With a flourish of trumpets, the president and vice-presi-dent entered at 11 o'clock and the con-ference, the first of its kind in the his-tory of the nation began. The governors arose, clapped their

The governors arose, clapped their hands and shouted. Five hundred others took their cue and the demon-stration became tumultuous. Then followed a hush. The Venerable Dr. Everett Hale, Chaplain of the Sen-ate, read from the Scriptures the de-ecription of the fertility of the land promised the Children of Israel and followed it with a supplication for guidance in the present undertaking. President Roosevelt here began his implication of the reason for the con-ference. His fifty minute speech was many times interrupted by applause and when he finally reached his point of pressors the inland waterways com-mission and declared with characteris-tic yigor that should Congress ne-glect to perpetuate the commission, "I will do it myself." He "captured" the assemblage. The governors stood up and shouted, Senators and Congress-men added a laugh to their applause and general assent was given the sen-
