Nothing is yet definitely known of the state negotiations relative to the affairs of Nor thern Italy, but from the nemark of General Cavanignac in the French National As-Cavanignae in the French National As-sembly on Monday, as well as from the ru-mours that are affost, there is good ground for hoping that a pacific solution of the ques-tion is near at hand. In Southern Italy mat-ters do not look so promising. The King of Naples refuses the mediation of France and England, between himself and his former subjects in Sicily, and threatens an immediate resumption of hostilities.
