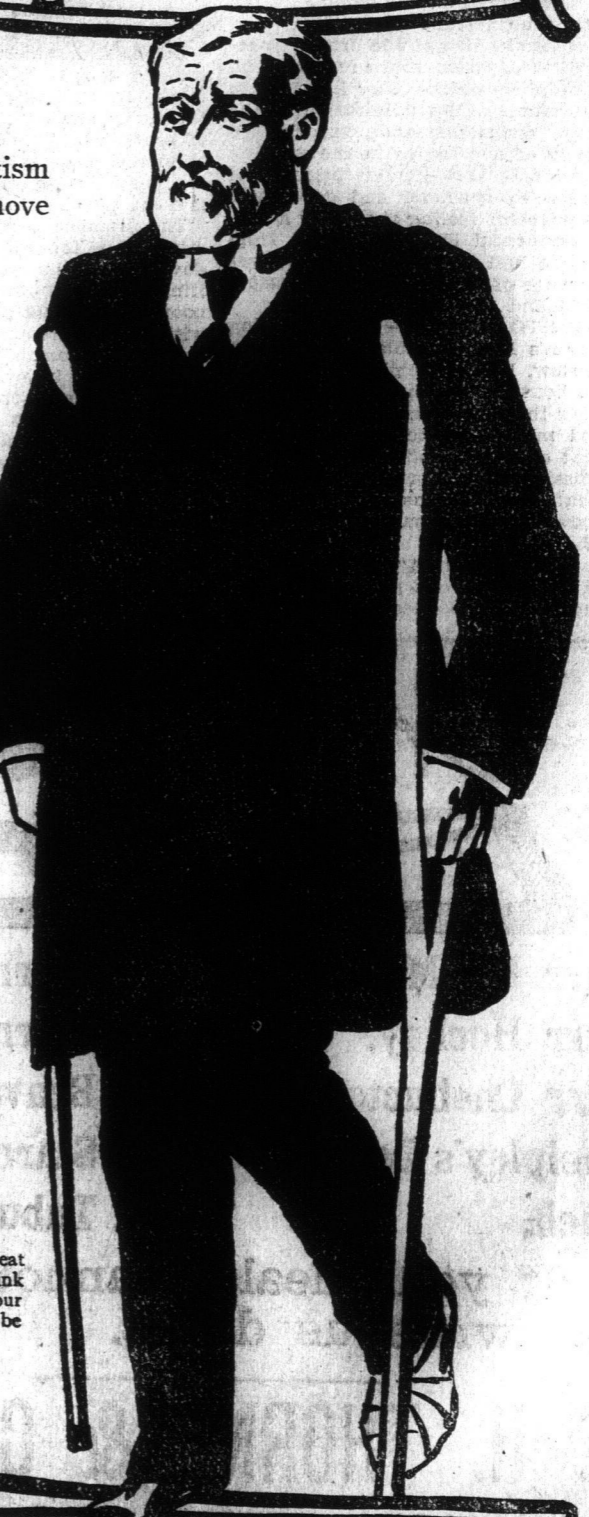

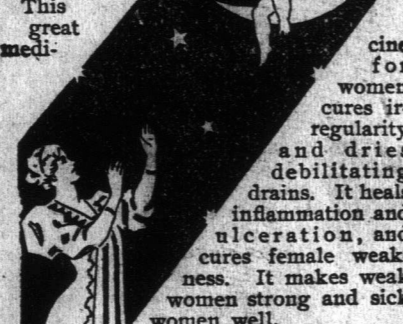

He contended that a man agriculturally educated made the best farmer, and commended the idea that a college education did not harmonize with farm life. He felt that Nova Scotia and New Brunswick could provide ample students for a first class college, and he was in favor of the movement.

WILL COMMAND A BIG SHIP.

(Digby Courier.) Capt. Adelbert F. McKay, youngest son of Lauchlin McKay of Barton, has been appointed master of the Standard Oil Co.'s big ship Atlas, which was launched at Bath, Me., last Saturday.

