Next as to the influence of tea, coffee, and cocoa, on the digestive processes:

Tea exerts a powerful retarding influence on salivary digestion, coffee and tea comparatively feeble one.

W. Roberts estimates the medium strength of tea usually drunk at four or five per cent.

strong tea may contain as much as seven per cent. weak tea as little as two per cent.

Medium coffee has strength of about seven per cent. cocoa, on the other hand, is generally weaker, not more than two per cent., and this, he thinks, may be one reason why it is more suitable to persons with feeble digestions than tea or coffee.

Tea exerts a powerful inhibitory effect on salivary digestion, and it appears to be entirely due to the large quantity of tannin it contains.

It appears that tannin exists in two conditions in the food.

One is in the free state, and is easily extracted by hot water; but one fourth of the total amount is bound up with sugar and other substances, and is not so easily extracted.

Some persons have supposed that by infusing tea for a very short time—only two or three minutes—the tannin would be so bound up that it would be avoided. This is a delusion; you can no more have tea without tannin than you can have water without hydrogen.

Tea, in its free state, is one of the most soluble substances known. If you pour hot water over a small quantity of tea, it will dissolve in it, and the solution will be a strong one.

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
