Dapreciate Value of Parliamentary Rule-Government Not to be Dragged at Chariot Wheels.

BERLIN, Feb. 14.—There was a stormy scene in the Prussian Diet yesterday when Herr von Bethmann-Hollweg the Imperial Chancellor, as Prussian Prime Minister, arose to bring in the new Franchise Bill, which provides for the reform of the Prussian electoral system.

Acording to the provisions of the bill the three-class system fiself, whereby the electors are divided according to the amount of taxes they pay, is retained, but officers and other members of the educated classes are to be placed in the first and second classes irrespective of the amount of their taxes. The bill also provides for direct instead of indirect voting. The bill is not at all satisfactory to the Socialists and Radicals.

When the minister president, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, stood up a number a number of Social Democrat members on the left cried out "Pfui! Pfui! What sort of electoral bill is this?"

The Conservative members of the other side of the chamber shouted back, 'Throw them out!' The president banged his bell in a frantic manner in an attempt to restore some sort of order.

DEPRECIATES PARLIAMENTARY RULE.

Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg's speech on electoral reform, which was his first realy great parliamentary effort, was largely a depreciation of the value of parliamentary rule and an expression of the government's determination not to be dragged under its charlot wheels. He said he considered that one of the results of the democratization of parliaments in all countries was to render the political sense of a people coarse, superficial and a hindrance to progress.

It was a mistake, he said, to overestimate the value of electoral rights to Prussia, for they were not the zeffith of its political life. The government, he declared, refused to follow the policy of aiming at the democratization of Prussia, and, finally, of the German Empire.



BRITISH ARMY SECURES A WORKABLE AIRSHIP

Fisk-shaped Craft Weathers Stiff Breeza Hundreds of Feet Above the

LONDON, Feb. 15.—The British army appears at last to have secured a workable airship after many false starts. Manned by Col. Capper and four assistants, the huge fish-shaped craft was launched from the military balloon factory at Farnborough today. An hour was occupied in a flight over Itaffans Plain to Aldershot camp and back to its shed. The airship travelled several hundred feet above the highest points passed over and appeared to answer its helm perfectly.

It seemed to be under thorough control throughout the trip and maintained a good speed even when driven into the teeth of a stiff breeze. The new machine is many times greater in size than its predecessors, being 170 feet in length with pointed ends and having fin-like projections on either side. 


