Many of Them. Every year the question of marriage is becoming more and more difficult for men as well as for women, says Lady Aberconway in The New York Times. Men maturally hesitate to take peunilies girls from luxurious homes. Women demand from men a purer life, a more ideal pose. Thus, fearing to marry, men drift into baohelor life, where the affections are cold-stored; women find themselves in increased numbers stranded on narrow incomes, with no training, no occupation, and not means of bettering their lot. Even in the most favorable case where a girl is loved and won by a husband who is not only wealthy, but beloved, the penniless wife enters his house as a dependent and not as a parfner. How different is the case in France, where almost every woman has her dot; where the first thought of parents at the birth of a girl is to saye enough for her so as to make her independent of marriage if need be, and if she desires to marry, give her financial help in founding a new family, in the affairs of which she is an honored partner, and not a mere dependent.

If the daughter's dower deprives sons of an extra share of their paternal inheritance, each man who marries finds his wife possessed of a comfortable sum to help the household, and thus the property of the pair is not markedly less than we find on the average in England. But an immense difference lies in this; that instead of the family fortune being the exclusive property of the husband, the wife is a partner, and has, by the law of "Communité des Biens," an equal share in all the family possessions. This arrangement brings incalculable happiness to women in conferring dignity and independence.

Lorson, July 30.—Emperor Nicholas, of Russia Itally accounted as a private, recently made a seven miles march in order to gain personal experience of service as a common soldier, according to the Daily Telegraph's St. Petersburg correspondent. The emperor was attired as a rifleman, with the usual rolled overcoat, pouches with 120 rounds of ammunition, trenching spads, ration bag, etc., altogether weighing three quarters of a hundred weight, exclusive of the rifle. Thus equipped with the outfit of an infantryman, the Emperor marched up hill and down dale for seven miles, giving the salute of a private soldier to the officers whom he met on the way. 

The Canadian Government chartered steamer Beothic, which went ashore at Point Rich while bound from Halifax to Hudson Bay, returned this morning to this port under her own steam from North

Captain Falk, when interviewed this morning by the RECORDER, stated that his ship was not very badly damaged. 

### HOME OF ORANGEISM.

irst Lodge Founded In Brockville In It is not generally known that Brockville is the home of Orangeism in Canada. In 1825, Arthur McClean, C.E., came

In 1825, Arthur McClean, C.E., came from Belturbet, County Cavan, Ireland, to the town of Brockville, then called Elizabethtown, in the Johnstown district, and became actively engaged in a large mercantile business. He edited and printed a paper called The Sentinel. Young McClean was sprung from good Orange stock, kept up an Orange lodge himself, at his old home, and from youth was always an enthusiastic and consistent Orangeman. He died on Dec. 1, 1864, at the ripe age of 85 years.

ripe age of 85 years.

A young man, Ogle Robert Gowan, born in Wextord County, Ireland, emigrated to Canada in 1828, and settled in Brockville. Being an Orangeman, he soon fell in with Bro. Arthur McClean, and assisted in the editing of The Sentinel.

These young men came in contact These young men came in contact with many of their Orange brethren, who had emigrated from the mother country to Canada in the early part of

who had emigrated from the mother country to Canada in the early part of the century.

History shows that these were anxious times in this country. The Family Compact was on the descendancy. The Anglo-Canadian part of the population supported the policy of the Government, while the French-Canadians, led by the famous Papineau, ranged themselves in opposition. William Lyon Mackenzie was writing pungent diatribes on judicial and political affairs, and, even the clouds were gathering for the storm of 1837.

In 1829 application was made to the Grand Lodge in Ireland for an imperial warrant to organize a grand lodge in what was then known as British North America, Bro. McClean bearing the expense. The imperial warrant having arrived, the tocsin was sounded, and the brethren promptly responded, and gathered in the old court house, at Brockville, on Jan. 1, 1830, where, with unique ceremony, "in due and ancient form," the first grand lodge in Canada was organized and founded, of which grand institution the late Most Worshipful Bro. Ogle R. Gowam was elected the first deputy grand master of British North America.

The first primary lodge warrant was granted to L. O. L. No. 1 about Aug. 13, 1830, of which Bro. Arthur McClean was W. M. L. O. L. No. 2 was convened on July 4, 1831, with Bro. Arthur McClean as W. M.

The first celebration of No. 1 was held by the brethren on July 12, 1831.

On Sept. 3, 1832, 9s. 41-2d. were raised amongst the members by subscription, and paid Bro. Ogle R. Gowan, G.M., to assist in defraying his expenses to York (Toronto).