This vessel is built for the foreign carrying trade and her capacity will be about 5,000 tons. Her dimensions are 332 feet long, 45 feet beam, 26 feet deep and great tonnage nearly 3500. Four masts will be placed in position after the launching, and the vessel will be ready for sea in about a month. The steel masts will be 135 feet long, fitted with double topgallant yards all of steel. The lower yards will be 98 feet and the royals 55 feet in length. The jiggermast will be fore and aft rigged, and the main fore and mizzen square rigged.

Capt. McKay is one of the youngest captains in this country, and has been successful ever since his first voyage to sea, which was made but a few years ago, in the term schooner Lottie W. Fairfield, commanded by Capt. C. B. Dunham.

A STALWART PREMIER

Sir George Dibbs of New South Wales is a Giant, and Has So Used His Strength.

The King (writes a colonial correspondent) will find the waiting which Sir George Dibbs has specially made for him, and is sending home from Sydney for his acceptance, a particularly interesting gift. It is made from a piece of ringliti, a rare wood from the wild wastelands of the "Never Never" region, and probably the one of the finest-grained timbers in existence. Twenty years ago, in connection with a famous colonial case, Sir George Dibbs was sentenced, for contempt of court, to 12 months' detention in Darlinghurst jail, and it was while there that he acquired the skill for turning out sticks, pipes, dolls and other things which has since made him the great stand-by of the philanthropic ladies of Sydney who organize bazaars for charitable purposes.

Sir George turned the "first-class" side of Darlinghurst into a busy workshop when he brought in his lathe and had it mounted. Among other things he built two clipping little yachts during his confinement. "The Sydney courts were easily 'contaminated' by those days (adds the same colonial correspondent), and Sir George had many companions from time to time during his detention. All these he promptly pressed into his service, for he naturally preferred this class of helpers to the hardened convicts the governor always left him when he was short-handed. Visitors were also made to take a turn at the lathe, and often, when I had occasion to go up and see him on business, he gave me a perspiring half hour.

Dibbs was always fond of describing the incidents surrounding his capture. He had been condemned in costs to the tune of about £6,000, which, on principle, he declined to pay, and the whole colony was in sympathy with his attitude. The refusal to pay was, of course, contempt of court; the judges, on being moved, sentenced him to 12 months, and issued a writ of attachment. Dibbs had a town and country house; he cleared all the furniture, paintings, etc., from the latter, up at Emu Plains, at the foot of the Blue Mountains. He was at Emu Plains when a couple of court bailiffs turned up one night to "take his body." As Dibbs stands 77 inches in his socks, and then weighed about 18 stone, the men and the old men and weak-were somewhat taken back when the giant politician coolly got into bed and said: "Go on, take me." They waited till morning, and as Dibbs declined to go until he was "taken," the men and the old men, there's plenty of food in the house, and whiskey. You stop here for a few days and help me to hang the pictures and put the house straight for my wife and family, when I'll go to Sydney with you." The bailiffs fell to willingly enough, everything was put shipshape, and the three went off to Darlinghurst together!

Once, when Dibbs was contesting one of the Sydney by-elections, an outcry was raised against him because the Australian Steam Navigation Company, of which he was the most active director, was employing Chinese labor on its vessels. A motion was made in a meeting was held in Hyde Park, and he was strongly advised to keep indoors, as feeling ran so high against him that he would be in great personal danger if the workmen got hold of him. The giant, however, did not let himself be easily intimidated, and he went to the meeting, walking straight through the crowd to the pedestal of Captain Cook's statue, where a wintry orator was busy muttering. After a few minutes he stepped up to the speaker, and after nearly shaking the life out of him, threw him out into the crowd. Then he got on the pedestal himself, made a great speech, told the crowd would rather have one of his political enemies than any other, Chinaman than Sir Hym, and if they didn't like to vote for him they could go to Cooktown—a significant term in Australia. In the end Dibbs was triumphantly returned.

