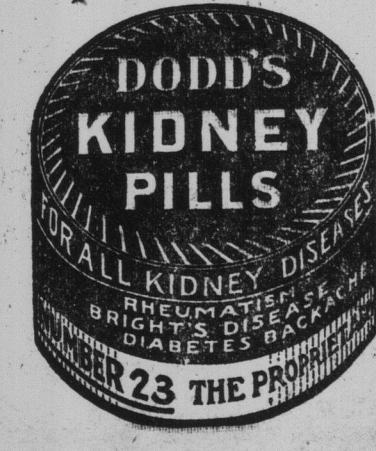