In later years he became premier of his colony, and, when on a visit to England about ten years ago, was made much of by the Prince of Wales—now the King. A well known portrait is that of the towering Cornwallish standing alongside the King and Queen and other members of the royal family. While he was here the late Queen invested him with the K. C. M. G.—an incident that evoked some chaffing criticism in view of the fact that the early days of his political career Dibbs always preached about "cutting the painter" and setting up the Australian republic.

LORD MILNER.

South Africa is fortunate in having a statesman in the office of High Commissioner. Lord Milner as a constitutional Governor General in a self-governing colony might be only a little better than an average experienced and reasonable man in such a position. But he has now a place of great authority and responsibility, and during his troubled administration he is not shown to have made a single serious mistake.

Lord Milner seems to have made personal enemies of some of Britain's foes, especially those worst foes who remain in the household, but he has won the respect of many who would not yield it on political grounds. Lord Rosebery is one of his avowed admirers.

Lord Milner's address of a fortnight ago at Johannesburg conveys an idea of the sources of his strength. He is firm yet friendly in his declarations. The war must be ended before general reconciliation begins. But Lord Milner is careful not to make the case permanent issue between Briton and Dutchman. He points to the loyal Dutch resident of Cape Colony, who has a right to complain of the English pro-Boer refusal to regard him as a true member of his race.

FRUIT CULTURE.

If Mr. Ralph Egan, or any other man, can by instruction, inspiration, or any other method, induce the farmers of New Brunswick to take up fruit growing and make it half the success that it is in Hants, Kings and Annapolis counties, he will deserve a monument. The cultivation of small fruit has been successful in New Brunswick. Orchard fruit is grown in Carleton and some other counties, but not in sufficient quantities for export or even for home consumption.

TARTE VERSUS MULLOCK.

The Montreal Witness, like the Hamilton Times, the Halifax Chronicle, and several other liberal papers, is getting rather tired of Mr. Tarte's appeal to race feeling over all manner of public and private questions.

There is no reason to suppose that Lieutenant Governor Snowball will be other than a constitutional governor. He has had much experience in public affairs, and understands that not much in the way of official duty is expected of him. He also understands and is well able to meet the social requirements of his exalted position, and will not be likely to do anything to lower his dignity.

Two tunnel disasters in New York City following each other in hot succession, have caused a feeling something like a panic. We may expect prosecutions to be vigorously begun, but no one cares to fix the date when they will close.

C. P. R. WORKSHOPS FOR ST. JOHN.

At first thought there is something startling in the suggestion that St. John should be the place to build the immense system of workshops which the Canadian Pacific Railway Company proposes to establish. We are accustomed to picture such industries in other places, but not here, and the idea comes on the community with a sort of shock.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Jan. 30.—John D. Cassels, who was convicted Jan. 2 of the murder of Mary J. Lane in Long Meadow, was today sentenced to death by electrocution during the week of May 4 by Judge Hopkins of the superior court. During the trial Cassels was dramatic throughout, owing to the prisoner's impassioned plea for a new trial, and a sensation was caused when, immediately after adjournment, Cassels leaped to his feet and cried: "May God curse every man that sent me to the gallows!"

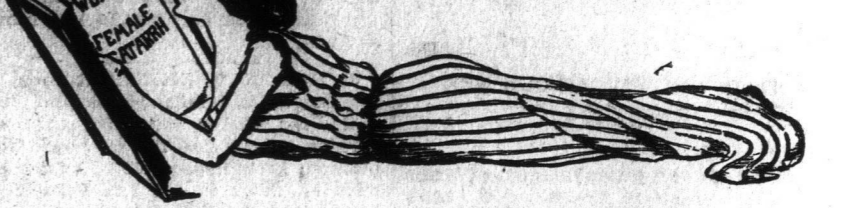
